TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

Art. 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one member of the Library Committee for three years, one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of the Planning Board for five years, and any other Town Officers.

Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$636.72 and accept State Aid of \$4,244.78 for Town Road Aid on the East Washington Road.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$5,000. for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V roads within the Town: East Washington Rd. #65, such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Washington.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Dept. for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift, a 1951 Tank Fire Truck from the Washington Fire Dept.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to make a gift of the 1937 Fire Truck owned by the Town, to the Washington Fire Dept.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. to purchase a Siren to be placed on the East Washington Fire Station, and authorize the Selectmen to purchase the same.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to reappropriate the unexpended balance of the 1966 dry hydrant appropriation to dig a water hole and install a dry hydrant on the Millen Pond Road; also to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. to purchase and install two additional dry hydrants, one in East Washington, and the other in Washington Village and to dig water holes for same if necessary or take any other action relating thereto.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to let the East Washington Improvement Association widen the outlet to the spillway on the Dam, cut brush along the shore, and any other improvements as may benefit the conditions around the Pond.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for the use of the Sullivan County Mental Health Association.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to paint the Front and West end of the Town Hall.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase radios for the Police Dept.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to recind such portions of vote taken on Article 12, Town Meeting of March 11, 1958, that pertains to grave stone being lawn type, and to allow grave stones above lawn level provided they are placed on concrete foundation three inches larger than stones on all sides, foundation to be lawn level, or take any other action relating thereto.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote

to raise and appropriate to pay long term notes outstanding.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to support the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for development of the new cemetery land.

Art. 21. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase chairs for the Town Hall.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase an addressograph machine.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the History Committee.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Highway Equipment.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Permanent Bridges.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to reopen that portion of the Marlow Road, previously discontinued subject to gates and bars, from Wilcox corner to the road onto Gordon Davis land. (approx. 2000 ft.)

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to build the bridge and improve the road mentioned in previous article.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$450. for three band concerts, one of which will be played in East Washington.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of land for the new Fire Station.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to establish historic districts at Washington, within 1000 ft. radius from the Town Hall, and East Washington, within 1000 ft. radius from junction of Bradford and Washington Road at the Grange Hall.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of surplus articles and equipment.

Art. 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Librarian and Trustees 1966

Circulation from the 2847 volumes in the library and 1629 volumes from the Bookmobile was 4320. Again last year we had the third highest per capita circulation of the 218 libraries in New Hampshire with 26.2 books per person compared to the state average of 6.7 and was eleventh in per capita expenditures of \$6.51 compared to \$2.52 for the whole state. Under the Statewide Library Development Program we received a grant of \$100.00 worth of reference books to add to our collection. Preston Rolfe continues as delegate to the Southwest District Advisory Council which meets quarterly in Keene with 48 neighboring libraries working to improve library services in this part of New Hampshire. The State Library Commission designated the libraries at Keene, Hanover and Claremont as Service Center libraries to provide closer additional library service for our citizens. The Commission also adopted new qualifications for affiliated libraries under which our library, located in a town with a population under 500, is expected to be open eight hours a week by July 1, 1972. Since we are open four hours a week at present, we plan to increase our annual appropriation a little each year in order to provide the funds to meet the expense of longer hours which, of course, will provide better library service for our town. All our trustees are members of the State Library Trustees' Association and Preston Rolfe is a member of their executive board.

A sale of our discarded books and others donated for the sale added \$39.30 to our book funds during the summer. A Book Fair conducted by the Center School teachers and the librarian provided additional funds for school reference books. The librarian attended meetings with other librarians at Newport, Meriden, Keene and Charlestown during the past year. Friends donated 24 youth books and 47 adult books to the library.

Remember that your Library is open every Wednesday from 2:30 to 4:30 in the afternoon and from 7:00 to 9:00 in the evening and everyone is welcome to use it.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Fire Record

Fire records are made by people — those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966).

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres — a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
4. Most important — instruct your children that matches are not play things.

W., American Legion, National Guard, Holiday Trail boys' camp, and Camp Morgan; fire trucks from Washington, East Washington, Henniker, and Hillsboro; trucks from Hillsboro Dairy and Washington highway department; three horse drawn carriages; and many other entries. The judges were Albert S. Carlson of Hanover, executive secretary of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, and John C. Fairbanks of Newport, lawyer.

A chicken barbecue, picnic lunch, and sandwiches and drinks sold by the 4-H Club took care of the noon repast on the Common.

