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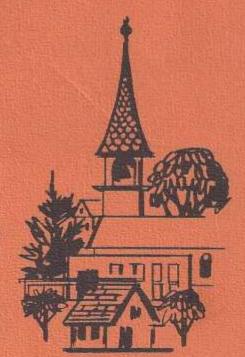

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will open at 10:30 a.m. and not close before 4:30 p.m. to elect Town

Officers. The following articles will be acted upon:

Article 1. To elect by nonpartisan ballot a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, Police Chief, one Trustee of the Library for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, one member of the Planning Board for three years, one member of the Board of Assessors for three years, one member of the Board of Assessors for two years, one member of the Board of Assessors for one year, and any other Town Officers.

Article 2. To hear reports of any and all officers and agents of the Town and take any action in relation thereto. CARRIED ACCEPT THE REPORTS

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to reopen that portion of the road previously discontinued subject to gates and bars, from the Marlow Road to the southerly bank of the Ashuelot River at the site of the Russell Mill Pond and the approaches to it, and to repair that portion of the road as described, including a bridge across the Ashuelot River and/or take any other action relating thereto. DISMISSED

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and/or withdraw from Capital Reserve Funds for Permanent Bridges to build the bridge as described under Article 3; repair the road as described under Article 3; and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.82 and accept State Aid in the amount of \$5,332.13 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a setoff against the Principal Payment of one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400.00.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to participate in a County wide solid waste study and support a County facility provided said study shows such action to be in the best interest of the Town or to take any other action pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the publication of an Invoice of Taxable Property.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to require all members of the Board of Assessors who have not already attended the Department of Revenue Administration Workshop for Assessors to do so during their first year in office.

Article 24. To see what additional sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to paint the Town Hall and/or take any other action relating

Article 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to install lightning rods on the Town Hall and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see what action the Town will take relative to allowing the Town Hall or other Town Buildings to be used for private functions, not open

to the public and/or take any action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to provide Workers' Compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-funded Workers' Compensation Program commencing March 13, 1979, and to authorize the Selectmen to take such action in furtherence of this vote as may be necessary.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow

in anticipation of taxes.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including but not limited to, disaster aid and Highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or private agency or individual or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,785.00 for the completion of the Town Tax Map and authorize the withdrawal of \$8,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, with the balance to be raised by taxation and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the ordinance passed at Special Town Meeting, July 15, 1969, regarding:

Making the Millen Pond and Faxon Hill Roads one-way between June 15 and September 15. Between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Article 33. To see what action the Town will take relative to the acquisition of land behind the Town Hall.

Article 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ABSTRACT OF 1978 TOWN MEETING RECORDS March 14, 1978

Meeting opened at 10:00 a.m. by Moderator Donald R. Crane, with the reading of the Warrant. Polls opened at 10:30 a.m. Asst. Moderator A. Stanley Drew and Ass't. Town Clerk officiated at the polls in the "Grange Room." Ballot clerks Elsie Fletcher and Hazel Drew officiated at the checklists in the Selectmen's Office.

Article 1. Officers Elected: Moderator for 2 years, Donald Crane; Town Clerk, Wenonah A. Babb; Supervisor of the Checklist for 6 years, Earl B. Cilley; Town Treasurer, Sybil Blakney; Selectman for 3 years, Richard E. Griffith; Road Agent, Robert Crane; Tax Collector, Charles Dalphond; Auditor, Karin Fox; Fire Chief, Charles Dalphond; Police Chief, James Houghton; Trustee of Library, Preston Rolfe; Trustee of Trusts Funds, Marcia Goodspeed; Planning Board for 3 years each, Philip Barker and Alan Goodspeed.

Article 1. Referendum Questions on Ballot:

1. Dog Leash Law. Yes - 62, No - 95. Lost

2. To elect a Board of Assessors. Yes - 97, No - 58. Carried.

Article 2. Motion made and seconded, "that the Town vote to repair that portion of the road previously discontinued subject to Gates and Bars, from the Marlow-Ashuelot Pond Road to the Gordon Davis land, including a bridge across the Ashuelot River." Motion made and seconded to dismiss. Motion carried – voice vote, Article dismissed.

Article 3. Moved to dismiss. Carried - voice vote. (Money article to cover article 2 had it passed.)

Article 4. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve the sum of \$1,000 for Permanent Bridges." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 5. Moved "that the Town vote to plow and sand Valley Road, socalled, belonging to the Highland Lake Association at a cost agreed upon by the Selectmen, Road Agent and Highland Lake Association until such time as the vote may be rescinded by the voters of Washington, or cancelled by the Highland Lake Association." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 6. Moved "that we authorize the Selectmen to amend the present Gravel Pit Lease so as to accept from Hilman Blakney the right to remove gravel from part of the parcel of land 250 feet north of the present land leased by the Town. All gravel being removed under the same terms as the present lease, the Town agreeing to improve the present right-of-way to parcel, changing the lower end so as to enter the present pit to the west of the old sugar house. Said road to be kept open for travel during the non-winter months, giving said Blakney and his heirs a usable road to this parcel of land that they could build on." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 7. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,800 for the purchase of a sander body." Motion carried — voice vote,

Article 8. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$57,750 for the operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year." Amended: "cut amount raised by \$2,750"; 2nd amendment: to increase amount raised by \$2,750 to a total of \$57,750." 2nd amendment carried — paper ballot. Amended: "that no portion of the Highway budget be used for chemical sprays during the coming year." Amendment carried — voice vote.

