TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will open at 10:30 a.m. and not close before 4:30 p.m. to elect Town Officers. The following articles will be acted upon:

Article 1. To elect by nonpartisan ballot a Moderator, a Supervisor of the Checklist, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one Trustee of the Library for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, two members of the Planning Board for three years each and any other Town Officers. Also, to vote on the referendum questions on the ballot regarding a three-man Board of Assessors for the Town pursuant to R.S.A. 41:2c and adoption of a Dog Control Law pursuant to R.S.A. 466:30-a.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to repair that portion of the road, previously discontinued subject to gates and bars, from the Marlow-Ashuelot Pond Road to the Gordon Davis land, including a bridge across the Ashuelot River and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to build the bridge and improve the road as described under Article 2, and take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Permanent Bridges.

Carried Article 5. To hear a report from the Road Agent relative to plowing Valley Road, so-called, and to take any action in relation thereto.

Particle 6. To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to a proposal amending the present Gravel Pit Lease between the Town and Hilman Blakney.

Carried Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a sander body for the Highway Department.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year and to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Highway Projects in the ensuing year and to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise 5/0,000 and transfer to Capital Reserve for the purchase of New Highway Equipment.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$703.56; appropriate the sum of \$6.07 from the accumulated balance of T.R.A. Funds since 1973 in Surplus; and to accept State Aid of \$4,690.37 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a setoff against the principal payment of one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400.00.

Article 12. To see what action the Town will take relative to acquiring additional property adjacent to the Town Garage and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for same and to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to expend any money that may be forthcoming from the Public Works Employment Act, Anti-

recession Title II, on the following projects:

Carrel 2 Washington Late Triber at Millen Pond Dam. 2. Washington Lake Estates Road Corner 1500 feet beyond Island Pond Dam

Assumed 3. East Washington Road Corner at "Kingsbury Hill" Camp Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty-seven dollars (\$257.00) as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the natural attractions of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region and encouraging vacation travel in the region.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred seventy-six dollars (\$276.00) as the Town's

share of the annual operating expenses of the Council.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred sixty-six dollars (\$466.00) to be paid to the Millen Lake Association, Inc. as a 50% reimbursement for the cost of the appraisal of the Camp Morgan Property or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 17. To see what action the Town will take with regards to the acquisition of Camp Morgan; to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for this purpose or to take any other action in relation thereto. \$ 1,000 on 190 acres 249,000

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate (by taxation), appropriate and authorize withdrawal of (from the Library Building Fund in Capital Reserve) and borrow by long term note, if necessary, for the construction of an addition to the Shedd Free Library. 2 6,000 2 230 William (40

Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library in the ensuing year. 3806

Article 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for the Library Building Fund.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts in the ensuing year.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to hold the 1979 and future Town Meetings in the upstairs of the Town Hall.

Article 23. To hear reports of any and all officers and agents of the Town and take any action in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to replace the present street lights with mercury vapor lights, add more lights to the system or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to construct a retention facility for stray dogs and raise and appropriate a sum of money for that purpose.

Article 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Fire Department in the ensuing year and take any other action relating thereto.

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Article 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for "turn-out" gear for the Fire Department and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad. 300+30+

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the appointment of a Deputy Town Treasurer pursuant to R.S.A. 41:29a.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the appointment of a Deputy Town Tax Collector pursuant to R.S.A. 41:38.

Article 31. To see what action the Town will take relative to the operation of the Town dump on Route 31 south.

Article 32. To see if the Town would be interested in supporting a solid waste disposal facility; either by having a compaction and separation station within the Town, or by joining with neighboring Towns to establish a regional site or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to name the various cemeteries within the Town or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 34. To see what action the Town will take relative to Perpetual Care being mandatory when purchasing a Cemetery Lot in the Town of Washington; to adopt a formal policy for enforcing this action; to set a minimum fee to be collected and to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including, but not limited to, disaster aid and Highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal, State or Private Agency or individual or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to change the amount of property insurance carried on Town Buildings or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to change the dollar amount of assets which a person or couple may own and still be eligible for elderly tax exemptions from \$35,000 to \$50,000 as provided in Chapter 226 of the 1977 Session Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$72.04 for completion of the Town Tax Map and to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 40. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of the reassessing in progress by the Board of Selectmen per vote of the 1977 Town Meeting and as directed by the New Hampshire State Board of Taxation.

Article 41. To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to 18 several major renovation projects for the Town Hall and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for said renovations and/or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 42. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the policy that the Selectmen or any other agent of the Town so authorized to spend Town money, be obligated to procure a minimum of three bids, from three qualified companies, on any project over one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or to take any other action relating thereto.

before this meeting.

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ABSTRACT OF 1977 TOWN MEETING RECORDS March 8, 1977

Article 1. Officers Elected: Town Clerk, Wenonah A. Babb; Town Treasurer, Wenonah A. Babb; Selectman for 3 years, Roland Q. Melzard; Tax Collector, Charles E. Dalphond; Fire Chief, Charles E. Dalphond; Highway Agent, Robert W. Crane; Police Chief, James F. Houghton; Auditor, Karin Jurson Fox; Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years, Cynthia Brown; Trustee of Library, Mabel Kimmel; Planning Board: for 3 years, William Rhoades; for 2 years, Preston Rolfe; for 1 year, Philip A. Barker and 1 year Alan Goodspeed.