The afternoon started off with a fancy work sale by town organizations. An old fashioned country auction of a barn full of donated items netted over \$200 toward meeting expenses of the celebration. The seven-mile road race with cups and medals for the winners had more than twenty entries. Games for the children included a pie-eating contest. Over 200 old-time photographs were on display in the Grange Hall. The Center School House and the Shedd Free Library were open for those who wanted to visit. Nearly 300 enjoyed an old-fashioned baked bean supper put on by the firemen in the Town Hall, followed by an exhibition of folk dancing on the Common by the Durham Reelers. The busy day closed with a community program in the Town Hall, with Perley Crane as master of ceremonies, that included a chalk talk by Paul Scruton of Hillsboro, community singing led by John Newman, and square dances performed by the young people of the 4-H dance groups.

The three-day celebration finally ended with a band concert by the Hillsboro Band under the sunny August skies on

Sunday afternoon. As mentioned before, the cooperation of every citizen of our town gave us the best celebration of Old Home Day we have ever had, and the memories will last for years.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Washington qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Washington Central School in said district on the tenth day of March, 1967, at eight o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose agents, auditors, committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the school year 1967-68.
9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.
10. To see what sum of money the district will raise as a deficiency appropriation to pay the salary and related expenditures of the additional part time teacher and/or to take any other action thereon.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to assign grades seven and eight to the Hillsboro-Deering Cooperative School District and to determine if the district will authorize the school board to contract for the transportation of grades 7-12 pupils and to determine the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for this purpose after deducting the amount presently in the budget for the purpose of transporting high school pupils.

12. To see if the district will vote to elect its officers by official ballot and to adopt the provisions of R. S. A. 59:73 and 59:77 which provide for the election of the school district officers (moderator, clerk, treasurer and school board members) by non-partisan ballot.

13. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of R. S. A. 197:12-a which provides for the utilization of the town check list as the check list of the school district.

14. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to dispose of the old school desks and one stove stored in the East Washington School wood shed, and allow the East Washington Improvement Association to use the building to store their chairs and other equipment which they use around the Fire Station.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for the voters of a school district to make a judgment relative to the organizational structure of its educational program, serious thinking should be the basis for making a determination. This is the problem with which most of the districts in Union #24 are faced this year and possibly next. The decisions of the voters will point the direction for educational endeavors within their communities for the next decade and perhaps longer. It is not too difficult to make decisions for a one or two year period as the precedents provide quite adequate information on which to make a judgment. However, to decide in 1966 what is going to be best in 1976 requires a different type of thinking and a considerable amount of guesstimation. Probably by the time this is being read some decisions will have been made, but I expect there will be more to come. Therefore, as I proceed with my report I shall try to provide some information for your consideration without excessively showing my prejudices.

Federal

We are now in the second year of involvement with the federal aid to education program. P. L. 89:10 with its various titles has been tied to the government's poverty program and consequently has not provided to the rural areas anything but "peanut programs" financially. However, we have been able to utilize these meager funds to provide some additional services or improve some existing services in a manner which would not have been done had these funds not been available. We have also been able under these programs to acquire a considerable amount of equipment which would not otherwise have been available. Our libraries have been able to improve themselves measurably under the Title II program.

Unfortunately the proliferation of the Vietnam conflict and the aid to education program came into being at about the same time. Now at a time when it was expected the education program would be funded in increasing amounts, the requests for larger appropriations to carry on the war are going to receive top priority and it is expected that funds available for educational purposes will be of a token nature. Therefore, I expect that at all levels of government there will be a reduction of federal funds for education.

State

Article 83 of the Constitution of New Hampshire states, ". . . it shall be the duty of the legislators and magistrates in all future periods of this government to cherish the interest of literature and the sciences, and all seminaries and public schools . . ." That the legislators took their obligation seriously is evidenced by the document entitled "New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Relating to Public Schools." To administer the laws enacted relative to public schools the legislature created the State Board of Education and spelled out its powers in Chapter 186, section 5 as follows in part, "The State Board shall have the same powers of management, supervision and direction over public schools in this state as the directors of a business corporation has over its business . . . It shall be the duty of school boards and employees of school districts to comply with the rules and regulations of the State Board."

The above should leave no question as to where the responsibility for quality of New Hampshire's educational opportunities lies. Probably few would argue that this is not as it should be. However, there is a growing dichotomy between the two groups listed above and the local communities who have carried the burden of implementing the mandates of the legislature and the directives of the State Board.