Article 9. Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$13,049.83 and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for Special Highway Projects for the ensuing year." Amended: "to cut the \$4,000 from the motion." Amendment carried — voice vote. Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 10. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate and transfer to Capital Reserve the sum of \$10,000 for the purchase of Highway Equip-

ment." Motion lost - voice vote.

Article 11. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$703.56 and appropriate the sum of \$6.07 from accumulated balance of T. R. A. Funds since 1973 in surplus, and to accept State Aid of \$4,690.37 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a set-off against the principal payment of one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 12. Voted to "pass-over this article until 1979." Voice vote, (relative

to acquisition of additional property adjacent to Town Garage.)

Article 13. Moved "that the Town vote to expend any money that may be forth coming from the Public Works Employment Act Anti-recession Title II on the following projects: 1. installation of guard rails at Millen Pond Dam; 2. Washington Lake Estates Road, Corner 1,500 ft. beyond Island Pond Dam; 3. East Washington Road, corner at Kingsbury Hill Camp." Motion carried voice vote.

Article 14. Moved to dismiss - carried - voice vote. (Membership in the

Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association)

Article 15. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$276 as the Town's share of the annual operating expense of the Council, and to continue its membership in the Upper-Valley Lake Sunapee Council." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 16. Moved to dismiss - carried - voice vote. (50% reimbursement

to Millen Lake Association for appraisal of Camp Morgan)

Article 17. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 as a binder on an offer of \$244,000 for the 190 acres Camp Morgan property. If the offer is accepted, for the Town authorize the Selectmen to hold a Public Hearing and a Special Town Meeting for the purpose of Raising and appropriating and borrowing the necessary funds." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 18. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 and vote to borrow by long-term notes the sum of \$20,000 and vote to withdraw the sum of \$2,030.59 from Capital Reserve for building the proposed addition on the Shedd Free Library." Motion carried — paper ballot.

Article 19. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800 for support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year." Motion

carried - voice vote.

Article 20. Voted to dismiss - voice vote. (Capital Reserve for the Library Building Fund)

Article 21. Voted to dismiss - voice vote. (Band Concerts)

Article 22. Voted to dismiss - voice vote. (Holding Town Meetings Upstairs)

Article 23. Voted "to accept all reports as printed." Voice vote.

Article 24. Voted to dismiss — voice vote. (relative to replacement of present street lights with mercury vapor lights and addition of more lights)

Article 25. Voted to dismiss - voice vote. (Dog retention facility)

Article 30. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the appointment of a Deputy Town Tax Collector pursuant to R.S.A. 41:38." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 31. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to set hours at the Dump," Motion lost, Moved to dismiss, Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 32. Voted to dismiss – voice vote, (relative to a solid waste disposal facility)

Article 33. Moved "that the newest addition of land to the East Washington Cemetery be called the "Paul Section" and that a letter of gratitude be sent to Anna and Ludwig Paul asking their approval in using their names." Motion carried — voice vote. Moved "to authorize the Selectmen to name the parts of the Center Cemetery as "the Old," "The New," and the Selectmen to come up with a name for the last addition." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 34. Moved "that the Selectmen be instructed to require perpetual care as a conditional of sales on all lots sold at the rate of \$100 for 1 and 2 grave lots, \$200, for 3 and 4 grave lots." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 35, Moved "to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes." Motion carried - voice vote,

Article 36. Moved "to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept and expend on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including but not limited to Disaster Aid and Highway Funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or Private Agency or individual." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 37. Moved "that the Town vote to go to the replacement cost with \$1,000, deductible," Motion carried — voice vote, (relative to property insurance on Town Buildings.)

Article 38. Moved "that the Town vote to change the dollar amount of assets which a person or couple may own and still be eligible for elderly exemption from \$35,000. to \$50,000. as provided in Chapter 226 of the 1977 Session Laws of the State of New Hampshire." Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 39. Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$13,000 from the Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provosions of the State and Social Assistance Act of 1972, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$72.04 for completion of the Town Tax Map." - d) Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,466 to paint the Town Hall." Motion carried voice vote.

e) Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 to insulate the Tower." Motion lost — voice vote.

f) Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. to construct a storage closet in Grange Room." Motion carried – voice vote.

Article 42. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54,914 to defray "Town Charges" for the ensuing year." Amended: "to cut by \$914." Amendment lost — voice vote. Motion carried — voice vote.

Article 43. Moved to dismiss - carried - voice vote. (relative to procuring a

minimum of three bids on Town projects of \$1,000.)

Article 44. Other Business:

a) Rising vote of thanks for former Selectman Hilbert S. Cofield.

b) Motion adopted "to meet at 9:00 o'clock for Town Meeting next year." Motion carried - paper ballot: yes - 45, No - 35.

c) Motion carried to "Send Birthday Greetings to Howard Stevens."

d) Motion carried "that the unused screens be removed from the windows."

e) Jocular motion carried "that Mr. Jager and Mr. Rolfe be instructed to climb Lovell Mountain and to trim the soft-wood trees on the top, so they would look neater."

Meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

ABSTRACT FROM SPECIAL TOWN MEETING RECORDS September 16, 1978

Special Town Meeting was opened at 8:00 p.m. by Moderator Donald R. Crane. It was announced that the State approval was at hand if any one wished to hear it. Rules announced: 1) that only one vote on the question would be accepted; 2) that non-residents may speak but only once.

Article 1. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$240,000, by Long Term Notes over 20 years for the purchase of the Camp Morgan property from the Worcester Y.M.C.A."

Selectman Robert Wright spoke for the Board. Letters were read by the Moderator. Sales agreement with the Worcester Y.M.C.A. was read by Mr. Wright. Town Counselor, Michael Work answered questions. Both the Planning Board Chairman and the School Board Chairman declined invitation to be part of the presentation.

Moved "that debate on issue be closed." Paper ballot with 2/3 majority required: votes cast 148. No - 18, Blank - 1, Yes - 129.

Voting on question began at 9:50 p.m. to last for one hour. At 10:50 p.m. it was voted to extend the hour to 11:10 p.m. Polls closed at 11:10 p.m.

Total votes cast: 189. (2/3 vote required) Yes - 137, No - 52.

Motion carried - paper ballot.

Meeting adjourned at 11:30 p.m.

SHEDD FREE LIBRARY Report of Trustees and Librarian for 1978

The circulation from the 3,400 books and 160 recordings in the Library and the 1,896 books from the Bookmobile totaled 6,711 - which includes magazines. With 121 adult and 105 juvenile borrowers, we think this indicates that we really use our Library.

During the year 47 books were borrowed through inter-library loan from the

State Library, UNH, Northfield and Newport.

Over 278 books were donated to the Library in memory of Ruth E. Fox. Duplicates were used to replace our worn-out copies and others we did not have were added to our shelves.

The Trustees and Librarian attended meetings of the N. H. Library Trustees Association at Durham, the Fall Conference in North Conway and meetings on

the New Martin Report in Newport and Concord.

The Martin Report suggested abolishing the Bookmobile and having libraries get books from depots to be established in their districts. The Trustees sent a letter of concern to the State Library stating the Bookmobile supplemented our needs and it would be difficult for us to have to travel to obtain books from a depot. The answer was that the Bookmobile program would be continued for all the small libraries requesting it for at least another year.

The Librarian reported that few people used the Library during the two morning hours open on Saturday during the summer. They were, for the most part, the same people who come on Monday and Wednesday. Approximately 25 different people came in during the two months, either to return books and

magazines, or to talk.

On April 1, 1978, the Librarian, Zaida Cilley, started an "Equipment Fund" to buy shades, shelving, paint and other items needed for the new addition. The Librarian received many items to sell as well as donations of money. The sales amounted to \$679.25, cash donations \$259.00, interest \$15.19 - totaling \$953.44.

As the cost of most items has increased, we are asking for an appropriation of \$4,200.00 this year in support of the Library. This is an increase of \$400.00 over 1978.

The Library is open on Monday and Wednesday from 1:30 to 3:30 in the afternoon and from 7:00 to 9:00 in the evening. We hope that in the coming year more people will use the Library. All are welcome to visit and use its facilities.

REPORT ON THE ADDITION TO THE SHEDD FREE LIBRARY

When article 18, "to construct an addition to the Shedd Free Library," was adopted at Town Meeting March 14, 1978, we should have thought to announce that because I as the volunteer, one man, acting architect, had arranged to spend the month of July with my three grandchildren, during their school vacation, with my daughter in Hawaii, the construction of the addition probably would have to be postponed until 1979 as there was not enough time to revise the preliminary plans, prepare specifications, advertise for bids, and award a contract before I left for Honolulu on July 5, and leave enough time for construction before Fall.

During March I got information on specs from the N. H. Municipal Asso. and the Asso. of General Contractors; looked at plans and specs of the addition to the Silsby Library in Charlestown, N. H. and the addition to the Acworth Town Hall; looked at library details in Norwich, Vt., Plainfield, Meriden and Sunapee, N. H. I had two conferences with Stephen P. Tracy, 72, retired architect in Cornish, N. H. on March 24 and April 7, a well-known architect in Nashua, N. H., who designed the Diamond Library at the University of N. H. among other buildings, who studied our plans and made excellent, practical suggestions. I checked on lighting design at suppliers in Manchester and Bow, and with engi-

neers whom I knew in the N. H. Public Works Division in Concord. In August and September I spent some time helping to prepare for a hearing and a special Town meeting on the acquisition of Camp Morgan as Secretary of the Planning Board. On August 20 I apparently suffered a slight stroke. On September 21, 22 and 23 I was a delegate to the N. H. Conference on Library and Information Services in the State House in Concord, These and other activities reduced the time to work on library plans. Meanwhile, the Trustees agreed on September 15 that I should complete the plans so we could award a contract by January 1979 so construction could start early in 1979. On October 18 I was on a panel at the N. H. Library Trustees Association's Fall Conference in Durham. Then on November 4 and 5 I was in the ICU at Monadnock Community Hospital in Peterboro with chest pains. Nine days later I was discharged on November 14. My daughter arrived from Honolulu to be with me at home. It was decided that it would be best for me to go back with her. I hastily arranged to leave and went to the Selectmen's meeting three days later November 17 prepared to carry on the library accounts and finish the library plans in Hawaii. The Selectmen decided I should turn the books and plans over to them so I gave them up. I left for Hawaii November 20 and went into the hospital there on November 22 for tests and was discharged after ten days on medication that continued into March which means I will miss 1979 Town Meeting.

