TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will open at 10:00 a.m., and not close before 6:00 p.m. to elect Town Officers and to receive your votes on the referendum items appearing on the ballots. The following articles will be acted upon:

ARTICLE 1. To elect by nonpartisan ballot a Town Moderator for two years; a Town Clerk for one year; a Town Treasurer for one year; one Supervisor of the Checklist for six years; one Selectman for three years; a Road Agent, a Tax Collector, an Auditor, a Fire Chief and a Police Chief, for one year each; one Trustee of the Library for three years; one member of the Planning Board for three years; one member of the Board of Assessors for three years; and any other Town Officers and to receive your votes on the Land Use Ordinance Amendments appearing on the ballots.

ARTICLE 2. To hear reports of any and all officers and agents of the Town and take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Highway Projects in the ensuing year and to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Highway Garage Roof or take any other action in relation thereto. ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from Capital Reserve funds to be used for the repair of Permanent Bridge on the Smith Pond Road and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$788.14 and accept State Aid in the amount of \$5,254.28 for Town Road Aid. The Total to be used as a setoff against the Principal Payment of one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400.00.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise, authorize the Selectmen to borrow by Long Term Note and appropriate for the purchase of a truck for the Highway Department and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to dedicate the new addition to the Shedd Free Library to Preston E. Rolfe and the new book room in the Library facility to Zaida E. Cilley and to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal of the balance of all monies and close out the Capital Reserve Fund for the Library Addition and appropriate said monies toward completion of the addition.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the acquisition of a copy machine to be located in the Selectmen's Office and used for preparing copies of correspondence, records and reports essential to conducting Town business and take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the commercial storage within the Town of toxic waste and poisons, such as chemical and radioactive materials, when not pre-empted by State or Federal Statute. Any person and/or corporation found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$100.00, the exact amount to be assessed by the Board of Selectmen. (submitted by petition)

ARTICLE 18. To see what action the Town will vote to take relative to observing "an Old Home Day Celebration no later than 1981" (per vote at Town Meeting March 3, 1977); to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the celebration; to see what action the Town will vote to take relative to the monies in the Old Home Day Certificates due to expire in September 1980.

ARTICLE 19. To see what action the Town will vote to take relative to purchase of land from James Walsh (about 1.8 acres behind the Town Buildings) or acquiring an easement or lease interest therein to provide for maintaining the Fire Pond and to provide also for clearing and grading as may be needed for use as a playground or for other school purposes and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for these purposes or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to continue work on the reassessing of the Town as ordered by the State and take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad. 500

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$311.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the Council. ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$245.00 as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the Dartmouth-

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to continue its participation in a countywide solid waste study and support a county waste facility provided said study shows such action to be in the best interest of the Town and/or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including but not limited to, disaster aid and Highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or private agency or individual or take any other action relating thereto.

ABSTRACT OF 1979 TOWN MEETING RECORDS March 13, 1979

Meeting opened in form at 9:00 a.m. by Moderator Donald Crane. Warrant read. Polls opened at 10:30 a.m. Ass't Moderator A. Stanley Drew, Ass't Town Clerk Hazel Drew officiated at polls in the "Grange Room." Ballot clerks Elsie Fletcher and Zaida Cilley officiated at the checklists in the Selectmen's Office.

Ass't counters were Ethel Crane and Cynthia Brown,

Article 1. Officers Elected: Town Clerk, Wenonah A. Babb; Treasurer, Jayne Gilmore; Selectman for 3 years, Robert J. Wright; Road Agent, Robert Crane; Tax Collector, Charles E. Dalphond; Auditor, Karin Fox; Fire Chief, Charles Dalphond; Police Chief, James Houghton; Trustee of Trust Funds, Lynda B. Roy; Trustee of Library, Harriet Cofield; Planning Board, Preston Rolfe; Board of Assessors: 3 years, Hilbert Cofield; 2 years, Willard Brown; 1 year, Grace Jager.

Article 2. Moved "To accept all reports of officers and agents of the Town as presented in Town Report." Some errors were shown. Motion carried-

voice vote.

Article 3. Moved to dismiss. Carried-voice vote. (Article to build bridge over Ashuelot River-sponsors of article not present)

Article 4. Moved to dismiss. Carried-voice vote. (Money article for Art.

No. 3.)

Article 5. Motion made "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.82 and accept State Aid in the amount of \$5,332.13 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a set-off against the Principal payment of one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400.00." Motion Carried—voice vote.

Article 6. Motion made "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 and authorize the Selectmen to borrow by Long Term notes of \$30,000 for the purchase of a four-wheel drive, snow plow truck, equipment and body." Paper ballot—No-11, Yes-101.

Article 7. Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate from Highway Subsidy the sum of \$13,571 and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for Special

Highway Projects."- Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 8. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$63,500 for the operation of the Highway Department." Discussion of plowing Highland Lake private roads and small truck of department. Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 9. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and transfer to Capital Reserve for Permanent Bridges the sum of \$1,000 and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from Capital Reserve Funds money to be used for the repair of permanent bridges in an emergency." Motion carried—voice vote,

Article 10. Moved to dismiss. Carried-voice vote. (Dispatch & Answering Service.)

