THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles:

- Art. 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one member of the Library Committee for three years, one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of the Planning Board for five years, and any other Town Officers.
- Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$567.80 and accept State Aid of \$3,785.36.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used by the Town History Committee, to hear reports or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To hear the report of the Truck Committee, and take any action on same.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$502.35, and reappropriate \$497.65, unexpended from the 1964 highway account to oil black-top roads for the ensuing year.

- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift a 1941 Ford fire truck, from the East Washington Improvement Association; to register and insure said truck; to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be paid over to the East Washington Improvement Association for its use in maintaining and operating said truck as a unit of its Volunteer Fire Department, said truck to be left in the possession of the Association and used at the discretion and under the authority of the Association.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to adjust any or all town wages.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to install a gasoline tank and pump at the town garage and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install a culvert across the common at the Band Stand.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to paint the town hall.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to support the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Band Concerts.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the Washington Center cemetery.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to observe Old Home Day.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install automatic heat in the Town Hall or take any other action thereto.
- Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a fire house 28x36 to be built on town property near the center of town, buildings to correspond as near as possible with town buildings, erected under supervision of Selectmen and three persons appointed

by the fire department and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary balance.

- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build an addition on the town garage and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary balance.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on long term notes, \$1,000.00 of which is due on town garage and \$1,000.00 due on town truck.
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money and transfer to Capital Reserve for permanent bridges.
- Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money and transfer to capital reserve for the use of the Fire Department, any part of which may be drawn at any time in case of emergency.
- Art. 26. To see what action the Town will take in regard to remodeling toilets in the Town Hall, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 27. To see what action the Town will take in regard to placing benches on the Town Common, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to require all dogs in town to be tied or on leash from April first to November first.
- Art. 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than 10 inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fies so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational - is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area -4,350,000 acres—is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Washington qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Washington Central School in said district on the sixth day of March, 1965, at eight o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the school year 1965-66.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and

the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to place \$254.87 from the 1964 sweepstakes and \$1,080.00 from the 1965 sweepstakes in a capital reserve fund to drill an artesian well for the use of the school.
- 11. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for repairs and maintenance of the East Washington school building.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

It is a pleasure for me to present my eleventh annual report for your consideration:

Federal

It certainly is obvious to any property owner living in the State of New Hampshire, that the efforts of local school districts to provide educational opportunities to their children comparable to the demands of modern civilization, that education is an expensive commodity.

Education is no longer a little red school house operation as it was at the turn of the century. On the national level expenditures for education are second only to the Department of Defense with highways running a close third. Defense has always been a responsibility of the federal government. Since 1956 it has assumed 90% of the cost of the nation's major highway construction program. Is it time for state and local governmental units to look to the federal government for financial support for education in an attempt to ease the local tax burden? I know that some who read this will rise in horror at the thought and your judgments are respected, but this report is not an attempt to gather support for federal aid to education, but rather to advise you that it is already here in a small way and is destined to increase. Schools in this supervisory union are now receiving federal aid to: (1) support home economics teachers' salaries; (2) subsidize the noon lunch program; (3) to support the guidance program; and (4) to provide equipment for the teaching of science, math and modern foreign languages.

During the school year 1964-65 this aid will be extended to the teaching of English, reading, civics, geography and history.

It would not be surprising to see the Congress at the next session break through the impass between the public and parochial schools to enact legislation which will provide federal funds for school house construction, teachers salaries, and curriculum improvements. These are some of the things that President Johnson was talking about when he recently said, "I intend to put education at the top of America's agenda."

State

For the school year 1964-65 the State of New Hampshire expects to spend 56 million dollars for public school education. The State Department of Education asked the legislature to reduce this expenditure by local tax payers by 10 million dollars in aid. Including the sweepstakes this was reduced to 71/4 million or 12.9% of the total needed.

For the school year 1965-66 it is estimated that 60 million dollars will be needed for public school education and the State Department of Education is asking that the legislature appropriate 13 million dollars or 22.9% of the local effort. When you read this I am guessing that it will have been established that the state contribution to the local effort will be less than 10 million dollars and equal to less than 15% of the need, and this will include the estimated four million from sweepstakes.

It is obvious that the state's effort is not keeping up with the expanding cost. The four million received from the sweepstakes will be less than the increased expenditures in the next fiscal yar and what happens when the expected expenditures go from 60 to 65 million in the second year of the biennium?

There are those who feel that the state has no alternative but to find some new sources of income to more nearly accept its obligations to education as well as other state services. The state has the right and the obligation to set standards by which the schools within its boundaries shall operate but with it also goes the obligation to be more realistic in its financial support of its programs.

Each year the State Department of Education establishes the tuition rates that may be charged by local school districts based on the state average per pupil cost of the previous year. I submit these as an indication that a continuation of such growth would seem prohibitive for real estate revenues to support.

The above figures do not include transportation costs or that for capital outlay (debt service and new equipment). Therefore between 75 and 100 dollars should be added to each of the above figures to obtain a more accurate picture. Yes — education is expensive, but if there is a salvation of our country, education is going to be the cause of it.

It would appear that those graduating from the Central School would be equal to the number graduating from high school next June and therefore, reducing your budget for tuition due to a lowering of the tuition rate by Hillsboro-Deering.

Our noon lunch program, which incidentally is the smallest program operating in the state, continues to be successful because of many factors. First and foremost is the willingness of the voters to financially support the program with an appropriation. Secondly, those who are responsible for its fine operation — Mrs. Wenonah Babb, the manager, and Mrs. Dora Newman, who prepares the fine meals being served. Thirdly, Mrs. Miriam O'Keefe makes it possible for the program to serve milk by picking up the next day's supply and bringing it to school each evening. Last, but certainly not least, a great deal of appreciation is extended to Mr. Gilbert Williams at the Upper Village Store for his many

kindnesses in procuring and storing commodities for the program at little or no profit. We are also aided to a considerable extent by donations of food products from the federal government and receive a subsidy of five cents for each meal served from them.

Over the past few years we have been troubled by a water shortage situation at the school. We read of a continuing reduction of the water level in this country. It has been suggested that it may be time to give consideration to drilling an artesian well for the use of the school district and the town.

Again I wish to express my appreciation to all of the Citizens of Washington for their fine cooperation in the operation of their school.