I enjoy giving time and effort to help insure the Town of Washington having a good library. I would like to help see that the addition is build even though I feel that certain things beyond my control prevented me from completing the plans that would have seen it done in 1978.

I regret that several things beyond my control prevented me, for one of the few times in my life, from fulfilling my obligations to the Town as an elected Trustee of the Shedd Free Library for over 20 years. It was brought to my attention in September that probably the delay would add to the cost, but this would be reduced some by the fact that the \$11,000+ Building Fund has been earning some \$50 a month in interest since April 10, 1978 when the Trustees established a NOW account so we could write checks when construction did start.

Because I have no records, all reports will have to come from those that have them. I regret this as I like to make complete reports on anything I am elected or appointed to do.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT 1978

Early this year Federal Surplus Property was no longer distributed through the local Civil Defense agency so I have no record of what the town received. In past years most of this went to the Town Highway Department so they may have a record.

When I had to leave for Hawaii for health reasons on November 20, I notified the State Civil Defense Director that I could not discharge the duties of C. D. director for the Town. I suggested that Selectman Robert J. Wright might act as he is a Mobilization Designee (MOBDES) assigned by the Air Reserve Personnel Center to the Washington Civil Defense Office, but I have not heard what was done. I did receive a notice dated December 28, 1978 that Captain Robert J. Wright, Air Force Reserve has been assigned to active duty at the Washington D. D. Office from January 29, 1979 to February 9, 1979. This allows him to maintain his reserve status toward retirement and assist our C. D. program.

Since 1972 civil defense is officially the Defense Civil Preparedness Agency with emphasis on preparedness against civil and natural emergencies rather than

against nuclear attacks.

Statewide there were 1,433 reported forest fires, burning a total of 468 acres, in 1978.

Washington continues to be one of the towns with few or no incidents. A fact which I attribute mainly to an aware and conscientious public and pride in our beautiful surroundings.

Remember that a permit is required for outside fires if the ground is not

completely covered with snow.

The penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of up to one thousand dollars OR a jail sentence of up to one year or both,

PLANNING BOARD SUMMARY

During 1978, the Washington Planning Board held 21 regular meetings and 3 special meetings. The Planning Board voted in February to restrict subdivision work to the first meeting of each month. The second meeting would encompass town planning.

The major workload involved the subdivision of land. There were eight applications or inquiries which resulted in four approvals consisting of five lots to-

taling 37.5 acres.

In August, the Planning Board decided not to continue sending our reports to the newspapers because of inaccuracies in printing.

Philip Barker and Alan Goodspeed attended the Municipal Law Lecture

Series in Bow for the six weeks duration of the course.

Richard Griffith replaced Robert Wright as the Selectmen's representative to the Board. Peter Tumulty and Katrina Gundersen were appointed alternate members.

The most significant undertaking by the Board has been its involvement in the acquisition of the YMCA property. This has been a lengthy project. The Board records show that Chairman Barker first introduced the subject on December 14, 1976. So after more than two years of work by many people, the project is nearing completion, and the taxpayers of Washington will soon have the enjoyment of the recreational facilities provided there.

The Board also spent considerable time investigating previously established developments such as Lake Ashuelot Estates, Inc. Section III and the Martin lot. The Board could not get cooperation from LAE, Inc. after finding unsuitable soil tests and very shallow ledge conditions, so legal action has been filed.

State and Federal agencies are also expressing interest in the matter.

REPORT ON THE REGIONAL ASSOCIATION 1978

New Hampshire is divided into six regions to provide information to people who want to visit or vacation here. We are in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region along with 35 other towns who are our neighbors and have a councilor in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association. The operating costs are met by contributions based on valuation and population of member towns and a

grant from the State based on the member towns contributions.

Washington is asked to contribute \$257 for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association for 1979. Since this organization encourages more people to come to our part of New Hampshire, it follows that the state collects more rooms and meal taxes which results in Washington receiving a larger amount, which last year was \$2,397. Thus it is to our advantage to contribute to this group by cooperating with the other 35 towns and add our support which is needed for it to continue its efforts that results in increasing our income from the tax.

It is usually good for a town to cooperate and have a representative in any activity concerning neighboring towns, as "going it alone" is a disadvantage today. Naturally there is some cost, in this case \$257, but it seems it would be

in the best interests of Washington to make this contribution.

REPORT ON THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION 1978

The town continued membership in the regional planning commission now called the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. There are some 20 member towns including three in Vermont. Each town is entitled to two directors although Washington did not appoint one to take the place of Thomas Heavey when he moved in 1977 so has only one. I am one of some 40 directors and attended meetings in February in Norwich, Vermont and in March, April, May, September and October, all in Lebanon.