Article 11, Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 for support of the Fire Dept. for the ensuing year." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 12. Moved to dismiss, Carried-voice vote. (Hydrant at Millen Pond) Article 13. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500 and vote to borrow by Long-Term notes the sum of \$20,000 for building the proposed addition to the Shedd Free Library." Amended: "notes should be for 8 years." Amendment carried-voice vote. Motion for paper ballot. No-17; Yes-92 Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE TO IMPROVE THE APPEARANCE OF LOVELL MOUNTAIN

(Members: Ronald Jager and Preston Rolfe)

At the Town Meeting held on March 14, 1978, the citizens of Washington instructed us to "climb Lovell Mountain and to trim the soft-wood

trees on the top, so they would look neater." (Article 44)

As we did not know exactly what the people had in mind, we spent several months discussing the matter, taking pictures, making maps, and looking at books on mountains. (We got very interested in mountains, incidentally; we learned how to make them, and so on. One recipe for mountains, which we got from Oliver Chase, simply starts with a mole hill adds lots of wind, and goes on from there.)

At last, our committee decided to vote on whether to do the work on Lovell Mountain. Perhaps we could save the town money by not doing it. (It's just an old mountain anyway—who knows how long it will last?) We voted on the 31st of September and the result was a split decision; both members abstaining. So of course we decided to do half

the job.

We then had a dispute over the location of said mountain, so we formed a subcommittee to investigate and report. The subcommittee followed up local rumors and reported that there was indeed a mountain in the northern part of the town. (It was apparently caught on a rock between the Eccard Farm and Half Moon Pond, stuck fast.) This was probably not the one referred to in the Town Meeting motion but another one with the same name in about the same place. Anyway, the one we found was so handsome we could not improve upon it by pruning. Besides, there was no appropriation for pruning shears.

All this leaves us a bit confused and embarrassed, and we are sorry that our performance is no better than that of any other committee. But at least we had the good sense not to show up at the 1979 Town

Meeting.

(The above was read at Town meeting and it was voted to print it.)

Article 14. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,200 for the support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 15. Moved to dismiss. Carried-voice vote. (Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Assoc. Membership)

Article 16, Moved "to raise and appropriate the sum of \$283 to continue membership in the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 17. Moved "That the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad." (Letter from Squad of appreciation was read.) Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 18. Moved to dismiss, Carried-voice vote, (Donation to Newport Hospital.)

Article 19. Moved to dismiss, Carried-voice vote (Band Concerts)

Article 20. Moved "that the Town vote to establish a Parks and Recreation Commission in accordance with R.S.A. 31-47, said Commission to have five members, appointed by the Selectmen, Commission to include one Selectman, one School Board Member, one Planning Board Member, and two others. Duties to include planning and supervision of the care and maintenance of Parks, playgrounds, commons and other Town Lands, and the planning of Recreational and Educational Programs. Said commission to be established prior to the 1979 season." (Motion to dismiss lost—paper ballot: Yes—38, No—60)

Amended: "that the five members be appointed at large."-carried-voice vote.

Amended: "to abolish R.S.A. 31-47 from article." Carried-voice vote.

Amended: "to act as an advisory board with duties described by Selectmen."

Carried-voice vote.

Motion now reads: "that the Town vote to establish a Parks and Recreation Commission, said Commission to have five members appointed at large by Selectmen-Commission to act as an advisory board with duties as described by Selectmen, said commission to be appointed prior to the 1979 season. Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 21. Moved "That the Town vote to participate in a County-wide solid waste study and support a county facility, provided the Town determines said study show such action to be in the best interest of the Town." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 22, Moved to dismiss, Motion carried-voice vote, (Invoice of Taxable

Article 23. Motion made to "see if the Town will vote to require all members of the Board of Assessors who have not already attended the Dept. of Rev. Admin. Workshop for Assessors to do so during their first year in office," Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 24. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175 to paint the Town Hall." Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 25. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$830 to install lightening rods on the Town Hall." Paper ballot-motion lost-Yes-42, No-43.

Article 26. Moved to dismiss-paper ballot: Yes-54, No-42. (Use of Town Hall for functions in the Public Interest only, no private functions, and deposit for use required.)

Article 27, Moved to dismiss, Carried-voice vote, (NHMA Self-Funded Workers Compensation Program)

Article 28. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes," Motion carried—voice vote,

Article 29. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including, but not limited to, disaster and Highway funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from

the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or private agency or individual." Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 30, Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,785 for the completion of the Town Tax Map, and authorize the withdrawal of \$8,000 for this purpose from Revenue Sharing Funds, established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, with the balance of \$8,785 to be raised by taxation." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 31. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$76,840 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year," Motion carried-voice

vote.

Article 32, Motion to dismiss, Carried-voice vote, (Millen Pond Road oneway traffic: ordinance found to have been handled at Selectmen's meeting

rather than Special Town Meeting in 1969 as thought.)

