# TOWN WARRANT.

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town on Tuesday the 9th day of March, next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

Article 1st. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents and Trustees for the ensuing year.

2nd. To see if the town will vote to reimburse the Shepard Morse Lumber Company for the amount laid out on the highway from Washington Village to Goshen line.

3rd. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

4th. To see if the town will vote to raise and set apart the amount required by the State for the building of permanent highways for the ensuing year.

5th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars to meet a like sum from the State, for the repair of state highway for the ensuing year.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

7th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate anything for the observance of Memorial Day for the ensuing year and name the agent to expend the same.

8th. To see if the town will vote to accept a legacy of one hundred dollars from the estate of the late Mason H. Dole, and care for his lot in the Center Cemetery perpetually.

9th. To see if the town will vote for further fire protection and appropriate money therefor.

10th To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and appropriate money therefor.

11th. To see if the town will vote to advertise the attractions and advantages of the town, both for summer and permanent residents and appropriate money for the same.

12th. To vote for delegates and alternate delegates to the Republican and Democratic National conventions.

13th. To transact any other business legally coming before said meeting.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

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To the Members of the Washington School Board.

It is usual for the Superintendent of Schools to make an annual report, and as you have a superintendent now, it may be best for him to make a short report, although he was not the Superintendent until after the close of the fiscal year for which this annual report is made.

Our State of New Hampshire has made a very enviable reputation, among those interested in education in the other States. The first thing to be noticed is that, under the new law, the entire school system of the State will be operated on principles of business efficiency, uniform throughout the State, in such a way that educational advantages of the rural and city districts shall in the end be more nearly equal.

It is true that certain requirements must be met by each district; there must be thirty-six weeks of school each year, the buildings must be made suitable and sanitary, the equipment in furniture, books, maps etc. must be satisfactory, the teachers and the Superintendent must meet with the approval of the State Board, and there must be suitable provision for the care of the health and physical welfare of all pupils.

We feel certain that those requirements are very acceptable to those who have children to be educated, and it is certainly for the good of the children that schools are maintained. Last year we had eleven weeks of school, so short a time that the children had hardly begun to get down to work before it was time to



stop. We now have thirty-six weeks, and it is safe to say that the children will learn more than four times as much as they did last year. The next item will doubtless be the most expensive because our schools do not meet the requirements. However, that too is for the benefit of the health of our children. And what is a few dollars beside the health of your child? According to the new law, teachers must have definite preparation for their work, and must have something more than simply a high school education. The State has been divided into slightly more than sixty districts, with a Superintendent over each district, elected and recommended by the school boards, and approved by the State Board. He must have had satisfactory experience, must sustain an investigation as to character and scholarship, and must pass examinations, set by the State Board, in a number of subjects.

It is for him to have general oversight of the schools and the teachers, to keep them up to the standard, to devote his entire time to the work, and to keep the Board informed as to the condition of the schools. He can be of assistance to the inexperienced teacher, both as to methods of instruction, and if necessary, in matters of discipline. He relieves the members of the school board, who receive almost no pay, and are people who have other work to do, of much of their former clerical work, and of the necessity of visiting schools. For instance, your present Superintendent visited schools more than 300 times in the first 85 days of school.

Although the State Department makes these requirements, every one of which generally meets with hearty approval when fully understood, it gladly meets the districts more than half way, and will help those



who meet these requirements, in a financial way. It is and has been required that at least \$3.50 per \$1000 of the valuation be raised by taxation for the schools; but by the present school law, if \$5.00 be raised and expended wholly for the elementary schools, then the State will step in and furnish the money needed, over and above that amount to provide for the proper carrying on of our elementary schools. This State aid is a very substantial assistance, so that it costs each district very little more to carry on the schools in a satisfactory manner, than it did before.

I strongly advise some form of medical inspection, and have suggested exercises which should result in the physical improvement of the children.

Due to the fact that we were unexpectedly called upon to establish a school this year in the Cherry Valley District, the Selectmen were called to pay out money for fixing over a former dwelling house into a school room. In this way we have a comfortable school room at a much smaller cost than would otherwise have been possible, thanks to their foresight and wisdom.

Your Superintendent has been here only a short time, but in that time, he has learned to appreciate the sincere desire of your Board to work for the best interests of the schools, and I can surely congratulate you on the present teaching force. They are doing excellent work.

Will not the parents and friends of the schools visit them more frequently. It encourages both the children and the teacher to have your interest in them and their work proven by your visits.