I represented the Town at the third annual meeting of the N. H. Regional Planning Agencies in Laconia in May and toured the historic Belknap Mills that have been preserved and restored. At the annual meeting in June I was elected to the eight-member Executive Committee and went to meetings in

Lebanon in July, September and October.

Our town's share of the funds needed to operate the regional planning commission, based on population, is \$283 for 1979. We should make this as an investment in planning in order to have its many services available to the Planning Board and other town officials, to have a vote in the regional planning activities that affect our town, and to share with neighboring towns in N.H. and Vt. their opinions and ideas on a regional basis. Many planning problems are today extending far outside town boundaries and we should support and be represented in our regional planning commission.

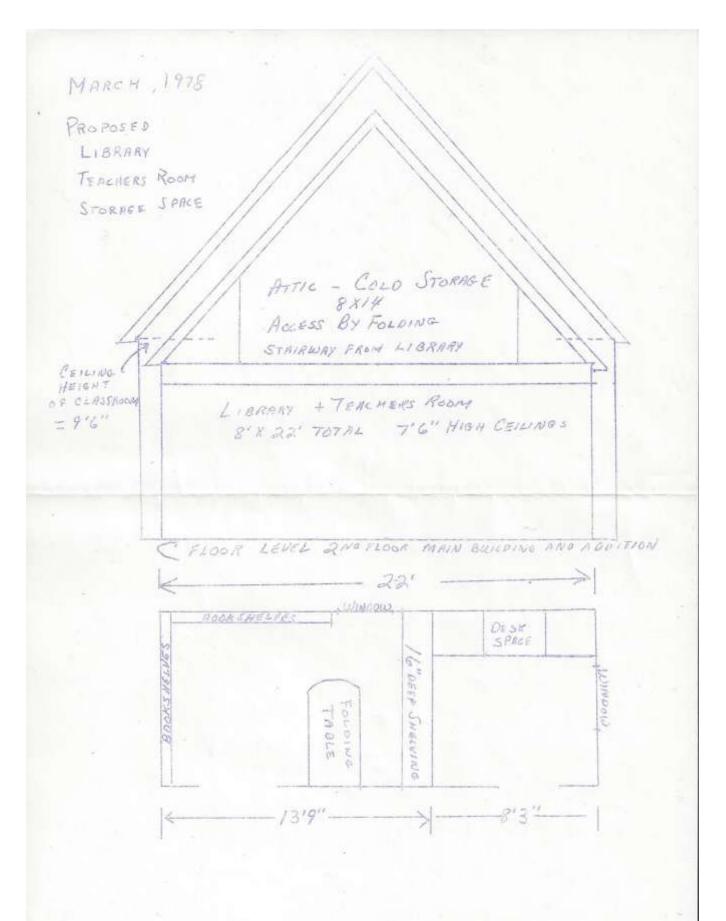

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

In looking at the education provided at the Washington Center School this year, one subject must be dealt with before all others — growth. The School, which from the 1940's to 1970 never had a population larger than 30 students, now has 64 students. This growth in student population has affected every facet of the educational program. The School Board must report for the first time a deficit in this year's school budget. The added financial strain of extra student tuitions, transportation, and all other expenses have given us a deficit of \$3,000.

Our present two bus system of pupil transportation is being strained beyond its capacity. For next year, the School Board must recommend a third vehicle

to transport the students to School.

Our two room school house was outgrown several years ago. We are "temporarily" using the Grange Room of the Town Hall as a classroom and the Main Room of the Town Hall on a regular basis. This has contributed to extra heating

and custodial expenses in this year's budget.

Our ever larger school population presents a greater need for educational services. We now have a School Psychologist one day per week and a Speech Therapist ½ day per week. These services are not only necessary in a school of 60 plus students, but are now mandated by State and Federal laws for anyone requiring these services, aged 3 to 21 years.

As noted in the report of the Space Study Committee, there are many aspects of the crowded conditions at our present School that are not apparent at first

glance. Some of these are:

A lack of playground space.
 A lack of storage space.

- A bathroom accessible only by passing through a classroom.

Three classrooms, each less than 2/3 the size of a regular classroom.

- A lack of a room for teacher preparation, private conferences and Audio

Visual equipment.

The voters at the 1978 Annual School Meeting approved a Warrant Article to spend \$4,000.00 for a small addition to the second floor of the School. Four days later the voters approved the purchase of Camp Morgan at Town Meeting. With Camp Morgan's potential for a real solution to our space problems, the School Board felt that the \$4,000.00, would not be wisely spent. The article will be resubmitted to this year's Annual School Meeting.

Another Warrant Article at the 1978 Annual School Meeting asked the School Board to secure a suitable playground space for School use. The "Walsh Land" in back of the School is the only available site. The site is too rocky and swampy to be used without extensive work. Although the Selectmen are negotiating with Mr. Walsh, the School Board must report that up to this point, we

have failed to secure any suitable site for student playground use.

This year has been a busy and exciting one for the School. Last Spring Washington was notified that a Federal Grant was being awarded for a program in Physical Education.

The Community Education Program of last Summer proved very successful.