Article 33. Moved that "the Selectmen be authorized to negotiate with J. Walsh, whose land adjoins the Town Common, whereby about 7,400 sq. ft. of Town land between Rte. 31, the Walsh residence, Barn and foundation of the old hotel be considered in exchange for an area of equal value of Walsh land lying between the easterly boundary of the Town Common and the stone wall common to Walsh and Fridlund." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 34. Other Busiess:

- a) Motion adopted to instruct Selectmen to insert in next year's Town Warrant an article formally naming the Library Addition: "The Preston E. Rolfe Addition. Further that the new book room in the library facility be named the Zaida E. Cilley Room; in honor of the two persons who have given so much time and labor to the Shedd Free Library for the benefit of the citizens of Washington." Motion carried—voice vote.
- b) Motion adopted to have Selectmen take proper action at their next regular Board meeting in regard to Article 32.

Polls were closed at 7:15 p.m. Meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT - 1979

CAMP MORGAN: The transfer of the Y.M.C.A. property at Camp Morgan has been completed and was in use by many for swimming, picnics, dances and baseball games.

We organized a "clean-up" day when many volunteers worked diligently to

complete the following:

1. swimming area cleaned

2. docks installed

3. fence at ball field rebuilt

beach area and tennis courts rehabilitated

boat safety zone installed

6. new steps at old dining hall installed 7. plumbing and electrical service repaired

8. main hall repaired for dances and general use to insurance company specifications (stair rails, safety lights, etc.).

During the summer the Highway Department cooperated in enlarging and

leveling the parking lot, cutting paths to main hall and installing lighting.

A summer caretaker was contracted with for mowing grass, building checks and use of area by authorized persons. This was at a minimal cost to the Town, A campfire area was provided for the Summer Activities programs.

CAMP MORGAN AUCTION: During the process of readying Camp Morgan for use as a Town recreation center, it became apparent that numerous and sundry items had been abandoned by the former owner. Most of the discarded items appeared worthless; a few had a nominal value. By mid-August an assortment of fixtures, furnishings, dishes, lumber, pipe, tools and other items had been moved to the old dining hall to be sold. The Selectmen turned to Auction-eer Richard Crane for advice; he promptly volunteered his services. On September 9, 1979, an auction was held and before sundown Richard's skill and charm converted the surplus goods to a cash return of \$2,039. Thank you, Richard Crane, for the generous gift of your professional services. Thanks also to your able assistants.

In the fall the three Selectmen and two volunteers stored all equipment for the winter and serviced the utilities.

TOWN DUMP: State of New Hampshire Board of Health considered closing the area due to prevailing conditions. This necessitated instituting regulations to control dumping. Scheduled hours and restrictions were started in early summer with Town Ordinance #W-1979-1 enacted on August 3, 1979.

A private contractor was hired to handle dumping, separate refuse and check authorized users. This resulted in a nearly 50% decline in the amount of refuse

dumped and will allow use of this area for several more years!

Selectmen are participating in the plans for the N.H./VT. solid waste program started in Claremont with a Government Grant of \$100,000. This project plans to sell steam power generated from refust to help lower costs of operation. If and when it becomes necessary to close the Washington Dump area, we will be permitted to use this facility.

LAND FOR PLAYGROUND: Selectmen have been in contact with James Walsh to negotiate for the use of the land behind the Town Hall as requested by vote of the Town at the 1979 meeting.

It is hoped a satisfactory arrangement can be made during coming summer months.

ENERGY CONSERVATION: We have completed an Energy Audit on the Town Hall which will be submitted to the State before Town Meeting date. This will determine if the Town is eligible for Federal Funding for heating or insulating the Town Hall.

We have contacted a qualified engineer to submit an estimate of the costs for a study relative to renovations or problems that might exist in the Town Hall.

This will be available for Town Meeting.

LIBRARY ADDITION: We, acting as coordinators, are planning for the completion of the Library addition this summer. We were successful in hiring a contractor for the building at a favorable price and we plan to complete the project within the funds available.

EAST WASHINGTON CEMETERY: The addition to the East Washington Cemetery with the help of a generous donation of land from Ludwig Paul has now been cleared and leveled. Plans are in process to have one section available for use in the near future with an access road plus some grading at the approach from the old cemetery.

This addition of nearly two acres, in our opinion, will suffice the Town for

the next 50 to 100 years!!

SPEEDERS? In response to citizens' complaints of speeding on Town Roads, we have been in contact with the State of N.H. Traffic Engineers. They recommend that "advisory" speed signs lower than the legal limit can and should be posted. The Highway Department will post signs on the Half Moon Pond Road and Millen Pond Road.

SHEDD FREE LIBRARY

Report of Trustees and Librarian for 1979

With 4,598 books and 154 recordings in the Library, plus the 1,348 books borrowed from the Bookmobile, we had a total circulation of 5,847 books and magazines. At the present time we have 138 adult borrowers and 155 juvenile—not a bad record for a small library in a small town.