The legislature and the State Board in their endeavors to provide quality education for all the pupils in the state have found it necessary to issue directives which required many communities to upgrade their educational efforts to a considerable extent. At the state level it was recognized that some communities were more able to support quality education than others. In order to aid the less affluent communities maintain its educational offering at the level requested, the Foundation Aid program was established and in later years Building Aid, Sweepstakes, Education for the Deaf, Physically Handicapped and Mentally Retarded programs came into being. None of these programs have been funded to the extent of the need and very few to the extent of the statutes.

A good example of this lack of funding the state aid programs is revealed when it is observed that in 1966-67 Antrim received \$11,917.71 from the Foundation Aid program and if full payment would be made in 1967-68 they would receive \$52,294.66. In 1966-67 Hillsboro-Deering received nothing but if the program was fully funded for 1967-68 they would receive \$68,730.85.

Few people realize the extent that change is taking place

in education today. To attempt to keep up with this change the state is putting more and more pressure on local communities to upgrade their educational efforts. It is obvious that the improvement of present services and the addition of new services plus the inflationary trend in all phases of operation is of great concern to the local school districts who now carry the brunt of the burden of financing their educational endeavors. It is well known that the State Board is considering new standards for various phases of the state's educational program and that the 1967 legislature will be considering legislation which will increase the cost to the local school districts. To what extent can the local districts absorb these additional costs?

I am among that growing number who feel that with the responsibility for establishing educational standards in the state goes the responsibility to financially support these programs to a greater extent than the state is now doing, and that until such time as the state is willing to assume a much more realistic responsibility, no new programs be implemented at the state level which requires local level funding.

While we are discussing school costs, let us again examine the state average per pupil cost for tuition purposes which does not include debt service and transportation:

For the first time in years Hillsboro-Deering is able to establish their tuition rate in line with the state average. The school board has taken advantage of the two per cent rental factor allowed and have increased their 1967-68 rate from \$475 to \$600 per high school pupil.

You are all probably cognizant of the fact that the State Board of Education has joined the Hopkinton and Henniker School Districts to Supervisory Union #24 as of July 1, 1967. The office will continue to be in Hillsboro but because of space requirements it may be necessary to relocate. There will be two additional members to the staff and I wish to welcome Mr. Douglas Brown who has been elected to the position of assistant superintendent. He will spend a considerable amount of his time working with personnel and curriculum, areas which have been neglected by this office of late.

Local

At the 1966 annual district meetings Antrim, Bennington and Hillsboro-Deering elected committees which have been involved in studies which should lead to membership in a cooperative school district. A year ago it looked as though Antrim, Bennington, Hillsboro-Deering, Henniker and Weare had cause to feel that there was considerable merit in joining for educational purposes. Today the picture has changed drastically. Bennington and Antrim have withdrawn from the above group and have cast their lot in the direction of the Peterborough study while Hopkinton has joined in study with the remaining districts. If all the districts involved in the studies become members of the respective cooperative school districts, there will be enough pupils involved to program educational opportunities comparable to most in the state at a per pupil cost which must be considered favorable in the light of the previously listed advancement. Antrim, Hillsboro-Deering, Hopkinton and Weare are or soon will be faced with building programs if they do not become a part of a cooperative. Therefore, this is an opportune time to be considering such a move. By the time you read this the coop will have been accepted or rejected by the involved districts. It is my hope that should there be failure at this time that the same group will again try to present to the voters an acceptable program in the very near future. All are faced with financing adequate programs and nearly all are faced with new construction. My personal feeling is that the only answer is for a joint solution to these problems. The day of an adequate small operation is past and the sooner the problem of size is solved the sooner we can get on with the job of quality education.

For the first time in my life I found myself joined with several other superintendents opening school with a vacancy on the teaching staff. Fortunately I was able to obtain a person to fill this vacancy within two weeks so little was lost. However, such an experience is frightening when it is obvious that our teacher training institutions will be unable to improve the teacher shortage situation for at least three more years. Your board has moved in the direction of making teacher procurement funds available comparable to most New Hampshire districts, but again this year I anticipate a most difficult time in filling our staff vacancies.

Again I wish to express my appreciation to those with whom I have worked for their fine cooperation and to all others for any contributions they may have made in the interest of education. Through such cooperative spirit, we

do move forward.