A large group of natives, newcomers and Summer people got together for Red

Cross swimming lessons, softball games and evening campfires.

This Fall saw three full time teachers. Mrs. Mary Ann Nagy teaching first and second grades; Mr. Daniel Kocsis teaching third, fourth and fifth grades; and Mrs. Jean Murdough teaching sixth, seventh and eighth grades. Mrs. Karin Fox as teacher aide, Mrs. Susan Smith as Art teacher one day per week, and Mrs. Holly Bartlett Weinberg as Music teacher one-half day per week complement our three full time teachers.

The teaching staff has been working on programs in math and language (English), so that each student can work up to his own level. Identifying and treating problem areas for students has been a slow process, particularly with new students constantly moving in. Nonetheless, the hiring of a school psychologist and speech therapist represent an effort to treat these problems within the

Washington School whenever possible,

The efforts of teachers, students, parents and the community on behalf of the Washington School children speak more clearly than the words of the School Board. Parent-run programs for bowling, skiing and 4-H round out the academic side of School showing the children of Washington a large concern for their education and upbringing by the adults in the community.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE to the Citizens of the Washington School District

INTRODUCTION

This report attempts to highlight the major accomplishments of the past school year, our current major goals, and the major short and long-term needs of the schools. I hope that the report will provide some idea of the broader areas of concern that are of concern to this administration.

SPACE NEEDS

The continuing student population growth in Washington is placing increased demands upon our facilities. Conservative population projections indicate that we will quickly be reaching the point where the District must consider providing

additional space for its students.

While the programs currently being offered students continue at reasonable levels of effectiveness, increased student enrollments can have a significant negative impact. With all regular school space being utilized and other building space also being used, the District should be prepared to support the efforts of the School Board to study the various alternatives. The decisions that must be made in the next few years will have long-range impact upon the quality of education available to students.

The current separation of classrooms in two buildings, lack of sufficient teaching space, lack of storage space, lack of room for special helpers to work, lack of adequate playground space, etc. are factors which must be addressed. The town's purchase of Camp Morgan and its potential as a possible school,

warrant further study.

The impact of the current lack of space upon general classroom operations cannot be minimized. Until the overall space problems are resolved, the highest degree of cooperation between parents, board, administration and town officials, teachers and students will be needed.

HANDICAPPED SERVICES

Effective as of September 1, 1978, both state and federal laws have required an active search for handicapped students; that is, students with physical, mental or emotional difficulties that have a negative effect upon their education. School

districts must provide the services that are needed by each student.

This process involves general testing of all students to identify those with potential difficulties; specific testing for those suspected of having a handicap; use of trained professionals to interpret test results and to develop individual written plans and the use of persons trained in the area of need to provide the required services. Handicaps may range from mild problems to more severe cases.

Since Washington has not faced this problem in as much depth previously and since the School is not large enough to have its own trained psychologists, speech therapists, occupational therapists, physical therapists, learning disabilities teachers, etc. we must expect that there will be a reasonably significant financial cost required to provide for these students' needs. While the Supervisory Union office has been able to tap state and federal funds for some assistance this year, the primary burden will be on the School District.

1977-78 GOALS

During 1977-78, the Assistant Superintendent of Schools increased the number of formal observations of teachers; more formal meetings were held with teachers; efforts were organized to develop formal written curriculum guides; work was begun on a teacher handbook.

1978-79 GOALS

The goals for the current school year are (1) a continuation of efforts toward

increased teacher evaluation, curriculum development, and individualized instruction (2) development of an organized testing program (3) completion of work on a teacher handbook (4) development of a long-range field trip and activities schedule (5) implementation of the Project HOPE physical education program and (6) continuation of regular meetings between teachers and administrators.

1977-78 SUPERINTENDENT'S GOALS

The major accomplishments of the past year were: (1) setting of annual administrative goals (2) increased evaluation of teachers (3) adoption of written administrative procedures (4) improved budgetary preparation procedures (5) expanded assistance to the School Board and Teachers (6) re-organization of the Supervisory Union Office staff and its procedures to provide more effective service (7) establishment of a community education program (8) development of a formal method for School Boards to evaluate the performance of the Superintendent of Schools (9) continuous communication and cooperation with the Washington School Board (10 provision of a greater degree of supervision over the day-to-day function of the Washington School (11) and Special Education programs were developed for Washington students.

CONCLUSION

The support of the citizens of Washington for their school children has been greatly appreciated. We will continue our efforts to act in ways that will be of benefit to your children and will merit your continued support.

REPORT OF THE WASHINGTON CENTER SCHOOL TEACHERS

At Washington Center School, the first and second grades started in September of 1978 with 21 youngsters of multi-level and ability in all educational disciplines. We have learned to work together. Some of our first graders have travelled from recognizing consonant sounds to reading sentences.

We have made use of Dr. Derby's services to meet individual needs of our youngsters. Karin Fox has given extra care and "one to one" attention to children who are not ready to work independently-or need help adjusting to a

room full of youngsters.

We have begun Project Hope in systematic progression. The philosophy behind the program has been extended to all areas of the curriculum. There has been a remarkable improvement in listening skills as well as in the area of self

discipline and consideration for "personal space."