During the year, 16 books were borrowed thru inter-library loan from the State Library, Concord and the Public Libraries of Dover, Peterborough, Exeter

and Keene.

A 15 volume set of Charles Dickens was given to the Library in memory of John and Maria Prescott Bell, by their daughter, Harriett Bell Cofield. In all 173

new books were added to the Library this year.

In late March the Library joined the Nubanusit Library Cooperative—a group of about 25 libraries in the South-Western area. The purpose of the Co-op. is to obtain better discounts on books and Library supplies for its members. There was no fee to join and no dues to pay, so it seemed that we had nothing to lose

and perhaps much to gain. So far it has worked out well on books.

In mid-April ground was broken for our long awaited addition to the Library. Progress seemed slow at times but eventually it was completed and we began the pleasant task of choosing paint and carpeting. Bids were made and eventually one for each job was selected. It became necessary at this time to close the Library for approximately two weeks over the Christmas, New Year's holidays because all books had to be boxed and then moved from place to place while the painting and carpeting was going on. We regretted the inconvenience to our patrons but it truly was necessary. The Librarian, the Trustees and our invaluable volunteer, Pearl Devlin, labored mightily during this time. We still await the arrival of the wooden shelving for the new room—which will be the Reference—non-fiction section. Hopefully these will be in place and the books upon them by the time you read this.

The middle of May, Preston Rolfe attended the annual two-day Conference of the State Library Commission in North Conway. At this time the Library was awarded a certificate in Recognition of Shedd Free Library meeting qualification

standards under the Statewide Library Development Program for 1979.

The Library Equipment Fund, which was started in April of 1978 by the Librarian, Zaida E. Cilley, had reached the sum of \$1,485.57 when we began drawing on it in December. Carpeting for the main room and hall of the Old Library, to match that selected for the New Room, was the first purchase. Now a file cabinet, a new clock and several other items are either on order or being considered.

At the moment the balance is \$1,146.17.

We have changed the Library House for the winter to Monday and Wednesday: 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., eliminating the evening hours. We have made the change for several reasons. Number one being energy conservation. Heat and light in the building is more economical on a straight five hour basis than the split hours of 1 - 3:30 and 7 - 9:00. We are also conforming more closely to the winter hours of our local store and the dump. Statistics also show that evening patrons are not very numerous in the winter. We also hope to attract the High School students, who formerly arrived back in Town too late to use the Library in the afternoon. When summer comes we plan to adapt to hours that will reflect the warm weather needs of our patrons.

Because of the rising cost of books, electricity and fuel and the fact that we have almost doubled the space to be heated and lighted, we feel that we must ask

for \$4,800.00 this year-an increase of \$600.00 over last year's request.

We, the Librarian and the Trustees, are very pleased with the results of our new addition to date. We hope that all of you will be also. This summer, when we have our dedication ceremonies, it will be 99 years since the original building was dedicated. We sincerely hope that all of you will turn out for what, we feel sure, will be a memorable and happy occasion.

During the past year burglaries have decreased. This was done with the help of Townspeople being observent and more patrol and residence checks.

We have three new part-time officers in the department. The first female officer in the department is Kelly Cornell. Kelly attends Keene State College and is a member of the College Security.

Another new member is Walter Peck, III. Walter is very interested in the Police Department. He put in nine hours during the past year as a donation to the Town. The third new officer is William Ruby. As "Hank" works with me on a con-

The third new officer is William Ruby. As "Hank" works with me on a construction crew, two officers are within reach of the dispatch operator which is an advantage to the Town.

We have also added a police vehicle to the department which has logged 950 miles in the short time in use. This vehicle will save the Town money that the Town otherwise would have to pay out for the use of a private vehicle.

The new dispatch system will be put in use by the middle of 1980. There is a good chance that it will cost the Town less than what it is currently paying to the Continental Telephone Co.

The dog problem this year has been very small. Let's hope it stays that way. Please remember that if you notice something not right, call the Police Dept. at 495-3232 and inform us. Anything minor could always lead into something major.

Thank you all for the assistance you have given the Police Department in 1979 and I hope you will continue to do so in 1980.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort

between town fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

REPORT TO SELECTMEN PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

The Parks and Recreation Commission first met on May 24, 1979, Original members were Hubie Williams, James Gaskell, Richard Dietrich, Walter Peck III, and Julia Dunton, Mr. Williams later resigned and was replaced by Robert Cilley, Mr. Cilley was selected as Chairman.

The Parks and Recreation Commission serves as an advisory board to the Selectmen, with duties to be described by the Selectmen. During the year we

have considered the following:

Camp Morgan land use and regulations.

Resident accessability to Camp Morgan land.

Retention of Camp Morgan buildings and maintenance.

Maintenance of the East Washington Beach and Picnic area.

Restoration of and continued maintenance of the Town House and Town Common.

Summer Recreation Director and Caretaker at Camp Morgan.

The acquisition of land from James Walsh.

On October 12, 1979 the Commission conducted a discussion meeting at the Town House with approximately 25 residents, Suggestions were made about the use of Camp Morgan and other town lands. It was recommended that the Selectmen take a complete inventory of the Camp Morgan property and equipment and make the property easily accessable for community use year round.

