TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of the Library Committee for three years, one member of the Planning Committee for five years, and any other necessary Town officers.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,388.00 for State Aid Construction in said Town.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$518.50 and accept State Aid of \$3,456.68 for Town Road Aid in said Town.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the painting of the Library fence, and to make repairs on the Library building.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of blister rust.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

Article 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for administration of the plan.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer all or part of the East Washington Mill Pond property to the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of constructing a dam, to borrow a sum of money not to exceed three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) on a long term note and to withdraw the Capital Reserve for the East Washington Dam, and to enter into agreements with the State of New Hampshire for such a construction or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the Capital Reserve for the Construction of the East Washington Dam, to borrow a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) on a long term note for the construction of a dam and to begin negotiations for and actual construction of a dam on the East Washington Mill property or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the East Washington Mill Pond Dam or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to buy a new

truck, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the Capital Reserve for highway equipment and to borrow a sufficient sum on long term note to pay the balance.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the purchase of highway equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the Construction of a town garage, or take any

other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the water supply and kitchen facilities for the Town Hall, and what sum of money it will vote to raise and appropriate for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will

vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

Article 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Sarah Shedd lot in the old cemetery in Washington Center or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200 from Myrtle Monroe for perpetual care of the Fred B. and Daniel Monroe lots in the East Washington

Cemetery.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 fram Zaida M. Book for the perpetual care of the W. W. Book lot in East Washington Cemetery.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to adjust the

salaries of the town officers.

Article 28. To transact any other business that may

legally come before this meeting.

GENERAL REPORT

I believe the people of Washington know what an unusually fine school they have. Few one-room schools in the country are more comfortably arranged or better equipped than your Center School. Beyond this the spirit of controlled freedom in which your children are taught is very near the ideal of American Education. A great deal of credit is due Miss Hoyt for her ability to help students develop self confidence, self respect and self control. The citizens of Washington have been generous in providing for their school. They should take a good deal of satisfaction in knowing that the equipment is being efficiently used and well taken care of

The trip to Boston which the students took, under the direction of Kenneth Jewett, was a developing experience to be remembered for a lifetime. Much sound learning has been based upon the new interests developed on this trip.

Through the cooperation of school parents a hot lunch program has been established. The upper room of the school has been redecorated and very nicely equipped to prepare and serve the noon meal. Some surplus commodities and federal funds are available to help with this project. The menus for the school lunch program are planned in advance each month by a committee of women of the community. Mrs. Nichols secures the foods required and prepares the meals at the kitchen area upstairs in the schoolhouse. About two-thirds of the children are now eating at school.

The schoolhouse has truly served as a community center during the past year. An adult class in handicrafts was conducted by Mr. Jewett. The Fire Department have held monthly meetings. Several card parties and suppers have been enjoyed. Church services have been held during the winter months on Sunday afternoons and two talking pictures have been presented on Saturday evenings.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation for the hearty welcome extended to me by your school board, teacher, students and citizens as I enter upon my duties in your town.
