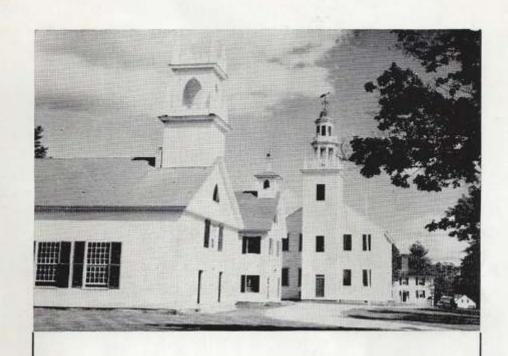

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

- Art. 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one member of the Library Committee for three years, one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of the Planning Board for five years, and any other Town Officers.
- Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$640.85 and accept State Aid of \$4,272.33.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used by the Town History Committee, to hear reports or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling of black top roads.

- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease from the East Washington, N. H. Improvment Association its firehouse, so-called, for the purpose of housing the Town and State fire trucks and equipment, for a term of (10) ten years beginning on April 1, 1966, for an annual rental of one dollar (\$1.00), provided, however, that under the terms of the lease the Town shall properly maintain the firehouse, insure it against loss or damage by fire, and pay the taxes and cost of heating and lighting it.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to black top the drive by the Town buildings and between the Center School and the Town Hall.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to black top the roads from Rt. 31 on both sides of the Band Stand and to the foot of the hill by the home of Alfred Tandy.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase and installation of six (6) dry hydrants, three (3) to be located in Washington, and three (3) to be located in East Washington.
- Art. 14 To see if the Town will accept, as a gift, the Band Stand in Washington Center.
- Art. 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise and re-appropriate \$1,392.06 to paint the Town Hall.
- Art. 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to support the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- Art. 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Band Concerts.
- Art. 18 To see if the Town will vote to raise and re-appropriate the balance of \$1,035.00 to improve the Washington Center Cemetery.

- Art. 19 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build and equip a Fire Station and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary balance.
- Art. 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build and equip an addition on the Town Garage and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary balance.
- Art. 21 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to remodel the toilets in the Town Hall or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 22 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to remodel the tiolets in the Town Hall.
- Art. 23 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on long term notes. (\$1,500) Fifteen hundred dollars is due on the truck.
- Art. 24 To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money and transfer to Capital Reserve for permanent bridges.
- Art. 25 To see if the Town will appropriate the 1965 balance for Forest Fires for the purchase of Radio equipment.
- Art. 26 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Librarian and Trustees - 1965

Circulation from the 2,943 volumes in the Library and the 2,026 books from the Bookmobile was 4,237 this year. Last year our Library had the third highest per capita circulation, 26.1 books per person, of all libraries in New Hampshire compared with the state average of 6.7; and was tenth in per capita expenditures of \$5.83 per person compared to \$2.32 for the state.

In February, after applying to the State Library Commission, Shedd Free Library became an Affiliated Library under the Statewide Library Development Program and received as its first benefit, \$125.00 worth of valuable reference books from the State Library through funds provided by the Federal Library Services Act. In March, Preston Rolfe was elected by the Trustees to be the representative to the Southwest District Advisory Council which meets quarterly in Keene with 44 neighboring libraries. This is one of four such Councils whose function is to make recommendations thru the State Librarian to the State Library Commission in operating the Statewide Library Development System created by the Legislature to "provide more effective and economical library service . . . without impairing the principals of self help and local control."

At the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association in October at Concord, Preston Rolfe was elected a member of the Executive Board of that organization.

During the year, 24 youth books and 23 adult books were donated to the library. In November, a Book Fair sponsored by the librarian and the school teacher was held during American Book Week at the Center School. Remember, the Library is open from 2:30 to 4:30 in the afternoon and from 7:00 to 9:00 in the evening every Wednesday and everyone is invited to use its facilities.

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much drier than normal year, but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

We must all be careful:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish, preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 p. m.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread the fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

It is a pleasure for me to present my twelfth annual report for your consideration.

Federal

Prognostication, particularly in this era of rapid change is, at its best, a dangerous pastime as any weather man will attest. However in my occupation, as in several others, keeping abreast of the times requires this activity, using the best available information to

formulate a prediction.

