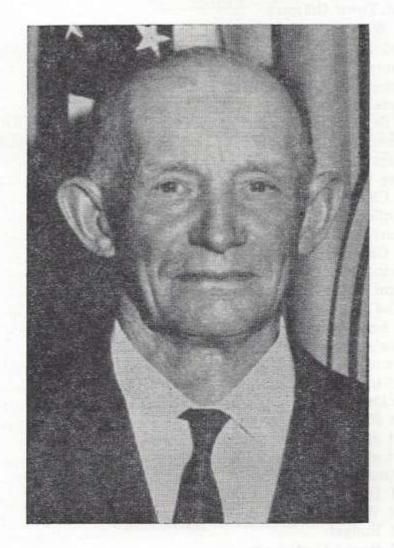

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

- Art. 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one member of the Library Committee for three years, one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of the Planning Board for five years and any other Town Officers.
- Art. 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$704.89 and accept State Aid of \$4,699.27 for Town Road Aid.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will accept as a gift a '49 Mack Fire Truck from the Washington Fire Dept.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500. and re-appropriate balance of Forest Fire account for Dry Hydrants.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay long term notes outstanding.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100. to support the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300. to purchase two State Police Band Radios for the Police Dept.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Permanent Bridges.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Highway Equipment.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following recommendations of the Planning Board concerning roads in developments or subdivisions:

No road shall be accepted by the Town unless it meets the following minimum standards: A right of way of 50 ft.; a roadway width of 24 ft., at least 12 inches of gravel on a stabilized base; culverts, where necessary not less than 12 inches in diameter; and all necessary ditches to provide proper drainage. The Selectmen shall be responsible for seeing that these standards are met.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of Highway Equipment and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the necessary balance on long term notes.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from Capital Reserve all of the money for Highway Equipment.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a public highway Washington Drive, so-called, running north-easterly from the road from Washington to East Washington through the development known as Washington Lake Estates, and to accept as a gift from said Washington Lake Estates a deed conveying about fifteen acres of land and a gravel pit on said Washington to East Washington Road, subject to such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may determine, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase a typewriter for the Town Clerk.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a new Toilet System in the Town Hall.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the road from the Lempster road to the Thistle building site.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to adjust the wages of Town Officers and employes.

Art. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Librarian and Trustees 1968

Circulation from the 2,917 volumes in the library and the 2,008 volumes from the Keene Bookmobile, totaled 5,397 or 847 more than last year. As one of the 191 libraries in the Statewide Library Development Program we received a grant of \$100 for the purchase of reference books and as one of the 178 libraries in the N. H. Cooperative Book Buying Program we received discounts when we purchased books.

We received a gift of 10 "large print" books from the State Library purchased with Federal funds for aid to the physically handicapped, and were given 48 record albums by the Radio Corp. of America valued at over \$200 which can be taken from the library for playing at home. We received two reference books at the drawings at book buying meetings attended by the librarian.

A large dictionary stand was presented to the library by the Safford family in memory of Ruth Safford Twiss and Gerald Leeds gave us the new History of Keene in memory of his wife, Dorothy Leeds. Mrs. Earl Chandler of the Claremont Library who summers at Highland Lake gave the library a large number of books.

The trustees attended meetings of the N. H. Library Trustees Association at Manchester and Concord, meetings with the librarian at Sunapee and Keene, helped with typing catalog cards and are represented on the Southwest District Advisory Council of the Statewide Library Development Program and the executive board of the N. H. Library Trustees Association.

The librarian completed a 10-weeks' course in Programs and Services for Children with other librarians at Keene during April and May and another one on Basic Cataloging during October and November, and went to nine meetings on book buying, book ordering, reference work and book mending at Keene and Sunapee. For these activities that contribute to improving our library, the librarian was reimbursed for the nearly 2,000 miles of travel at eight cents per mile as they were all conducted outside of regular library hours including 20 evening classes.