In January 1980 the following recommendations were made to the Selectmen

for consideration in the March 1980 Town Meeting:

 That the Selectmen hire a Summer Recreation Director. Duties to include establishing and supervising a summer recreation program.

That the Selectmen hire a part-time Caretaker for the Camp Morgan property.

Duties to include supervision and small scale maintenance,

 That the Selectmen hire a qualified builder to investigate the structural soundness of the Town House and prepare estimates for needed repairs in time for the March Town Meeting.

 That the Selectmen receive estimates for the restoration of the Town Common in time for the March Town Meeting.

 That the Selectmen prepare a complete report on the insurance coverage on Town Property and town liabilities.

That the Selectmen acquire the Walsh land by purchase, not by trade.

7. That the Selectmen formally request the State Department of Economics and Resources to conduct a management study of the Camp Morgan property, including recommendations for recreation, maintenance, and economic potential.

The members of the Parks and Recreation Commission are quite willing to act responsibly in matters of Town recreation and parks. However, there has been no description of responsibilities or specific directions on which to act. We urge that the Town or the Selectmen clarify who is to take initiative in setting direction for this commission.

TAX MAP REPORT 1979

As I reported in 1977, T. W. Chesley of Northwood contracted on April 15, 1977 to prepare a Tax Map for the Town by July 1, 1978. I made no report in 1978 as I did not do much work. I did no work in 1979 but am reporting on the

progress of the Tax Map itself.

When a public inspection of Mr. Chesley's map occurred at the Town Hall in July 1978 (I was visiting in Hawaii, so did not see it) it was obvious to the Town that he had not satisfactorily completed his contract and final payment was not made. Later the Selectmen contracted with Allan Swanson, who has an excellent organization for surveying and mapping work in Nashua, to prepare a new tax map.

(He also has a camp on Faxon Hill.)

Ground controls were located by Allan Swanson, assisted by Philip Barker, and complete aerial photos were flown. From these up-to-date aerials, photogrametric plans were developed during the summer to give a tax map of eighteen, 22" x 34" sheets with index and a set of aerial photos for the Town to use for planning. A local office was established next to the Post Office under Mr. R. Coco from which to check deeds at the Sullivan County Registry in Newport. On October 26 and 30 I turned over the plans and descriptions of over 18,000 acres of property which I had collected between 1973 and 1977 for the tax map before Mr. Chesley took over. Since I left for California on November 5 I cannot report beyond that. While it is unfortunate Mr. Chesley did not finish the map, I am sure Allan Swanson will produce a more accurate and useable map that will be valuable to the Town.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board under Sub-Division work handled one annexation, three minor sub-divisions and one major sub-division of six lots. We had many inquiries, some of which will result in sub-divisions in the future.

The acquisition of the Camp Morgan Property is now complete and the facility received immediate use from the date of closing on May 10 (including

swimming on that date).

The most important item for consideration by the community at this time is the Master Plan. It is the desire of the Chairman of the Planning Board to get as much input and citizen participation in the preparation of this plan as possible. This should be done with the use of CITIZEN ADVISORY BOARDS. These Boards would work in conjunction with the Planning Board in gathering data and formulation of the Master Plan for the Town. So as a beginning — What do you desire your community to be in ten, fifteen or twenty years? Please don't keep your ideas to yourself, it could hurt us all.

REPORT OF THE REGIONAL ASSOCIATION 1979

New Hampshire is divided into six regions to promote travel and tourism. We are in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region along with 35 neighboring towns. Each town has a councilor in this association, the non-profit organization to promote travel and tourism in our area. Operating costs come from a State appropriation and contributions from member towns.

Washington is asked to contribute \$245 to the association as its share of the cost of support based on our population of 445. That comes to about 55 cents

each.

Last year Washington received \$2,398 from the State Rooms and Meals Tax. Since one of the results of tourism promotion is an increase in this tax collection by the State and distributed to the towns, it follows that Washington benefits from the promotion of tourism in our area by the Association.

Perhaps, as some have said at Town Meeting, we do not need to promote tourism too much in our Town, but if promoting it in our region increases our share of the State tax, couldn't a contribution of 55 cents each be considered as a good

investment?

Along with making a contribution, the opportunity for a councilor to participate with councilors from neighboring towns at a Region Association meeting is another benefit that helps encourage cooperation and discourage isolation, both important factors to a town in this complicated world of today.

It appears an appropriation of \$245 to support the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association seems to be in the best interests of Washington and deserves

our approval.

REPORT ON THE REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION 1979 (Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council)

The Town continued membership in the regional planning Commission now called the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. There are some 20 member towns including three in Vermont. Each town is entitled to two directors although Washington has only one, since no one would accept to replace Thomas Heavy who moved away in 1977. I am one of some forty directors and attended meetings in June and September. I have missed meetings from January through April and again in November and December while away. We should have a second councilor so the Town will not miss voting on issues. I was elected to the eight member executive committee which meets monthly in Lebanon but had to miss five meetings.