We have put great emphasis on Reading and Language Arts. Successful experiences with Oral Language Skills and Listening Skills usually preceed equal success in Creative Writing and Reading. For this reason we have become attentive to Speech and Language development of youngsters in the Washington School System.

Part of this emphasis has been put on appreciation for literature we read to the children. We encourage them to read library books, discuss them with their classmates. We share our love for stories, even dramatize old favorites. We went to Hawthorne Theatre to see a live rendition of "The Grasshopper and the Ant."

Marge Dietrich, our school nurse, has been instrumental in the continuation of the dental health program and a special Fire Prevention program last Fall. All the youngsters at Washington Center School visited the Hillsboro Fire Department.

Though we have been stressing basic skills we are looking forward to providing more experiences on and off the school premises to add enrichment to our curriculum.

Mrs. F. Nagy Teacher 1-2

The 1978-79 academic year began with the students making the acquaintance of a new teacher. During the initial week the first of many short term projects was initiated in terms of an "All About Me" booklet. Fourth and fifth grade students began writing compositions in line with bi-weekly writing assignments. Third graders were introduced to manuscript. By Thanksgiving, students had mastered three classic poems; "Trees," "Concord Hymn" and "The Village Blacksmith." What began as a lesson in the proper format for writing a friendly letter blossomed into the leisure activity of writing for autographed photos of celebrities. Among those returned were Neil Armstrong, Jacques Cousteau, Marvin Hamlisch and Jesse Owens.

Math grades three through five essentially began by reviewing basic skills of corresponding grade levels. Emphasis was placed on solving and understanding word problems. Some students were introduced to basis other than ten and were able to add and subtract successfully in them. Presently all students are being in-

troduced to procedures for graphing.

The Social Studies unit began with terms used in basic geography. Students became familiar with the major land and water bodies. The majority of the unit was spent on discussion of the discovery and development of North America ending with the events leading to American Independence. Students enjoyed a delightful trip to Concord to see the musical "1776."

Project Hope, an alternative to the traditional P. E. programs was introduced to the students. With the theme of "every child a winner," students are learning and discovering their physical attributes. Stress on improving listening skills and self-discipline are a major part of the program and can be utilized the entire academic day.

A continuing consideration for the year has been exposure to the Arts. Students traveled to Nathaniel Hawthorne College to see a children's theater production of "The Grasshopper and the Ant." Students were also responsible for art and music projects which centered on the lives of the great composers and artists of the Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic and Impressionistic Eras. Reading for pleasure periods were available daily, supported by weekly trips to the town library. One of our scheduled book reports featured the children dressed in the garb worn by the characters in their biographical sketches.

Now that winter and mid-year are fully upon us the students are ready and

willing to meet the challenges of 1979.

Mr. Daniel J. Kocsis Grades 3-5

At the end of the 1977-78 school year, the students were involved in compre-

hensive studies of the plant and animal kingdoms.

The intermediate students participated in plant kingdom activities. They became involved in projects, microscopic identification, plant dissection, and dying cells of various plants. The culminating activity was the selecting of seeds, planting, and daily care and observations of mini gardens in the classroom. At the end of the year, the students took their vegetables and flowers home.

The Junior High students studied the animal kingdom. Activities included animal classification and function in relation to the environment. The final activity was the dissection of several small animal specimens. Each student had a complete set of specimens to scrutinize, dissect, inspect under a microscope, and

to investigate the differences in similar systems.

In the spring, all the students in grades 3-8 were involved in the Iowa Testing Program. This year's testing initiates the testing program to be done each year

with the students in the 4th, 6th and 8th grades.

September brought anticipation of the students when they settled into their new classroom. They have enjoyed being in one of the oldest buildings in town and have discovered the enjoyment of things they call "old" and that the building has much to offer in relation to the history of the town.

The students are continuing their academic studies with participation in units dealing with prehistoric times, meterorology, physical geography, Canada, Mexico, United States history, Law, citizens' responsibilities, and many others.

There have been many projects including weather stations, dioramas, paper mache items, and written work that have been completed for various units. An exciting activity was seeing the musical film "1776" in Concord. The film was attended at the completion of a unit about the Revolutionary War.

During National Fire Prevention Week, the students attended a lecture and tour of the Hillsboro Fire Station. The students became aware of the various services that are available to them and the duties and responsibilities of a depart-

ment to the community.

Much thought and preparation, on the part of the students, went into their production for the Christmas program. They wrote, directed, and made their own visual aids to present personal ideas and feelings about the meaning of Christmas for all living creatures.

The school is participating in programs in skiing and bowling. Many students are participating in each program and are enjoying the opportunity to improve

skills in these areas.

Before long the school year will again end. The older students will graduate and new students will enter. The end of a school year is not a termination of student learning or of relationships but is a beginning to new relationships and unknown experiences.

The N.H. State Dental Bureau through its representative, Mrs. Jean Burton, has for the second year initiated a program of Dry Brushing for students in Grades 1-5. This year a new addition to the program is a weekly fluoride rinse—

further discouragement to tooth decay.

New this year is a subscription to the magazine, "Current Health," -shared throughout the school-a very helpful guide for teaching a wide variety of health issues as they relate to children.