Remember that your library is open every Wednesday afternoon from two to four and every Wednesday evening from seven to nine and everyone is invited to make use of its services.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted match is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn—
- a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal braziers in your own back yard are permitted on notification of the warden.
- b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.
- c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.

4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

FIRE STATION COMMITTEE

1968 Report

Work on the new fire station started in 1968 by opening the front of the building that had been boarded up during the winter and cleaning out the interior so that a contractor could pour and finish the 40 by 48 foot floor on April 13th. Later an electrician installed fluorescent lights and wiring. The first 10 by 10 foot overhead door was installed April 21st, and by May 5th, the two other doors were in place so the two fire trucks could be moved from the crowded Town Garage. On June 23rd, the long job of clapboarding was started and finally completed by Sept. 29 with the surface all primed and ready for a final coat of paint when warmer weather arrives.

In the meantime the Washington Fire Department entered a bid for the city of Concord's surplus 750-gallon Mack pumping engine backed by \$200 of their own funds and a temporary \$800 loan from a resident, and on July 5th, received it for their high bid of \$1,025. The loan was repaid by October from funds raised by suppers, donations by residents and non-residents and other activities and the \$15,000 modern piece of apparatus was housed in the new fire station at no cost to the town.

In October, gravel was hauled to provide parking on the west side of the station. Early in November the oil fired, ceiling mounted heating furnace was started and will maintain the 65 degree temperature required by the Underwriter's regulations. The wall and ceiling insulation, sheetrock walls, and suspended ceiling were completed in January and February. On Jan. 26, the 7½ h.p. siren was mounted on the roof as well as a similar one on the East Washington Fire Station where they will serve as both fire and Civil Defense warning systems.

When the interior and exterior painting is completed, the town should be very proud of its 40 by 48 foot heated fire station housing three pieces of fire apparatus, with a 26 by 15 foot room for meetings and a 12 by 15 foot room for use by the police department. Built at a cost of about \$8500, the building could have cost \$18,000 if the hours of volunteer work by firemen and others had not been contributed.

 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating hereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the district for the school year 1969-70.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

For the past few years my reports have attempted to look to the future on the local, state and national level. My prognostications have been reasonably accurate and I probably should continue to press my luck and continue the same format. However, I do not now have the large number of contacts at the state level that I enjoyed while I held office in the School Administrators Association and with changes in the party holding the top offices at both the state and federal level anything that I could predict would be pure "guesstimate" and highly lacking in merit. Therefore, this year, I will confine my report to the local level and I shouldn't find it too difficult to provide a bit of food for thought and hopefully some reaction. The one exception follows:

I always have a hard time getting people concerned about proposed legislation and regulations at the state level. Reaction after the fact has been more than adequate, but of course, was of little value. The State Board of Education has, in the study stage, regulations, which if adopted, would make a tremendous impact on your school system. The legislative "hopper" is filled with resolutions pertaining to education which if enacted would have a very drastic effect, not only on your school system, but on your school budget as well. Citizens who have a concern in these areas, and I know they are legion, should at least request their representatives to the General Court to keep them advised of proposed school legislation and then, after thoughtful consideration, advise their representatives of their feelings and if possible attend the hearings on the proposed bills. If there is no reaction among the citizenry, the legislature cannot help but assume that the proposal is acceptable to them. If there is no reaction prior to the passage of a bill or regulation, then there should be none when the time for implementation arrives.

Like the annual sugar harvest, the Washington School District has had its good years and it has had its bad years. Last year was a good year. So far, this has been a bad year. However, at this writing things are looking up. Will the situation improve or will it worsen?

Frankly, I don't look for much improvement until such time as the state's supply of teachers is measurably increased. Of course, one always lives with the hope that a competent staff can be obtained and retained so that a few consecutive years of quality education can be offered, but at least fifteen years of history gives an indication that this is probably not going to happen.

Being a little old country boy at heart I can fully appreciate the desire of the majority of the voters in Washington to retain their school but if I were a parent I would feel the need to do a bit of soul searching to determine if the Washington School, with its multiple grades, can offer the quality of educational opportunities that is needed, and obtainable in a larger system, with one teacher per grade. You, the citizens have to make that decision.