Article 2. Moved that "we raise and appropriate the sum of \$708.00 and accept State Aid of \$4,720.55 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a set off against the principal payment of one Faxon Hill Road Long Term Note in the amount of \$5,400.00." Motion carried —

voice vote.

Article 3. Moved that "the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54,000.00 for the operation of the Highway Department for the

ensuing year." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 4. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,659.47 and appropriate the sum of \$8,340.53 from Highway Subsidy, to make a total of \$15,000.00 for Special Highway Projects." (\$3,000.00 sealing work, \$1,000.00 Millen Pond Road, \$1,000.00 Marlow side of Ashuelot Pond, \$1,000.00 East Washington Road.) Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 5. Moved "that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for the purchase and installation of a 4,000-gallon gas tank

and pump at the Town Garage." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 6. Moved "that the Town vote to expend any money that may be forthcoming from the Public Works Employment Act, Anti-Recession Title II on the following projects: 1. Millen Pond (Faxon Hill Road) guard rails on pond and road embankment; 2. Washington Lake Estates Road corner 1,500 feet beyond Island Pond Dam; 3. East Washington Road corner at "Kingsbury Hill Camp." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 7. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,300.00 and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$6,000.00 on long term notes for a workshop addition to the Town Garage." Amended: "such notes to be paid back in 2 years at \$3,000.00 per year." Discussion included availability of land and new location of garage. (Voted to table question for lunch hour.) Amendment carried — voice vote. Motion — vetoed — paper ballot (no 61, yes 48).

Article 8. Moved to dismiss - carried - voice vote. (Capital

Reserve for Permanent Bridges)

Article 9. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Highway Department to plow and sand Valley Road, so-called, a distance of approximately 2.5 miles and to accept from the Highland Lake Association, Inc. payment to be agreed upon by the Road Agent, Board of Selectmen and Highland Lake Association, Inc. for a trial period of one year." Amended: "that adequate liability and property damage insurance be furnished to the Town; that work be done on cost basis rather than by estimate, and that the portion of the road in Stoddard be only accomplished by formal agreement with said Town of Stoddard."

2nd amendment: "to add for a reasonable profit." 2nd amendment carried — voice vote. 1st amendment carried — voice vote. Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 10. Motion "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,889.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year." 1st amendment — "to decrease by \$3,000.00 (amount of legal fees) making the amount \$55,889.00." 2nd amendment — "to add \$1,000.00 to the figure to repair the Center Fire Station Roof." 2nd amendment carried — voice vote. 1st amendment carried — voice vote. Motion carried as amended to \$56,889.00 — voice vote.

Article 11. Moved "to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 12. Moved to dismiss. Motion carried - voice vote.

(Heating and insulating the second floor of the Town Hall.)

Article 13. Moved "that the Town authorize the Selectmen to contact the State Department of Revenue Administration to reassess the Town, and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to partially defray the cost of the reassessing ordered by the State Board of Taxation, and to raise and appropriate from taxes the additional sum of \$10,000.00 also to partially defray said costs of reassessing." 1st amendment: "to strike out State Department of Revenue Administration and insert Selectmen of Washington." 2nd amendment: "to delete the \$10,000.00." 1st amendment carried — voice vote. 2nd amendment carried — voice vote. Motion, as amended, carried — voice vote.

Article 14. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the support of the Fire Department for the

ensuing year." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 15. Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$1,400.00 from Revenue Sharing for paving Washington Fire Department driveway." Moved to dismiss—paper ballot. Dismissed: yes 60, no 32.

Article 16. Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from Revenue Sharing \$1,200.00 for the installation of three dry hydrants: Millen Pond, Washington Lake Estates and Marlow side of Ashuelot Pond." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 17. Moved "that the Selectmen be authorized to require and accept payment for the care of the dump from persons permitted by the Selectmen to use said dump and who are not residents or taxpayers of Washington." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 18. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year." Amended: "to read \$3,500.00, the extra \$500.00 to be used for the purchase of books." Amendment carried — voice vote.

Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 19. SHEDD FREE LIBRARY Report of Trustees and Librarian 1977

Circulation from the 4,272 books and 160 recordings in the library and the 2,531 books from the four visits of the Bookmobile totaled 6,370. This averages over 14 books per capita compared to the state average, for the 217 public libraries, of about 6 books per capita. There were 93 adult and 79 juvenile borrowers. We believe these figures indicate we really use our library.

Over \$2,000 was added to the Building Fund including over \$600 from sales in the library, over \$600 from the July 16 sale at the Town Hall, over \$90 from the sale of Bicentennial items, over \$500 in interest, and \$200 given by Mrs. Vera O'Neil in memory of her parents Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Adams who once lived in the house now owned

by Mrs. Koch.