There has been a field trip to the Hillsboro Fire Station and Rescue Squad,

the usual examinations, heights and weights, vision and hearing testing.

Still to come will be a speaker on the subject of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, a program on sex education and more!

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 11, 1978

Washington School District Meeting opened in form by School Moderator Donald R. Crane with the reading of the warrant at 8:00 P. M. Polls opened with ballot clerks the school board members.

ARTICLE 1: To choose by nonpartisan ballot the following school district officials: moderator for the ensuing year, clerk for the ensuing year, treasurer for the ensuing year, one member of the school Board for the ensuing three years. ACTION: Votes cast were:

Moderator: Oliver Chase 1, Jim Gaskell 1, Charles Dalphond 11, Alan Goodspeed 1, Fred Otterson 1, Robert Crane 11, and Donald R. Crane 84 and was declared elected.

School Board: Miriam O'Keefe 1, Charles Dalphond 1, Earl Cilley 1, Dorothy Tumulty 11, and James Russell 87 and was declared elected.

School Clerk: Elizabeth Wood 1, Wenonah A. Babb 90 and was declared elected.

School Treasurer: G. Michael Otterson 1, Marcia Goodspeed 1, Steve Blakney

Lynda B. Roy 87 and was declared elected.

Motion made by Oliver Chase, seconded by Mrs. Peck "That there shall be no smoking in the hall during the meeting." Paper ballot requested, YES 42, NO 39. Motion carried. The Selectmen announced that the Grange Room was open and could be used for those who wished to smoke.

ARTICLE 2: To take an inventory of the educational resources of the district. ACTION: Motion made by James Russell "I move that the School Board be permitted time during the meeting to circulate inventory forms to identify resources that may be used by the school." Motion carried, voice vote, and the forms were passed out.

ARTICLE 3: To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and

fix the compensation for any other officers or agents of the district.

ACTION: Motion made by Oliver Chase, seconded by Willard Brown, "That the yearly wage paid to the Moderator be raised \$1.00 per year." Motion carried, voice vote. Motion made by James Russell, seconded by G. Michael Otterson, "That all other officers and agents salaries remain the same as printed in the budget." Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 4: To hear the reports of agents, etc.

ACTION: Motion made by James Russell, seconded by Robert Dunton, "That the reports of agents auditors, committees and officers be accepted as printed

in the annual report." Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and accept on behalf of the district any and all grants or funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government, the state of N. H. or from other sources, for the school year 1978-79 and to appropriate any funds received from said grants or other funds to the payment of obligations of the district for which said funds constitute reimbursement.

ACTION: Motion made by James Russell, seconded by Robert Dunton, as printed in warrant. Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the insulation of the Grange Room of the Town House for school use etc.

ACTION: Motion made by James Russell, seconded by G. Michael Otterson: "I move that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$925 to complete the insulation of the Grange Room of the Town House for School use." Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 7: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate to construct additional storage space at the Washington Center

School, or to take any other action etc.

ACTION: Motion made by James Russell, seconded by Susan Toczko, "I move that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 to construct additional storage space at the Washington Center School." Mr. Russell explained the many needs for more space and passed out plans of the new addition. Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 8: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to lease and prepare appropriate playground space of 1978 and

1979, or to take any other action etc.

ACTION: Motion made by Elizabeth Wood, seconded by Robert Wright, "I move that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to lease and prepare appropriate playground space for 1978 and 1979 and to appoint a committee to look into same." Motion amended "That the committee be the school board as authorized representatives of the school district." Amendment carried, voice vote. Paper ballot: YES 47, NO 36. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 9: To choose agents, auditors, and committees etc.

ACTION: Motion made by Elizabeth Wood, seconded by Robert Dunton, "That the Clerk be instructed to cast one vote for Karin Fox as auditor and she be declared elected." Motion carried, voice vote. Total votes cast 1, necessary for choice 1. Karin Fox having all votes cast was declared elected.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum

of \$2,500 to defray the cost of . . . lunch program.

ACTION: Motion by Robert Dunton, seconded by Susan Toczko, "That the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to defray the cost of implementing, equipping, and operating the school lunch program for 1978-79 providing that the school lunch program is mandated by the State of N. H." Motion lost, voice vote.

ARTICLE 11: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and

appropriate for the support of schools, etc.

ACTION: Motion made by Susan Toczko, seconded by Robert Dunton, "I move that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$126,594.18 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district." Mr. Russell went over the budget item by item, with much discussion on many of the subjects, but thanks to Robert Dunton's good files all questions were answered quickly and completely. Motion made and seconded to amend to read \$120,044.18, with suggestions as to ways budget could be cut. Ralph Otterson brought out the fact that our School Board had spent many hours to come up with the best education we can give our children for the least money, and he urged the voters to think before they voted. Amendment, paper ballot: Yes No 47. Amendment lost. Motion carried, voice vote.

ARTICLE 12: To transact any other business . .

ACTION: A rising vote of thanks given the School Board for their work, and they were complimented on the School Report as printed in the Town Report.

Motion to adjourn, carried, voice vote.

Motion to close the polls, carried, voice vote.

Meeting and polls closed at 11:59.