Elsewhere in this report is a list of the high school pupils from Washington and the schools which they are attending. Over the years high school pupils from Washington have entered the school of their choice and have readily been accepted. There has been no need for any contractural agreement between the sending and receiving districts. This situation appars to be changing somewhat over the state due to the tuition which may be charged a sending district. Receiving districts find that the tuition rates established by the state are based on the actual expenditures two years previous and capital expenditures not included. With the extremely high rate of increase in the per pupil cost, receiving districts find themselves educating another community's children for about one hundred dollars less than the actual cost. We have seen instances in recent years where some school districts have cut off all tuition pupils because of this problem. It is not expected to happen in the case of Washington in the near future but as conditions continue to change there is that possibility.

It may now be time for Washington to look into the two avenues open to them by statutes which will provide long range guarantees of educational opportunities for their High School pupils. I would highly recommend that Washington establish a committee to investigate the advantages and disadvantages of them becoming a part of an area or cooperative school district and report back at the next annual meeting.

We are grateful for the cooperation received by this office; it is truly appreciated.

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Perhaps the least debatable thing one can say about education today is that schools cost money. There is little in the future to indicate very strongly that this will not be the case for sometime to come. Obviously this poses problems for the School District. These problems appear in many aspects of the school system. First of all is the issue of teachers' salaries. It now appears that the average starting salary in the State next year will be in the neighborhood of \$6,000. This represents an increase of about \$500, over the current year. For this School District this means that if it is going to attract teachers it is going to have to greatly exceed this average. Young people coming out of our colleges and going into teaching are concerned about the starting salary. However, this is only one facet. They also look at the kinds of fringe benefits offered and the conditions under which they have to work. By fringe benefits I refer to such things as insurance programs, sick and emergency leave, opportunity for school visitations, payment for courses taken and the salary opportunity and future afforded by the school system. They also look carefully at the assignment they are going to have, the number of students, the extra duties and such. Thus, if we are to remain in a competitive position it will be necessary to make provision for similar opportunities for teachers employed in this system.

Aside from the issue of salaries is the equipment and materials a teacher has to work with. Because our teachers do take more courses and because they are quite aware of new techniques and materials they do desire those kinds of things that will help them in the proper performance of their jobs. The day when all one needed was a textbook and a workbook is over. In fact, the textbook is a tool that is being supplemented, and even replaced in some instances, with new visual materials, resource materials, equipment that the students as well as the teacher can use, and a variety of programs designed for individual methods of instruction. It is necessary that a variety of materials be made available for instructional purposes so that each child can receive the kind of education that meets his individual purposes.

The point of this is to say to you that if the Washington School is to remain, and if it is to provide a reasonable form of education, then it is going to require the kinds of expenditures noted in the preceding paragraphs to bring this about. For example, each classroom should be equipped with overhead projectors and screens, provision should be made for

educational television, a tape recorder for instructional purposes would be a great asset and the collection of textbooks needs to be supplemented with the variety of materials necessary for them to be used in the most effective manner possible. I am not suggesting that this needs to be done in one year, but I am suggesting that a planned program of acquisition needs to be established whereby these items may eventually be secured.

The problems of teaching in a multi-graded school are many. The many preparations a teacher has to make, the planning for the needs of each individual and the keeping up with the normal routines is not an easy task. If we add to this the time needed to develop materials and prepare them for classroom use we find that the task is just that much more difficult. It will become more difficult rather than easier as time goes by, because of the increased knowledge we have about children and how they learn, the need to keep one's self abreast of the times and the need to translate all of this into a workable program for the school.

The point of all of this is to say to you that we want to give you as good a school as the circumstances will allow. This will not be easy. The problem of recruiting and retaining faculty members will continue to plague us. The costs of education are going to remain high and perhaps get higher before we see a leveling off. Thus, it becomes an issue as to what you want for your children. And, are you willing to pay the price?