6,416 square feet of land eight feet deep was acquired from Earl and Zaida Cilley, to allow room for an addition at the back of the library. This required a variance from the Board of Adjustment, fee \$18.45. Cost of deed and filing fees \$66.50. Land \$50. Total \$134.95 which was withdrawn, leaving a balance in the building fund of over \$11,000 which added to the \$2,000 in Capital Reserve gives over \$13,000 toward the cost of an addition for which estimates are being prepared to see how much more is needed at Town Meeting to build an addition in 1978.

The Trustees and Librarian attended conferences at Concord and North Conway. The Librarian went to book meetings in Keene and Newport. Preston Rolfe served on a library trustee panel at a N.H. Municipal Assn. conference in Durham, and represented the Library at Southwest District Advisory Council meetings in Peterboro, Antrim and Hanover.

36 books were borrowed from the State Library, UNH Library, Antrim and Newport libraries. Mrs. Raymond Allen of Southboro, Mass., whose sons went to Camp Morgan years ago, donated 496 books to the library, when she inherited books from her father's library.

The Trustees increased the Librarian's salary from \$3.50 to \$3.80 an hour effective Jan. 1, 1978 as Zaida E. Cilley has been librarian 26 years continuously since 1951 plus five years from 1939 to 1943, for a total of thirty-one years.

The cost of books keeps going up every year and averaged about \$5.77 in 1977 which meant that the special appropriation of \$500 for

books last Town Meeting provided about 86 new books.

The library is open Monday and Wednesday, 1:30 to 3:30 in the afternoon and 7 to 9 in the evening, and everyone is invited and welcome to come in and use its facilities.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester), appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in

each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Suppression costs in excess of ¼ of 1 percent of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment and supplies for suppression

and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire has enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

In Nov. 1976 Capt. Robert J. Wright, U.S. Air Force Reserve, now a selectman, applied for assignment to the Washington Civil Defense office and in Jan. 1977 was assigned under the Mobilization Designee Program (MOBDES) by the Air Reserve Personnel Center in Denver, Colorado to assist the local Civil Defense organization. Since 1972 the official designation of Civil Defense activities under the Secretary of Defense is the Defense Civil Preparedness Agency with more emphasis on preparedness against civil and natural emergencies than on nuclear attacks.

The Planning Board meets the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. They held 22 meetings in 1977 as only one meeting was held in March as Town Meeting came on the second Tuesday. By action of the 1976 Town Meeting, Planning Board members were to be elected instead of appointed. On March 8, 1977 the following were elected according to RSA 36:4; Alan Goodspeed 1 year, Philip Barker 1 year, Preston Rolfe 2 years, William Rhoades 3 years. Thereafter the term of an elected member is 3 years. Robert Wright is the Selectman ex officio member to make the 5-man Board.

Most of the work of the Board in 1977 was concerned with the Subdivision Regulations adopted Oct. 6, 1975. A summary of the 12 file numbered cases follows.

In S-76-10, G. E. Noether asked for a minor subdivision of 9.8 acres from his 14.8 acres near the dam at the outlet of Millen Pond. This was approved after a hearing on Jan. 11. Fee \$20. Costs \$17.27.

In S-76-11, Stephen Agel of Claremont wanted to subdivide 192 acres from the 206 acres he owned near Smith Pond. Since it was already divided by the Smith Pond road he did not need subdivision approval and on Jan. 11 we signed his plan for recording purposes.

In S-77-1 John Tourtellot asked for a minor subdivision of 13.1 acres from his 38.9 acres on Island Pond. It was approved after a

hearing Jan. 25. Fee \$20. Costs \$18.50.

In S-77-2 Judge McLaughlin asked for a minor subdivision of 13.6 acres from his 79.9 acres on Island Pond. After improving the road it was approved after a hearing Nov. 22. Fee \$30. Costs \$24.45.

In S-77-3 Hillman Blakney asked for a minor subdivision of 6 acres from his 114 acre homestead on the Mtn. Road in East Washington. This was approved after a hearing July 20. Fee \$20. Costs \$19.73.

In S-77-4 Rudolph Klauder asked for a minor subdivision of 9.5 acres from his 58 acre homestead on the East Washington Road. This

was approved after a hearing July 12. Fee \$20. Costs \$20.96.

In S-77-5 Earl and Zaida Cilley wished to annex 6,413 sq. feet of land to the Town for the construction of an addition to the Shedd Free Library. An annexation waiver was approved. The fee was waived as the action concerned town land.

In S-77-6 Geo. McGuerty asked for a minor subdivision of 2.01 acres (with dwelling) from his 42.5 acres located on the Half Moon Pond Road. This was approved after a hearing Sept. 27. Fee \$20. Costs \$22.19.

In S-77-7 James Conner asked for a minor subdivision of 19 acres from his 28.1 acres near Russell Mill Pond on the Ashuelot River near Marlow. This was approved after a hearing Oct. 11. Fee \$20. Costs \$22.19.

In S-77-8 Henry and James Von Rosenvinge of Francestown who were going to purchase the Highland Haven development appeared Sept. 27 to see if they needed approval for a major subdivision. They learned that they could continue the development as filed in the Sullivan County Registry. They hope later to get approval to subdivide the remainder into perhaps six-acre lots.

In S-77-9 a representative of Ken and George Parker appeared Oct. 11 for a preliminary discussion of subdividing to make their lots conform to our zoning regulations as they do not conform at the present

time.

