TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, one Selectman for two years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of the Library Committee for three years, one member of the Planning Committee for five years, and any other necessary Town officers.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 and accept State Aid of \$2,500.00 for State Aid Construction in said Town.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$515.94 and accept State Aid of \$3,439.60 for Town Road Aid in said Town.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of the bridge at the East Washington Dam.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of blister rust.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the Benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Oldage and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and reappropriate the sum of \$65.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

Article 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for administration of the plan.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to buy any new highway equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the Capital Reserve for highway equipment and to borrow a sufficient sum on long term note to pay the balance.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the purchase of highway equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the construction of a town garage, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer to a Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$2,806.50 for State Aid construction now in the Town treasury.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to apply on the Lundsted Note for East Washington Dam.

Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Assiciation.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Sarah Shedd lot in the old cemetery in Washington Center or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to adjust the salaries of the town officers, election officials, and employees.

Article 24. To hear the report of the kitchen committee.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote taken under Article 14, March 1951 warrant insofar as it pertains to the location of the town hall kitchen.

Article 26. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the location of the town hall kitchen.

Article 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new dump land or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes an additional compensation for his services in collecting the State head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

TEAM WORK WILL DO THE JOB

Team work has won victories from time immemorial — for families, towns, cities, states and nations. Team work is the highest form and most democratic example of cooperation. Without team work, America and Americans would never have achieved the greatness that is theirs. We are all aware of its power and appeal. It is no less needed now than in the past.

General Report

It is always a pleasure to visit the Washington Center School. You can be sure there will be something new, valuable and interesting going on. The children who have been privileged to study under Miss Hoyt are unusually fortunate. On a recent visit the pupils were anxious to read for me. After each class had come forward to demonstrate its ability I asked if anyone had much trouble with reading. The answer was a very happy, "No!", with which Miss Hoyt agreed. There are few rooms in the state where that would be true. It reflects fine interest and effort by the pupils and marked ability of the teacher.

The following is a quotation from an article by Haydn Pearson which appeared on the front page of the Boston Herald:

"Any one-room school is really a report card of the teacher, and when I became acquainted with Miss Margaret S. Hoyt, just finishing her 46th year of teaching I knew a major part of the answer to the Washington school. Miss Hoyt is a remarkable woman, a born teacher, a woman who loves children, and a teacher who has the faculty of combining good discipline with encouragement of individual powers in youngsters."

"This piece is frankly a tribute to Miss Hoyt; to her goes the major credit for this outstanding school. But because this situation in Washington ties in so closely with what I've been preaching for rural education, I want also to stress adequately the attitude and work of the townspeople.

"'Give the credit for this good school to the Parents' Club,' said Miss Hoyt. 'They are wonderful.'

Education throughout the United States faces a crisis in the near future with a tremendous surplus of children. We have about the usual number of people studying to become teachers but almost twice as many children as usual entering school. With so many elementary teaching positions open the younger teachers are going to the bigger cities and towns where the bright lights and higher salaries look attractive. Many small self contained communities, like Washington, face the same baffling problem when they lose their excellent teacher. The only hope is to find a person of ability who prizes a pleasant home among congenial friends above money and excitement. In these days such people are exceedingly rare.

During the year the school house has been painted, and the front steps replaced. Hand rails and new treads have been installed in the stairway leading to the second floor.

We have enjoyed sharing with Stoddard a series of films which show how people earn a living in various parts of the world as well as other topics of interest. Under the efficient management of Mrs. Norman Fletcher and her committee, Mrs. Nichols has served a hot lunch to about 18 children each day. Among the surplus commodities received to aid in this program were eggs, ham, bacon, turkey, peas, beans, honey, peanut butter, cheese, dried milk and canned peaches.

Washington can justly be proud of its school and the fine spirit displayed by its students.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation to the school board, teacher, and the citizens of Washington for their help in making this a successful school year.
