**TOWN WARRANT**

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Washington, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, one member of Trust Fund Committee for three years one member of Library Committee for three years, one member of Planning Committee for five years, one member of Planning Committee for three years, and any other necessary town officers.

Article 2. To see what action the town will take in relation to a committee for care of cemeteries or take other action relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent, the authorization to continue until revoked by some future town meeting.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$518.58 and accept State Aid of \$3,457.22 for Town Road Aid in said town.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,242.00 for State Aid Construction in said town.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for the support of Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the repairs and painting of the library fence.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the construction of a Town Garage or take any action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the purchase of highway equipment or take any action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the Town Hall Water Supply and Kitchen Facilities or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the East Washington Mill Pond Dam or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept donations to be transferred to Capital Reserves, already established, or take any action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Article 18. ~~To see what sum of money the town will~~ vote to raise and appropriate for expenditures of the Washington Civil Defense Organization. *MOTION THAT WE*

Article 19. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to the addition of street lights. *TO BE AVAILABLE*

Article 20. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to amounts charged for rent of Town Hall. ✓

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to acquire land for cemetery purposes and appropriate a sum of money therefor or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to throw up any Class 6 Roads they deem advisable or take any action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$300 from Ruth Williams as a trust fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the J. Charles Williams lot only, in the East Washington Cemetery.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$400 from the estate of the late Myrtle M. Barker as a trust fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the lots of Mary Jones and family and of Enoch Barker and family.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to accept the following sums or any portion thereof in trust from the estate of late Fred M. Ball:

1. \$200 in trust, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the lot in New Cemetery in which he and his mother are buried.

2. The sum of \$100 in trust, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the grave of his father Henry M. Ball in the Seventh Day Cemetery, south end.

3. The sum of \$800 in trust to be invested and the income thereof to be applied for the purchase of magazines and books for the Washington Free Public Library, said trust to be known as the Fred M. Ball Fund.

Article 26. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.

Article 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

At the Town Meeting, Robert J. Porter was elected to the Town Planning Committee for a five year term. The present members and the expiration date of their term of office are:

Under Article 16 of the warrant, it was voted that "the Planning Committee replace the service honor roll with a monument to be placed in the same triangle, to honor those from Washington who served with the armed forces during World Wars I and II and the Spanish-American War" and \$50 was appropriated for that purpose. A bronze tablet was purchased and attached to a native boulder. At the dedication ceremony on Memorial Day, Frank O. Hartwell acted as master of ceremonies. Dr. Malden gave the invocation. The Lord's Prayer was sung by John Newman. In his address, Dr. Madsen said, "As a memorial of the courage and devoted patriotism of our sons who served in the armed forces of our country in the Spanish-American War and World Wars I and II, we, the people of Washington, New Hampshire, set up and dedicate this stone. May it be an ever-present reminder of the great sacrifices which have preserved our freedom and way of life hitherto, and may it, under God, inspire in everyone such loyalty that brave hearts shall never fail, but will continue to cherish and defend these free institutions under which we live together in peace and goodwill." Norman Fletcher placed a wreath on the tablet as Philip Hugney sounded "Taps." Expenditures were as follows:

## REPORT OF SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

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*To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:*

I submit herewith my sixth annual report concerning the Washington educational program, with distinct pride in your accomplishments and sincere appreciation for the great teamwork and skills in working together of pupils, parents, Miss Hoyt, and the School Board which has effected the operation of such wholesome educational program.

The Center School was renovated during the summer in a manner which makes it now one of the most modernly appointed schools in the whole state of New Hampshire. Through your generosity in supplying the necessary funds, it was possible to build on at the rear of the present structure, a large new ell to house the two new toilet rooms and the new furnace room. Through the careful planning and budgeting of your Board, we were enabled to get the whole building job and installations done within the budget, and including certain alterations in the upstairs room. New grading in the rear of the addition and installation of a septic tank were also included in the completed job. Fletcher Brothers of East Washington were the general contractors with Silsby and Johnson of Newport as plumbing and heating sub-contractor.

Our other great pride is the tremendous success of Miss Hoyt and her pupils in downright true experiences in pure living in a democracy. While educators all around us are asking can we or dare we educate for democracy, Miss Hoyt is doing it and doing it extremely well. These are troubled times all over the world. We hear dire things about the future of democracy which we were brought up to think of as a birthright. No matter how glowing it looks on paper or how many flags are waving, democracy does not come naturally. One has to learn it, to live it, to struggle for it; and all this calls for a process of education which offers the experiences of a democracy firmly coupled with the objectives of education. Actually, we must teach our pupils how to function as citizens beyond the mere mechanics of voting on issues. With the knowledge imparted there must be understandings, not the mere memorization of facts by themselves. Activity calls for situations in which the democratic way of life can actually be practiced so that

each person will learn first hand the problems and the values of participation in the making of decisions, in the planning for the security of a common humanity.

Since such education actually signals a process of seeking out truths by experience, there is less dogma to fall back on whenever reactionaries try to take us backwards. It is fundamental however that such a program as is described is actually directed toward making freedom more understandable. In such a program, books serve as sources of information and ideas, and our problems come from those of the people in our community.

Miss Hoyt and her pupils are heartily congratulated, then, for their ardent pursuit of learnings in democratic citizenship and true patriotism. With the continued cooperation of the community the Washington School can be expected to continue to prosper.

In conclusion I wish to thank Mr. Fletcher, Mr. Otterson and Mr. Rolfe for their splendid cooperation in the promotion of our year's work. The skilled assistance of Kenneth E. Jewett in our Fine Arts program is well recognized in the community and is reflected in the contributions of our pupils in the homes and publicly. Thanks also are due to Mrs. Mary Griffin for her assistance in the field of school health and to Mrs. Stanley Drew for her conscientious transportation service.