In S-77-10 Ludwig Paul wished to annex 1.56 acres of his land in East Washington to the Town for enlarging the East Washington Cemetery. Annexations do not require a hearing and an annexation waiver was approved Oct. 11. The fee was waived as the action concerned town land.

The Board feels it is our legal obligation to look into the question of the Town acquiring the 200-acre Camp Morgan land as open land and not let it go to developers even though at the last Town Meeting the article on this was rejected. Gale Bennet came before the Board on May 25 and urged us to pursue the matter and offered to help. We got more information through Philip Barker and Rob Wright. Ferdinand Johnson, president of the Millen Lake Association, appeared Aug. 23 to ask us to work on this. On Sept. 13 Gale Bennet reported the YMCA's

appraisal was \$160,000 as a camp and \$230,000 as a development. We learned from Philip Barker's inquiries that the approved Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR) appraisal could be made by R. Daigle Associates for \$600 to \$800. On Sept. 22, Barker, Wright and Rolfe met with Ferdinand Johnson at Ken Brighton's and Mr. Johnson thought the Millen Lake Assn. would donate the funds with the hope that the Town would reimburse them for half of it in March. The YMCA was invited to observe the appraisal and they gave permission for it to start Oct. 12. On Oct. 25 we accepted the Y's invitation to meet with their committee Nov. 14 at Worcester and present our appraisal figure. On Nov. 8 we received the appraisal figure of \$276,500. The cost was \$932 with an additional \$260 for a timber appraisal by Allan Plumb. The Millen Lake Assn. paid the \$932 bill and a donation by Rolfe paid the \$260 with the hope that others would help with donations. Barker and Wright took the figures to Worcester Nov. 14. The Y wanted to retain their 5 camps and the land on that side of the lake and wanted to know how this would affect the appraisal and what it would cost to have it done. We wrote them Nov. 22 that they could keep the cottages but only about 16 acres of land near them as the remaining 41 acres below McNeils was needed for open space, and the estimated cost of revising the appraisal was \$100 to \$150. They wrote Dec. 14 that they thought we should pay half the cost and we replied Jan. 11 we have no funds for such an item. Since then we have learned that they wish the appraisal revised and will pay for it. This is where the matter stands at the writing of this report.

We checked that G. L. Gettings, Inc. of Nashua, who acquired the Martin lot development beyond Jagers in April, would follow the development filed at the Sullivan County Registry of Deeds before

subdivision regulations went into effect.

We agreed with the selectmen that the drive into the Washington Mfg. Co. Historic Site should be graveled. We will look into the question of preserving the artifacts now at the site.

Barker and Rolfe attended two of the N.H. Municipal Assn.

lectures on N.H. law at Bow on October 4 and 18.

On Oct. 25 at the request of Robert L. Ward, Regional Planner of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council (the regional planning commission), the Board reviewed the Regional Land Use Plan: Future Land Use Map. We indicated that the east shore of Island Pond should be classified as Community Transition Land Use because of the shoreline seasonal development, and returned the map.

Today new state and local regulations make a lot of work for planning boards and it is our duty to protect the best interests of the Town as we comply with these regulations and that is our intention at

all times.

REPORT ON THE REGION ASSOCIATION 1977 Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association

New Hampshire is divided into six regions to provide information to people who want to visit or vacation here. They are the White Mountain Region, Lakes Region, Monadnock Region, Merrimack Valley Region, Seacoast Region and Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Each has an association to attract tourists and receive a share of state funds. We are in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association along with 35 neighboring towns, each having one councilor. The operating costs are met by contributions from the member towns and by a state grant

that is figured on the town contributions.

As the agency encouraging visitors to our part of the state who pay rooms and meals taxes, the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association helped directly to make our share of the rooms and meals tax for 1977 amount to \$2,397. To help meet the cost of operating this agency, they are asking our town to contribute \$257 to add to the contributions of the other member towns. This could be considered an investment with a nine to one return. Although no rooms and meals taxes are levied in our town, we share in those paid in our region. For this reason it seems we should be willing to share in the costs of running the regional association that helps attract more people who pay more rooms and meals taxes of which we receive a share.

It seems that the \$257 contribution could be considered a good

investment for the town and ought to be made.

REPORT ON REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION 1977 Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council

The Town continued membership in the regional planning commission now called the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. There are 20 member towns with 47 directors. Each town has two directors although since Thomas Heavey moved we have only one as none has been appointed to take his place. Our director attended five meetings in Lebanon, Croydon, Enfield, Newport and Hanover, and a meeting in Campton for all directors in the state. He served on the Land Use Advisory Committee (LUPAC) which met eight times in Lebanon or Newport, a group which helped prepare a Regional Land Use Plan which will be used to guide the planning for the towns in the region through the next 20 years, to the year 2000, in conformance with state and Federal requirements.

Our town's share of the funds required to operate the regional commission based on our population of 400 is \$276 for 1978. We should make this investment in planning to have its many services vailable to our Town Planning Board and town officials, and have a lote in the planning activities which affect us and our neighboring towns. There are so many regulations that affect town planning that we need to participate in this organization that can help us comply in the most beneficial way to our town. This would be a good investment in planning for our town.

