TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the town of Washington, in the county of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town at ten of the clock in the forenoon, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, to act upon the following articles:

Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, one member of Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of Li rary Committee for three years, and any other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of high-ways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00, reappropriate the sum of \$661.50, and accept state aid of \$1,382.00 for the construction of S. A. C. highway in said town.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to apply on note due December 10, 1949, borrowed for the purchase of truck and plow.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the fire department for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of blister rust.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a town garage and authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum sufficient to complete same, or take any action thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out a road from the Millen Pond road, near the Y. M. C. A. ball grounds, to the north Marlow road, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to build same, or take any action thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a loader.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of highway equipment.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to augment the \$400.00 raised in 1947 for the town hall water supply or take any action thereto.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to transfer \$400.00 to Capital Reserve for town hall water supply. Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for band concerts.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Mrs. Minnie C. Morrisette as a trust fund, the income to be used for perpetual care of the John Chamberlain lot in the Washington Center Cemetery.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the common.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Washington qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said district on the 9th day of March, 1948, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to meet the deficit incurred in the support of schools during the current school year, said sum to be available before July 1st.

- 10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to sell the Dole school property, deducting from the proceeds legal expenses incurred, or to take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,050.00 for the purpose of installing a modern heating system in the Center school, or to take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the district will authorize the school board to use funds from the sale of the Dole school property necessary to provide and install a suitable plumbing system in the Center schoolhouse.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$370.00 to complete shingling and to paint the the exterior of the East Washington school, or to take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the district will vote to have a committee of three appointed by the school board to work with similar committees from towns nearby to study the cost and advisability of constructing a cooperative high school to serve this area under Chapter 199, Laws of 1947.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Report of School Administration

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

I am pleased to forward to you, this, my third annual report concerning the Washington schools.

The U. S. Office of Education has recently pointed out that a school is part of its community. It serves that community and is powerfully influenced by it in many ways. A school cannot rise above the level of its community. If it is to progress, it must sometimes help lift the community to broader, more purposeful ideas or concepts, especially about education, in order to improve the quality of its own work. Comparably, in the long run a community cannot rise above the level of its school.

America has long been regarded as THE land of equal opportunity. It must be admitted that it has not always provided that equal opportunity that is fundamental to the American way of life. There can be no equal opportunity without equal educational advantages. We are anxious to have the Washington school provide the minimum essentials of generally accepted standards of a modern school.

At this writing, the school in the Center has the largest enrollment of resident Washington pupils that we have had for some time. Due to good foresight on the part of a former school board we have had a sufficient number of very good desks and seats to take care of the larger number of pupils.

Miss Laughlin has worked dilligently to inspire her pupils to broaden their interests and studies. Through her efforts the pupils now often have some semblance of a hot lunch at noon. Her cooperation with the Bookmobile of the State Library has widened the reading resources of the pupils. The school now owns a set of the Book of Knowledge which is valuable for reference

work. The work of Mr. Herman Hill as music teacher has been favorably received in the community. Mrs. Mary Griffin, has served as nurse and is initiating a long range health program for the pupils. When the current operating budget was presented last July, it did not allow sufficient funds for the employment of a music teacher nor for the installation of storm windows. However, both of these factors later seemed to be necessities and we have asked for a \$400 deficit appropriation to take care of these items in the current year.

The Dole school has been closed for two years now and in its present location should never be re-opened. The surrounding land just is not suited to the play-time pursuits of school boys and girls. Secondly, it is not in the geographical center of any population group. Under these circumstances, the school property is merely a white elephant in the school budget, eating up money for repairs and insurance. If it could be sold, the buyer would become a taxpayer and thus help us in two ways. Washington citizens will have an opportunity to authorize the Board to sell this property when due consideration is given the current school warrant.

Under the direction of the School Board, the Center School has been repainted inside. The very modern coloring is a cheery reminder of the bright future in store for well-educated children. The installation of several storm windows has served to alleviate somewhat, the usual wintry temperatures in the schoolhouse. It still would take courage to visit the area of the woodshed on a casual errand during the winter weather. In our warrant we have proposed that a modern heating system be installed to replace the inadequate system we now have. This would involve insulating and sheathing part of the present ell and installing a complete airconditioning system which would be automatic and would completely warm, moisten and filter the air for the room. Concurrently, we would install an electric pump for the water system, two flush toilets and a drinking fountain. The heating system would serve to heat the toilets and could be extended to heat the upstairs area later.

With these improvements in the physical plant and a gradual strengthening of the learning procedures, Washington could offer an educational program which might well serve to welcome new residents to the town. Certainly the present school lacks many modern appointments which are today considered a must. In presenting this year's warrant, your School Board has given every man and woman in Washington an opportunity to stand up and BE COUNTED FOR or AGAINST a better educational structure in Washington. As superintendent of schools, I feel duty-bound to call your attention to the defects. In the final analysis these are your children. How they are trained, so will they be prepared to train their children. In their hands lies the future of Washington and you are the ones to point up that future. The question of cost is of course important. The State Board of Education has recently made a statistical survey of the various financial factors of local schools. From it we can make a study of our situation. All figures for the past year.

From the study, we may readily conclude that Washington has an average equalized valuation per pupil much higher than that of most towns. In fact, of all the 239 school districts in the state, only three (3) districts had a greater per pupil average equalized valuation than Washington. Against this heritage, we are asking for an appropriation only large enough to provide the basic necessities of an educational program. Even this budget is insufficient to overcome a backlog of needed reconversions for an up-to-date educational program.

For the 1948-1949 school year, we need the funds for the attached financial budget here in Washington and more than that, we need the DAILY interest of every citizen in the activities of our school.

I have enjoyed my associations here the past year. My thanks for the fine cooperation of the School Board, Selectmen, pupils, and teachers. As we again come up for your approval, we are reminded of the very inspirational words of Dr. Edgar Fuller, Commissioner of Education:

"Given full opportunity to consider the facts about public education, the people of New Hampshire will make the right decisions about it."

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available

man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both

damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.