Robert Ward, Regional Planner, whose services we have utilized many times, resigned in September and Marcia Williams replaced him in October. In September Mrs. Fay Nicely of Acworth became the Community Planning Assistant to work primarily with the towns of Charlestown, Goshen, Langdon, Lempster and Washington in preparing Master Plans now mandatory under certain conditions to comply with new State laws recently passed. Her background of three years as Town Clerk of Acworth and eight years on their planning board, five years as Chairman, during the preparation of the Acworth Master Plan, considered a model one for a small town, will make her services very valuable to our Town. She has already met with our Planning Board who are working on our Master Plan. This is a long process and could be very costly if we had to contract for consultant services.

The cost of providing regional planning commission services are met by Federal, State and Town funds. Our share of Town funds for 1980 is \$311. up \$28 from last year due to increase in per capita rate from 69 to 75 cents and increase in population to 445. We should appropriate the \$311 and continue membership. This will allow us to continue to use the available services as well as to benefit from

sharing ideas and experiences with our neighboring towns on a regional basis as well as having a vote on any decision that could affect our Town in the field of

planning.

Whether we agree or not, planning is an important phase of Town government and it extends beyond town lines. We should not isolate our Town from the region, but cooperate, as a member of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council, in order to be aware of what is happening on a regional basis that could influence what is best for us in our planning.

I regret I have missed some meetings but I am willing to represent the Town as long as you wish me to, as I believe a part time director is better than none, however, a second director has been needed since 1977 and we should have one as soon

as possible.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT 1979

Since 1972 Civil Defense is officially the Defense Civil Preparedness Agency with emphasis on preparedness against civil and natural emergencies rather than nuclear attacks.

During my absence from Washington this past year, Selectman Robert J. Wright was the acting Civil Defense Director. He is also a Captain in the Air Force Reserve and was assigned by the Air Reserve Personnel Center, at our request to the State Civil Defense Office, to the Washington Civil Defense Office as a Mobilization Designee (MOBDES) for active duty from January 29 to February 9, 1979. He conducted the C. D. office daily, worked on C. D. schedules and programs, attended State C. D. seminars, supervised construction of record storage facilities in the Town Hall, all directly helping our Town Civil Defense. Indirectly this helped his reserve status toward retirement.

Federal Surplus Property used to be distributed through this local agency but since 1978 that is no longer true. I believe this now goes through the Selectmen's Office.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Washington qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Washington Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March 1980, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot the following school district officials:
 - A. Moderator for the ensuing year.
 - B. Clerk for the ensuing year.
 - C. Treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - D. One member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and fix the compensation for any other officers or agents of the district.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and accept on behalf of the district, any and all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire for the school district for the school year 1980-81.
- 6. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$19,000.00 for the purchase of a new school bus, or to take any other faction in relation thereto.
 - 7. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purchase of a new oil burner for the Washington School, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
 - 8. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purchase of energy conservation shades, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
 - 9. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 for the purchase of carpeting for the Washington Center School or to take any other action in relation thereto.
 - 10. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purchase of room fans, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
 - 11. To see if the District will vote to change the title of the office of Financial Coordinator for the School Administrative Unit No. 24 to Business Administrator, School Administrative Unit No. 24. Further, to ratify the appointment of David Hill as Business Administrator with the authority to perform the functions

of the office in accordance with the laws of New Hampshire, or take any other action in relation thereto.

- 12. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 two thousand dollars to be used, if required, by a School Facility Building Committee consisting of five (5) members to be appointed by the School Board. The two thousand dollars is to be dispersed only upon the approval of the School Board, to provide the services of architects, engineers, or other professionals to assist the committee in making necessary architectural drawings regarding the future facilities needs of the Washington School District. The report of said committee, with its recommendations, will be made to the District no later than the next Annual School District Meeting, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 13. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE to the Citizens of the Washington School District

A recent report from the State of New Hampshire Elementary Education Consultant found the Washington Central School lacking in several of the state's elementary minimum standards. Currently, Washington students do not receive the necessary part-time physical education, part-time guidance, part-time school nurse or certified library services to fully meet the requirements. It should be noted that these requirements are "minimum" ones that most elementary schools in New Hampshire are meeting. To the extent that these services provide a well-rounded educational experience for students, there absence represents a need to be responded to by the citizens of Washington.

While I strongly support the continuation of small schools such as Washington's, I believe that it is equally important that such schools attempt to provide their students with the necessary educational services and experiences for their graduates to successfully compete with students from larger schools. We will continue to investigate ways that these currently absent services can be provided, at the most

reasonable cost possible.

However, even if we can find some way to provide these services on a shared or consultant basis, adequate space for their proper use will continue to be a significant problem. I feel that the following quote from my 1978-79 report warrants repeating:

"The continuing student population growth in Washington is placing increased demands upon our facilities. Conservative population projections indicate that we will quickly be reaching the point where the District must

consider providing additional space for its students.