Last year, in my report, I was only half right when I predicted that Congress would pass legislation for certain activities. I based my assumption on the apparent necessity for States and local school districts to receive aid to curtail rising local assessments. Congress did pass the now well known "Elementary and Secondary Education Act" which included financial support. They did not, however, provide for any financial support of existing educational programs. Congress, whether right or wrong, accepted the proposal made by our present leaders that education in this country was not keeping up with the scientific and technical advancements of society and thereby creating sociological and economical problems. The result of this thinking was P.L. 89:10 with its five titles. I will deal with only titles one and two inasmuch as those are the only ones with which we are directly involved this year.

Title One contributes funds on the basis of the number of low income families in the town to provide some kind of educational service not now existing or the expansion of a present program. Under the statutes this program has to be aimed at the financially and educationally deprived youngster and the amount of money available to each community is based on the number of those people residing in the town. It would appear that there is a small number of qualifying families in the area which results in extremely small funds available to our area communities. In some instances this could result in a community not implementing a Title One program.

Title Two is not a poverty program, but one of outright grants, established to upgrade the library resources available in Supervisory Union No. 24. All materials purchased under this grant remain the property of the Supervisory Union and each school is used as a depository for these materials. Books and other materials may, and should be, transferred from one school to another within the Union

as a need arises.

I make no attempt to defend or criticize federal aid to education. P.L. 89:10 is but one of the many programs financed by the federal government. Some of its programs I like and some I dislike with a passion. However, since federal grants are available the dis-

trict should make a determination as to whether it should utilize such funds as may be available to it.

State

Earmarked sources of revenue are not always what they are cracked up to be. Such is the case with the Sweepstakes. Last year we were advised to prepare our budgets on the basis of \$3,600,000 State Income. With an assist from the federal government, we received slightly over 50% of that amount. Now I realize that all small contributions should be gratefully received, but when the legislature provides for education what would appear to cover the increased cost of education in the state for one year and a little over half of that amount is received, what happens? The local taxpayer has to make up the difference and that is just what you did last year.

The 1967 legislature will be faced with seeking new sources of revenue. Unfortunately, it seems to be a good gimmick to tie any form of taxation to support for education. This should not be done. All revenue should go to the general fund and financial support for

the various state services obtained from this source.

Again I submit the State Department of Education's figures for the State average per pupil cost on which tuition charges are based. You will recall that these do not include expenditures for transportation, debt service or new equipment.

Some school districts in the state with the use of a state approved formula have indicated that their tuition charges for 1966-67

will be over \$600 with one as high as \$670.

I suspect that these increased costs have done much to encourage school districts to study the possibility of joining with other districts in their educational endeavors. Again this year new Regional School Districts will come into being and some will be voted on at the March meetings.

This area again is being involved in a study. This time Henniker, Weare, Hillsboro-Deering, Antrim and Bennington have been invited to study the possibility of a cooperative venture. Something of this nature will probably be the eventual outcome, but whether

acceptable to the citizens of this area at this time is dubious.

The school district was fortunate in being able to obtain the service of Mrs. Isabel Nichols this year to teach music one day a week. A trained instructor in this area has been wonderful and is appreciated by the regular teachers and children alike.

The 1966-67 budget shows a moderate increase over the previous year. This is due to a considerable extent to the increase in tuition cost. This item is growing by leaps and bounds in some districts in the state as previously mentioned. However, your attendance districts Hillsboro-Deering and Newport have kept rates below the state average. They are Hillsboro-Deering \$475 and Newport \$520. You may be interested to note that Washington finds itself in

You may be interested to note that Washington finds itself in a very favorable position in comparative tax rates for school purposes. In 1965 it cost the taxpayer of Washington \$6.03 per thousand of equalized valuation as compared with a state average of \$15.56 per thousand.

The above could only point out that Washington should take a very close look at any formula which may be presented should they become involved, sometime in the future, with a Cooperative or Regional study. There are many studies going on and the movement will continue to grow but it would appear the Area Concept would

be more advantageous to Washington should it become necessary for Washington to become involved in any Cooperative study.

It has been a smooth year of operation in Washington this year and much credit for this goes to the school board, teachers and citizens who have helped in our educational endeavors. I deeply appreciate their cooperation and understanding.
