TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will open at 10:00 a.m., and not close before 6:00 p.m. to elect Town Officers. The following articles will be acted upon:

ARTICLE 1. To elect by nonpartisan ballot a Town Clerk for one year; a Town Treasurer for one year; one Selectman for three years; a Road Agent, a Tax Collector, an Auditor, a Fire Chief, and a Police Chief, for one year each; one Trustee of the Library for three years; two members of the Planning Board for three years each; one member of the Board of Assessors for two years; one member of the Board of Assessors for three years; and any other Town Officers.

ARTICLE 2. To hear reports of any and all officers and agents of the Town and take any action in relation thereto. ACCEPTED AS PRIMITED

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal of \$3,500. from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and to see what additional sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of radios for the Town Police Department or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or borrow by Long Term Note and appropriate for purchase of radios for the Fire Department or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operation of the Police Department in the ensuing year and take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year and/or take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the acquisition of land from James Walsh (about 1.8 acres behind the Town Buildings) for Public safety; playground security; additional parking and other Town purposes.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and operation of Parks and Playgrounds in the ensuing year and take any action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of Town Dumps in the ensuing year and take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Town Cemeteries in the ensuing year and take any action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Highway Projects in the ensuing year and to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use \$5,000. from Surplus funds; withdraw and appropriate \$6,000. from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds; and borrow the balance on Long Term Notes for the purchase of a truck for the Highway Department and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year and take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$779.95 and accept State aid in the amount of \$5,199.65 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a setoff against the Principal Payment of one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400.00.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insulate the ceiling of the old Library and to repair and restore the wooden pediment and decoration over the front door of the Library.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library in the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and carry appropriate for maintenance of and repairs to the Town Hall and other Town Buildings and take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Forest Fires in the ensuing year and take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To see what action the Town will take realative to the disposal of the former Duggan Boat Landing property on Island Pond Road. DIS MISSE

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$295,00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the Council. (ARR) 60

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to dedicate the Camp Morgan campfire area to Hubert L. Williams and that it be known as the "Hubie Campfire Site."

ARTICLE 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with Allan Swanson, Inc. for an annual update of the Town Tax Maps and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for this purpose and/or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the State or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent.

ARTICLE 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to continue work on the reassessing of the Town as ordered by the State and take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.80 for NH/VT solid waste project planning costs as related to waste disposal for the Town of Washington and assign a committee of three to represent the Town in said planning, and to request the Moderator to appoint such committee by March 20, 1981.

ARTICLE 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards payment of Long Term Notes: Highway Truck-\$15,000.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to annually retain the Town Clerk's copy of the Annual Checklist as a permanent copy in the archives. (R.S.A. allows disposal after 5 years.)

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town Purposes, including but not limited to, disaster aid and highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or private agency or individual or take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for use as a setoff against the budgeted appropriation for the following specific purpose in the amount indicated herewithin or take any other action hereon:

Meeting opened at 9:00 a.m. with Moderator, Donald R. Crane reading the warrant. Polls opened at 10:00 a.m. Assistant Moderator, A. Stanley Drew and Assistant Town Clerk, Hazel Drew officiated at the polls in the "Grange Room." Ballot Clerks Elsie Fletcher and Zaida Cilley officiated at the checklists. Assis-

tant counters appointed were Ethel Crane and Cynthia Brown.

Article 1. Officers Elected: Moderator for 2 years, Donald R. Crane; Selectman for 3 years, Roland Q. Melzard; Town Clerk, Wenonah A. Babb; Treasurer, Elizabeth A. Wood; Tax Collector, Charles E. Dalphond; Road Agent, Robert W. Crane: Police Chief, James F. Houghton; Fire Chief, Charles E. Dalphond; Auditor, G. Michael Otterson, Trustee of Trust Funds, Cynthia Brown; Library Trustee, Mabel Kimmel; Planning Board, Diane Drew; Board of Assessors, Kathleen Hill; Supervisor of the Checklist, Louis Iadonisi.

All amendments to the "Land Use Ordinance of 1974" appearing on the

Ballot as referendum items were passed.

Article 2. Moved "to accept all reports as written." After discussion and protest by past Treasurer Jayne Gilmore that changes were made in her report

the motion lost, voice vote. Reports not accepted.

Article 3. Lengthy discussion of Road Agent Robert Crane's spending of his money during past year. Moved "that the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$15,024,97 and raise and appropriate \$4,000, for special Highway Projects for the ensuing year." Amended: "raise and appropriate sum of \$4,000., appropriate all money forthcoming from Highway Subsidy to be used for Special Highway Projects." Amended: "to cut \$4,000. to \$1,000." Paper Ballot for 2nd amendment: Yes-32, No-70-lost. First amendment carried, voice vote. Motion carried, voice vote.

Article 4. Moved to dismiss. Carried-voice vote. (Article for Highway Garage

Article 5. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400. and instruct the Selectmen to withdraw from Permanent Bridge Fund \$2,200. plus any interest to date for the replacement of the bridge on Smith

Pond Road with an Arch Pipe." Motion carried -voice vote.

Article 6. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$788.14 and accept State Aid in the amount of \$5,254.28 for Town Road Aid. The total to be used as a set-off against the Principal payment on one Faxon Hill Road Note in the amount of \$5,400." Motion carried, voice vote.