While the programs currently being offered students continue at reasonable levels of effectiveness, increased student enrollments can have a significant negative impact. With all regular school space being utilized and other building space also being used, the District should be prepared to support the efforts of the School Board to study the various alternatives. The decisions that must be made in the next few years will have long-range impact upon the quality of education available to students.

The current separation of classrooms in two buildings, lack of sufficient teaching space, lack of storage space, lack of room for special helpers to work, lack of adequate playground space, etc. are factors which must be addressed. The town's purchase of Camp Morgan and its potential as a possi-

ble school warrant further study.

The impact of the current lack of space upon general classroom operations cannot be minimized. Until the overall space problems are resolved, the highest degree of cooperation between parents, board, administration and

town officials, teachers and students will be needed."

At the High School level we can report several positive developments at Hills-boro-Deering High School. (1) New Principal Robert Norton has restored student discipline (2) the English and Social Studies curricula are being revised for 1980-81 to further emphasize basic skills (3) various programs are being implemented to encourage student excellence (i.e. Math League Competitions, College Board Preparation Sessions, etc.) (4) extensive progress is being made in providing improved opportunities for Juniors and Seniors to attend area vocational schools (5) the new building addition has provided superior library and music facilities and reduced overall crowding problems and (6) there has been an expansion of science lab facilities and programs. I believe that progress at Hillsboro-Deering in the last 2½ years has resulted in significantly better educational opportunities for the students of Washington.

At the elementary school level, I am impressed with the student-centered approach and dedication of our teachers and the additional aide time that has been provided. The new Science program in grades 6-8 has been an improvement of note; as has been the additional specialist time provided students with special

needs. We are proposing a new Math program which will hopefully provide needed continuity in the school. I have also provided for more time of the Assistant Super-intendent of Schools, Ralph Minichiello, former Principal of Hillsboro-Deering Elementary Schools, to be spent in working with Washington's teachers, where his expertise and experience are expected to be of assistance

We will all continue our efforts to develop an excellent school for your children

that will warrant your continued support.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The past year has been a busy and successful one at the Washington Center School. Through the efforts of teachers, townspeople, and the P.T.G. we have had programs in bowling, softball, swimming, aerobics and skiing lessons as well as a Christmas trip to Boston to see the Nutcracker Suite. These "extra" activities really give the children something to look forward to. Our older children in particular are more likely to see their education in our three room school in a more positive way. The School Board would like to thank all those who have helped our children in the School.

As we opened School this September, two of our three full time teachers were new. Mrs. Mary Ann Nagy has returned to teach grades one and two. Mrs. Pam Kok has joined us to teach grades three, four and five. With Mrs. Jean Murdough on a one year maternity leave of absence, Miss Amelia Johnson has been

hired to teach grades 6, 7, & 8 for the 1979-1980 school year.

This school year has seen a continuation of the movement to develop a grade one through eight curriculum in the areas of math and reading. We will be purchasing a new series of mathematics textbooks next year and hope to implement a handbook for the Washington Center School with the help of a part-time

School Principal.

Last summer saw a small (8' x 22') addition to the School. This area provides a bathroom for the upstairs classroom, a teachers' room, and a small room for individual and small group instruction. The lack of space within the School continues to be a major concern. Space Study Committees in 1974 and 1978 have both reported that we should be actively working on a plan for larger school facilities. It is the plan of the School Board to form a committee to work with the Board and an architectural firm to design and plan a larger school facility.

The School Board is not recommending the building of a new school at this time. The Board is trying to insure that a well thought out plan will be ready to

go when it is needed.

The Junior High students have graciously helped out as listeners for young

Mrs. Fox spends one hour and a half with us each day supervising "Readiness"

activities. She also assists all three classes as lunch and playtime monitor.

Miss Cornell, an education student at Keene State, gave us two days of her time. Mr. Minichiello has become a welcome addition to our Gym class. (Ask Scott Goodspeed!)

So far it has been a busy year with an abundance of sharing and learning. We

hope to complete the year with the same spirit of cooperation.

MARY ANN NAGY Teacher, Grades 1 - 2

Twenty eight children, four of them new to Washington, began school in September in the upstairs room of the schoolhouse in grades 3, 4 and 5. The first special event was a puppet show presented by the staff of the Squam Lakes Science Center. They brought the added attraction of live animals for the children to see and touch. This prepared the way for our field trip to the Science Center. There the children learned about the flow of energy through the food chain, and were escorted on a tour of the many exhibits and nature trails. The live animals were particularly enjoyed. We followed up the trip back in school with a class-con-

structed bulletin board, and further study of the concepts that were presented.

This fall we began using "Precision Teaching" in the classroom; a system of one minute tests taken on a daily basis in various subject areas. We are concentrating on math and handwriting. We held an open house to explain the new program to interested parents. Each child checks and records his own work; feedback and reinforcement are immediate and daily gains are obvious. The children have been

tackling the new project with enthusiasm.

We have certainly been making good use of the new addition to the schoolhouse. Having more space has facilitated the re-organization and inventory of equipment and supplies. The new back rooms are also used on a daily basis for individual instruction. Another addition this year is Mrs. Ethel Jarvis, our full-time aide, whose work is appreciated by all of us.