TOWN HISTORY REPORT 1977

On the morning of Saturday, Feb. 26, we picked up the first 500 copies (1,040 lbs.) of the new town history, "Portrait Of A Hill Town—A History Of Washington, New Hampshire, 1876-1976," at the printers, the Village Press in Concord, and brought the long-awaited book, which we really started working on 17 years ago in 1960, to town. Containing 571 pages, 215 illustrations, index, three maps, two fold-out maps, end papers (1976 map), color frontispiece and dust jacket, it was a beautiful book that reads like a story and is a credit to its authors, Ronald and Grace Jager. That afternoon from 2:30 to 4, a Publication Party was held at the Town Hall. Attended by some 200 people who picked up 118 histories already reserved for them, they enjoyed mulled cider, punch or coffee as the authors autographed copies and 21 more books were sold.

On March 7, \$5,770 collected for 360 old histories and \$6,970 for 391 new ones, totaling \$12,740, was paid to the town. This, added to the loan appropriation of \$7,556 at the Town Meeting, March 8, provided enough to pay the following: cost of printing 1,000 copies (962 final number) and binding 500 of them, \$18,996; expenses of Jagers, \$1,300; totaling \$20,296. On May 12, the remaining 462 copies, having been bound, were picked up at the New Hampshire Bindery in Concord at a cost of \$1,142.

The amount of money appropriated for a town history over the years was: 1960, \$100; 1963, \$100; 1964, \$100; 1965, \$100; 1966, \$100; 1967, \$450; 1973, \$500; 1974, \$500; 1975, \$1,500; 1976, \$5,000; 1977 \$7,556; totaling \$16,006. While only the last two amounts were asked for as loans, the committee believes we should return the whole amount, so that when all histories are sold they will actually have cost the town nothing. As books are sold, the money is put into a separate savings account for each history to draw interest until sizable amounts are returned to the town. As of Dec. 31, 1977, these accounts are as follows:

If we combine the balance of \$1,293.09 in the town savings account (see town accounts) with the \$2,200 repaid from the sale of books and the \$619.27 balance (both above), there is only about \$11,894 of the \$16,006 remaining to be repaid.

The inventory of the two town histories shows that of the 604 old

histories printed, 396 have been distributed and 208 remain which would return about \$4,160 when sold. Of the 926 new ones received from the printer, 536 have been distributed and the 426 left would return about \$9,372 for a total of about \$13,532, which means when the books are all sold we won't owe the town anything for the money that was loaned, which was our original goal. This is in spite of the fact that the cost of the new history went from \$10,350 for 400 pages to \$20,138 for 571 pages, and that we added some \$3,450 for the 1960 to 1975 amount to be repaid. We are happy this is going to come out this way even though we have learned from others that it takes about 10 years to close out an edition of a town history.

TOWN TAX MAP 1977

Following Town Meeting the Selectmen asked the Tax Map Coordinator if he could complete the tax map before the Jan. 1, 1980 deadline since the mandatory property reappraisal ordered by the State Board of Taxation requires a completed tax map to back up the reappraisal before it will be approved. The Tax Map Coordinator did not feel that he could do this, so a proposal by T. W. Chesly of Northwood, who has prepared tax maps of Northwood and Deerfield, to complete a tax map by July 1, 1978 at a cost of \$16,800 (\$19,800 less \$3,000 credit for work already done) was accepted and a contract signed April 15. It called for an immediate payment of \$750 to cover new aerial photos, etc. and payments in December, March and July. The Tax Map Coordinator was to continue to represent the Town, and has obtained plans and descriptions of some 20 parcels covering over 600 acres from subdivision work, and some 26 parcels covering over 3,000 acres from other sources. This has involved travel to Keene, Northwood, Antrim, Newport, Plymouth and Troy covering 955 miles at 15 cents per mile, \$239.10; 216 hours at \$3.50 per hour, \$671.77; Social Security, \$44.23; total, \$955.10. Total tax map expenditures since 1973 to date: maps, photos and supplies, \$1,410; salary, \$2,053.62; travel, \$489.94; Social Security, \$123.88; total, \$4,077.44. \$3,000 of this was credited on the new tax map contract and the Town still has 400 scale topographic maps and 400 scale 1953 and 1975 aerial photos, total cost of \$1,210, which are available for many Town uses.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The 1977-78 school year has seen progress made in several significant areas. We have continued the two teacher, two teacher aide setup. With the same teachers and aides returning this year, all four were more familiar with students and their individual needs. Mr. Estren has been working on a project to identify math skills to be achieved at the primary level. Mrs. Murdough has been working on a program of individualized reading instruction at the intermediate level. In both cases we will be better prepared to offer students a learning

experience at their own learning level.

Real progress has been made this year in the areas of music, art and physical education. After being without a music teacher for eight years, we have reinstituted formal music instruction. Mr. Dale Pyer teaches music and provides an opportunity for individualized instrumental instruction. Ms. Diane Bodholt is an art teacher and art director of many years' experience. Her job involves both teaching art in each classroom and the development of materials, ideas and curriculum for our full-time teachers. In the case of both music and art, student interest and enthusiasm is evident. The physical fitness committee has been working towards the development of a coordinated program. Presently, we are applying for a Federal grant to implement the H.O.P.E. program in the Washington school. The report of the Physical Fitness Committee is included elsewhere in the town report. The School Board wishes to thank them for helping us to focus on the area of physical education and take some action on it.

The board was pleased to be able to reinstitute the annual Memorial Day observance by the community and students last spring. We thank Mr. Jerry Blanchard and Hubert Williams for their support in this area. We were also pleased to receive as a gift to the district a memorial flag for Mr. Warren Hayford Jr., a Washington graduate, which will be flown during the summer months in his memory.

Several changes within the Washington school are noteworthy this year. Supt. of Schools Watman and Asst. Supt. Nagy have for the first time arranged regularly scheduled teacher meetings with our two full-time teachers after school hours. There are also observations and evaluations done during school hours to assist the teachers. The board is pleased to see this evidence of interest in the quality of education in the Washington Center School at the Supervisory Union level. The district is also getting supportive services in the areas of accounting, teacher evaluation, needs assessments, goal setting, testing services and general school administration. We can now state that the taxpayers of Washington are getting a positive return for their tax dollars invested in Supervisory Union #24.

The Washington board is also becoming increasingly involved in union decision making, through committee work and especially in the selection process of the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent. In November the Washington board hosted the annual fall meeting of the Supervisory Union Board at a dinner in The Town House, prepared

by Elizabeth Wood and the members of the P I.O.

There are several areas of School Board concern that should be mentioned in this report. Central to all these is the problem of a constantly growing school enrollment. This year we had a 9% increase in student enrollment and we anticipate a 14% increase next year. This will place an intolerable strain on our two overcrowded classrooms and we are recommending a third classroom in the Grange room of the Town House. There will be Warrant Articles to deal with the related problems of storage space and a recreational area. Because of the lengthy bus routes, we have contracted with one family for the parents to provide transportation for their child. This solution may be used more extensively in the future as it avoids lengthening the bus routes and saves the district money.

The legal ramifications of Federal Law 97-142, mandating appropriate educational programs for handicapped children, raise questions of cost burdens, etc., which are likely to remain unresolved for some time. Legal counsel has been sought regarding this issue and it is likely

that legal advice will be increasingly helpful in the future.

We have established a contracted tutorial program with Pooh Corner School for this year for one school-age child, and are continuing the readiness program established last year by Mrs. Hofford and Mr. Estren. Children participate in the readiness program tuition free, and nontuition kindergarten instruction is also provided to one of our legal-age children. The close relationship between the Pooh Corner School and the Center School is most beneficial to the district's children and we are pleased to have this educational facility to call upon. We congratulate Pooh Corner and Ellen Hofford for the article which appeared in the December 1977 issue of "Early Years Magazine." The board has received during the past year legal advice concerning the readiness and kindergarten programs in the district.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE to the Citizens of the Washington, N.H., School District

This year the superintendent and the board established goals for both the superintendent's office and the board to accomplish over the school year. The superintendent's office has already taken steps to adjust its administrative procedures and capabilities to best facilitate the accomplishment of these goals and is planning to report its record of successes and failures in next year's message. It is expected that goal-setting will be a regular part of the superintendent's annual plan in the years to come, as will an annual report on the goals set.

This year's goals are as follows:

Superintendent's Office

I. TOP PRIORITY GOALS

- To ensure that all district's administrative priority goals are worked toward in a consistent and effective manner.
- To ensure that a system of principal evaluation is developed and implemented.
- To develop an operational administrative manual and to see that its provisions are carried out.
- To develop and implement an effective needs assessment for each district and the union.
- To develop and implement standardized budgetary procedures and to present each board with a superintendent budget proposal.
- To ensure that each board and all administrators receive complete up-to-date and accurate financial reconciliations.
- To investigate and report to the boards on the feasibility of programmed budgeting procedures.
- To provide each board with complete agendas, including necessary supportive information.
- To develop job descriptions for all Supervisory Union #24 office staff and to work toward the development of written procedures for all major staff tasks.
- To ensure that a useable and complete filing system is developed in the Supervisory Union #24 office.
- To promote a Supervisory Union #24 effort at adult education and greater community-school involvement.
- To ensure that an increased effort is made at effective public relations.
- To encourage cooperative projects between districts and cooperative communications.

Washington Elementary School

I. TOP PRIORITY OBJECTIVES:

- Provide more supervision of staff, differentiating between superior, acceptable and unacceptable performances and providing staff development activities based on teacher needs and School Board goals.
- Develop and implement, in language arts and mathematics, a curriculum that allows each student to advance at his level of ability.
- Develop formal written curricula and written procedures to facilitate continuity and accountability.

The superintendent's office is currently making a major effort to get the community more involved and interested in school affairs. Two major aspects of this effort are a greater degree of reporting of school activities in local newspapers and the establishment of a Community Education Program. Procurement of CETA funds by the superintendent's office has helped greatly in regard to both of these. Another part of this effort is a Needs Assessment Program, which is providing every citizen an opportunity to voice his or her opinion on what Washington needs in regard to educational programs and facilities.