Halloween brought an occasion for creativity as the children wrote and acted in their own plays. Later on, in December, we visited the Nathaniel Hawthorne College Theater for the production of "Braco, The Prince Frog", which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. After the performance the children were able to explore the stage and speak with the actors, which further enhanced their awareness of theater.

December has also brought the opportunity for some parents to share their talents with us. The Franquemonts came in to give us a demonstration of spinning and weaving, as well as sharing some of their experiences in Peru. They also brought enough materials so everyone could try spinning wool and weaving for themselves. It was a true hands-on learning experience.

Projected for the spring are: a field trip to see maple syrup in the making, further use of the facilities at Camp Morgan, more parents visiting to share their occupations and hobbies, and much more. The children will be given many opportunities to expand their knowledge and experiences, as well as increase their skills in the various academic areas.

MRS. PAM KOK Teacher, Grades 3, 4 and 5

This Fall began with many changes. Over the Summer the classroom was given a fresh coat of paint; yellow wainscoating, white walls, and ceiling.

An eight foot by eight foot bookcase was added to the room. We now have the

beginning of a proper school library!

Mrs. Hofford numbered many of the books this summer using the Dewey Decimal system. Mrs. Devlin has been coming in two days a week carding the books and preparing a card catalogue file. We hope to have the library in operating condition soon. Students will be given the opportunity to be the "librarian of the week."

Many school supplies, audio visual equipment and books have been inventoried.

We hope to have all school property inventoried in the near future.

The academic year is full of new programs. The English program incorporates many of the past curriculum material and new materials as well. The children are reading 3 - 4 books a month this fall, many of which are Newberry and Hans Christian Anderson Award Winners. We hope their interest in good literature continues.

A new math program, D. C. Heath, is being utilized this year. It is well received by the children and teacher alike.

The "STEM Science" program, new this year, is also being implimented in the class.

Another new program, Precision Teaching, is being utilized in Mrs. Kok's classroom and the Junior High. Thus far the results are favorable, especially with the children who chart their progress and receive immediate feedback.

Individualized learning is also a major emphasis in all learning areas.

The Art and Music programs are important contributions to the weekly curriculum. The children went on a music field trip this Fall to a rehearsal of the New Hampshire Symphony. Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Weinburg are also helping us out with our Christmas play.

To enhance the children's awareness in theatre, we went on a field trip to Nathaniel Hawthorne College to see "Bracko, The Prince Frog." We hope it will increase their theatrical awareness and help them with their own production "A

Muppet Christmas Show."

We hope the rest of the coming year will be as exciting and productive.

March 10, 1979

Washington School Meeting was opened in form by School Moderator Donald R. Crane with the reading of the warrant at 8 P. M. Polls were opened at 8:15 P. M. Ballot Clerks for the evening were School Board members.

ARTICLE 1: Moderator Robert Wright had 1 vote, Robert Crane had 3 votes,

Donald Crane had 108 votes, and was declared elected.

School Board for 3 years Suzanne Horner had 1 vote, Julia Dunton had 1 vote, Earl Goodspeed had 12 votes, Robert Dunton had 39 votes, Vivian Clark had 59 votes and was declared elected.

School Clerk Wenonah Babb had 115 votes and was declared elected.

School Treasurer Elizabeth Wood had 2 votes, Marcia Goodspeed had 2 votes,

and Lynda Roy had 111 votes and was declared elected.

ARTICLE 2: Motion made by James Russell seconded by Susan Toczko "I move that the District vote to accept the salaries of the School Board and other officers and agents of the District as printed in the annual report." Motion carried voice vote.

ARTICLE 3: Motion made by James Russell, seconded by Susan Toczko "I move that the District vote to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committies or Officers as printed in the annual report." The financial report was questioned from the floor as to why different totals did not agree. Mr. Hill from the Supervisory Union could not explain, except to state that part of the report was from the previous year. Mr. Horner objected to the School Board making a motion to accept their own reports. Ruled by Moderator that the Board was right. Objection was withdrawn by Mr. Horner. After much discussion and much dissatisfaction in the Supervisory Union being voiced, Article 3 was voted down voice vote.

Amended by Robert Crane, seconded by Oliver Chase "I move to amend the \$1,100.00 to read \$175.00" Amendment carried voice vote. Motion carried voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: Motion made by Robert Dunton, seconded by Susan Toczko "I move that District vote to raise and appropriate the sum or \$1,000.00 to complete the construction of additional storage space in the Washington Center School.

Motion carried voice vote.

ARTICLE 7: Moderator ruled that the part in regard to School District Clerk could not be voted on. Motion made by Vivian Clark, seconded by Elizabeth Wood "I move the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of hiring a bookkeeper for Washington School District." After much discussion paper ballot requested. Yes 36 No 37 Motion lost.

Voice vote.

ARTICLE 9: Motion made by Susan Toczko, seconded by Robert Dunton "I move that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to pro-