One thing the superintendent would like every citizen to be aware of is the increasing need for more educational space. Washington is growing and with it its population of school-age children. People should expect, therefore, that, in the not-too-distant future, they may be asked to consider alternative means of providing more educational space.

The Washington School Board and administration are making a conscious effort to provide expanded curriculum offerings to students, increased staff supervision, and a greater and more specific sense of direction for the school. These efforts to expand the music and art offerings, to develop an organized physical education program, to provide increasingly individualized student programs, to provide for the needs of handicapped students, etc., merit continued support.

Development of programs that are necessary in this day and age and the increasing student population are both placing burdens on the current building facilities. We hope that considerable effort can be made to study this situation in the near future. We hope that the future will bring continued cooperation and support in the development of sound educational programs for Washington's students.

REPORT OF THE WASHINGTON CENTER SCHOOL TEACHERS

During the spring, the primary class spent time studying and comparing animals of the world. This led into a discussion of the countries native to these animals, followed by further study and reports on countries around the world. On a beautiful spring day, the primary class, joined by the Pooh Corner Gang and volunteer adult leaders, went to Benson's Animal Farm in Hudson, N.H. This day was an opportunity for our children to see and experience and interact with animals from around the world. It was a truly exciting, eye-and-mind-opening experience. The trip capped off the study of months in the best way possible. It is still fresh in the minds of many children, and there are already requests to return.

September began another school year, and we attempted to maintain another ant farm, but this one was doomed as our chilly fall weather hit. But, as there is something to be learned from every experience, the children found out why the ant farm failed, and spoke about improvements for yet another attempt in the spring, with

Washington sand and ants.

The children also set up and maintained an environment for cocoons, which they observed for four or five weeks before the 30 cocoons transformed into butterflies. Watching this happen brought about great excitement. We spoke of conservation, ecology, pollution, environment, the balance of nature. The children decided to set the insects free, and this action was a beautiful sight to behold. As they watched the butterflies spiral away toward the sun I watched them spiral too.

This fall we've spent a great deal of time learning about and taking responsibility for our own good health. The children began a jogging and exercise program. A plan to adopt a movement and physical fitness program is in the works. The State Dept. of Health representative came, discussed proper dental care, and introduced a dry brushing program. The students are largely responsible for the program and they

brush as a group daily after lunch.

In addition, our nurse brought us a series of six films, called "Mulligan Stew," about nutrition and eating a balanced diet. This has been followed up with self evaluations and charts of what the children have been eating. We took a trip to the Eccardt Farm to cap off this unit. This tied in with a study unit about Community Helpers, and career awareness is currently being developed.

A lot of work went into our Christmas production of "Twas the Night Before Christmas" which was well received. The coordinated efforts of many truly came out in the wash, as 'twere, on the night of December 21st. The lights dimmed, the stage was set and as Mr. Estren retold the age-old tale of Christmas Eve his children reenacted

what happened that e're-remembered night.

Academics continue to be taught and reinforced, with much individual attention being given. Nancy Powell is with us for her second year. Through the music program the children are learning to read and appreciate music, reproduce various rhythms, play the flutophone and sing new songs. Two children are also taking clarinet lessons. An art program has introduced new ideas and the children are developing more creativity and expression.

Productivity, creativity, individuality, thinking, understanding,

expression and personal growth and development are the goals being encouraged, pursued and attained.

With investigations, projects and numerous academic studies, the students of Washington Center School have had a diversified and active school year.

A workshop was given on a winter day for the fourth through eighth graders and their teachers. All involved carried, strapped on and learned to move on SNOWSHOES. The activity was led by instructors from Squam Lakes Science Center in Holderness, N.H.

A highlight of the school year was winning the softball game at Goshen. The Washington team worked very long and hard in mastering each skill. With determination and the help of a pep team our team

moved on to victory.

All middle and upper grade students had an eight-week course in U.S. history from Jamestown to the present. The course was offered to give the students a historical time perspective and to discover the progress of our country. It opened the door to a better understanding of how past events can be associated with present day living. Each class then entered into a specific unit in history or geography for more involved studies.

In the fall the classes studies aerodynamics and/or meteorology. After investigating weather patterns and airborne structures, the classes designed and constructed individual kites. When the final day arrived to fly the kites in the great outdoors, the student knew the art of kite preservation.

The culminating activity of a year of academic studies came when the students performed a three-act play of "Hansel and Gretel." The students incorporated movement, creativity, art, music and individual talent to end the school year with great success.

The staff and students move from one school year with memories to the next school year with expectation.

REPORT OF THE WASHINGTON YOUTH FITNESS COMMITTEE

As charged by the Washington School Board, it was the responsibility of the Washington Youth Fitness Committee to "investigate the possibility of establishing a formal physical fitness program" in the Washington Center School. Several suggestions, made by State Physical Education Consultant Dr. Harriet Forkey, were considered by the committee after a meeting at which Dr. Forkey and the teachers were present. The most promising and popular of these suggestions was the H.O.P.E. project, developed by teachers at Enfield Elementary School in Enfield, New Hampshire. The project was observed in action by Washington teachers and a board member last May; questionnaires were completed in September and October to determine whether the H.O.P.E. objectives were agreed on by a majority of parents and students. The response was clearly in favor of H.O.P.E.'s noncompetitive, gymnastic style of physical fitness instruction.

The H.O.P.E. program (Health and Optimum Physical Education) is one which was developed in direct response to the needs of schools with limited space and funds. It emphasizes a developmental approach to both physical fitness and to an increasing awareness on the part of students of muscle tone, strength, coordination, sportsmanship and endurance. It is a program which exceeds state and Federal standards.

Once the board had decided to pursue the H.O.P.E. program, Ms. Morrison was asked to assist Mr. Estren in writing up the appropriate papers.

Film "Take Joy" about cigarette smoking provided by the American Cancer Society

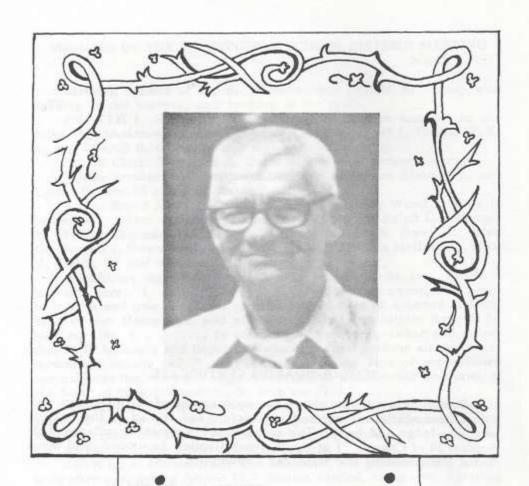
Speaker — Training Coordinator — Bureau of Alcohol and Drug Abuse

All officers signed oath of office as prescribed by law, which is included here. "I, of do solemnly swear, that I will bear faith and true allegiance to the United States of America and the State of New Hampshire, and will support the Constitutions thereof. So help me God. I, , do solemnly and sincerely swear and affirm that I will faithfully and impartially discharge and perform all the duties incumbent on me as according to the best of my abilities agreeably to the rules and regulations of this Constitution and laws of the State of New Hampshire, So help me God."

ARTICLE 2. Motion made and seconded "That salaries remain the same as printed in the budget, except that the Moderator should

receive a raise of \$2.50". Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 3. No action taken on reports.

ARTICLE 4. Motion made and seconded "To pass over this article until after considering Article 11." Motion carried, voice vote. Meeting returned to article after action on Article 11. "Motion made and seconded that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Karin Jurson as Auditor." Motion carried, voice vote. Votes cast one, Karin Jurson, having all votes cast, was declared elected, and has signed oath of office. After much discussion the Moderator ruled that Article 7 having been dismissed, he would not accept a motion to appoint a committee at this time.

ARTICLE 5. Motion made and seconded "That the District vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and accept on behalf of the District any and all grant or other funds for educational purposes, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States of America Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the School District for the school year 1977-78." Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 6. James Russell, chairman, explained this article at

some length, but no action taken.

ARTICLE 7. Robert Dunton, School Board member, explained the work he felt was needed on the East Washington Schoolhouse, including paint, window work and foundation work. Motion made and seconded "To dismiss." Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 8. Mr. Russell, chairman of the School Board, read a letter from John Tweedy in regard to land for the new school. (A copy of this letter is filed with school meeting records.) No action taken.

ARTICLE 9. Motion made and seconded "That the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700 to insulate the side walls of the Washington Center School." Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 10. Motion made and seconded "To dismiss". Carried

voice vote, with no vote cast in favor of the School Lunch.

ARTICLE 11. Motion made and seconded "That the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$103,845.85 for the support of the School District, Officials, and agents, and payment of statutory obligations of the District, Officials and agents, and payment of statutory obligations of the District". This cut the recommended budget by \$410, the cost of the color TV.

1. Amendment "To delete \$3,000 with the recommendation that the

Kindergarten tuition be dropped."

Amendment "To cut budget to \$99,745 with the suggestion that the carpeting be deleted."

3. Amendment "To cut budget to \$99,045.85."

There was much discussion, with the School Board doing a very fine job in answering questions.

3rd amendment: paper ballot, yes 57, no 29. Carried. 2nd amendment: paper ballot, yes 56, no 27. Carried.

1st amendment: Carried, voice vote.

Money raised under this article \$99,045.85.

ARTICLE 12. Voted that a committee of three be appointed by the School Board, one to be a member of the School Board, to look into the possibility of transferring the East Washington School to the Town."

1. Amended to have one member of the committee a member of the

Old School Reunion or an alumni of the school.

 Amended to prepare a warrant article for the 1978 School District Meeting and to report on the availability of funding for the restoration and maintenance and the transfer of the responsibility from the School District to the Town."

3. Amended that the third committee member be a selectman. All

amendments carried, voice vote.

The School Board was criticized because the school bathrooms were only being cleaned every other day. Voted that at least the bathrooms be cleaned daily. It was suggested that the board look into some form of physical fitness program, and a committee be appointed.

A rising vote of thanks was given Ellen Hofford for her fine work

as a member of the board.