Voted to adjourn for 1 hour-reconvened at 1:20 p.m.

Article 7. Moved to dismiss. Carried-paper ballot, yes-98, no-28. (Article

for purchase of dump truck for Highway Department.)

Article 8. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$66,500, for the operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year." Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 9. Moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year." Motion

carried - voice vote.

Article 10. Moved "to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300, to install aluminum siding on the Center Fire Station." Amended: "new siding only after the removal of oldsiding and black paper in existence," Motion to dismiss. Second amendment to dismiss lost - voice vote. First amendment carried-voice vote. Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 11. Moved "that the Town vote to assume the maintenance of the Security Light on the Marlow side of Ashuelot Pond." Motion carried

voice vote.

Article 12. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,800, for support of the Shedd Free Library." Amended: "to add \$4,000. to buy a copier to be put in the Library." Amendment lost -voice vote. Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 13. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. for employment of a caretaker for Camp Morgan and to establish a Park & Recreation Advisory Committee, consisting of 5 members to serve for a 3-year term; initially, 1 for 3 years, 2 for 2 years, and 2 for 1 year." Motion to dismiss—lost voice vote. Amended: "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to plant trees on the common." Lost—voice vote. Amended: "to change motion to \$4,000. to improve the common." Lost—voice vote. Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 14. Moved "that the Town vote to dedicate the new addition to the Shedd Free Library to Preston E. Rolfe and the new book room in the Library

facility to Zaida E. Cilley." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 15. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize withdrawal of all monies and close out the Capital Reserve Fund for the Library addition and appropriate said monies towards completion of the addition." Motion carried – voice vote.

Article 16. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500, for the acquisition of a copy machine for the Town Office." Motion carried—voice vote.

Polls closed at 6:30 p.m.-adjourned ½ hour for supper. Reconvened at 7:00 p.m.

Article 17. Moved to dismiss. Carried. (Article relative to prohibit commercial

storage within Town of Toxic waste and poisons.)

Article 18. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. and withdraw the money in the Old Home Day Certificate, to be used for observing Old Home Day." Amended: "that Old Home Day be observed in conjunction with the Dedication of the Library addition in 1980." Amended: "that the Selectmen be instructed to appoint a committee of 5 to act as an Old Home Day Committee." 2nd amendment carried—voice vote. 1st amendment carried—voice vote. Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 19. Moved "to authorize the Selectmen to acquire an easement or lease interest in the Walsh land (about 1.8 acres) behind the Town Buildings to provide for maintaining the fire pond and to provide for clearing and grading as may be necessary for use as a playground or other school purposes and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500, for these purposes." Motion carried

voice vote.

Article 20. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100. to continue work on the re-assessing of the Town as ordered by the State of New Hampshire." Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 21. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500, as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 22. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$311, and to continue its membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council." Motion carried-voice vote.

Article 23. Moved to dismiss, Carried -voice vote, (Article relative to mem-

bership in the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region)

Article 24. Moved "that the Town vote to continue its participation in a country-wide solid waste study and support a country-wide facility." Amended: "to add, "providing said study shows such action to be in the best interest of the Town." Amendment carried – voice vote. Motion carried – voice vote.

Article 25. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including, but not limited to disaster and Highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal, State or private agency or individual." Motion carried – voice vote.

Article 26. Moved "to continue the policy voted in 1961." (Note: this article is relative to selling any Real Estate or surplus equipment.) Amended: "only real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deed." Amended: "to advertise all surplus equipment." 2nd amendment carried—voice vote. 1st amendment carried—

voice vote. Motion carried -voice vote.

Article 27. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the withdrawal of and appropriate from Trust Fund (cemetery lots sold) the sum of \$500, for the completion of the Paul Section of the East Washington Cemetery." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 28. Moved to dismss. Carried-voice vote. (Article to finance engineering study of the Town Hall.) At this time Oliver Chase and Frederick Otterson offered to each give a day to check out the building. Their offer was grate-

fully accepted.

Article 29. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000. towards payment on the long-term notes-Highway Truck, \$15,000. due in 1980; Library addition, \$5,000. due in 1980; Camp Morgan installment, due in 1980." Amended: "to add an additional \$15,000, to finalize paying for the truck." This was ruled out of order by the Moderator, and was disputed by Mr. Robert Crane who made the amendment motion. Paper ballot called for on this question—"Do you support the Moderator's ruling in regard to the Highway note due in 1981?" Yes-38, No-33. Motion carried—voice vote.

Article 30. Separate Motions on Heating & Insulation for Town Hall. Moved: "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,230, to insulate the Town Hall." Amended: "subject to the Selectmen's approval based upon the volunteer building inspector's reports." Amendment carried – voice vote. Motion carried – voice vote. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000. to replace heating system in the Town Hall." (Motion to dis-

miss lost - voice vote.) Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 31. Moved "that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow

in anticipation of taxes." Motion carried - voice vote.

Article 32. Moved "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88,368. to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year," Amended: "to change amount to read \$87,368 and withdraw the \$1,000. for Recreation Director." Amendment lost -voice vote. Amended: "to add \$2,000. to Town Changes." "Question" called for, paper ballot. Yes-37, No-14. 2nd amendment lost -voice vote. Amended: "to add \$1,000. to go in Contingency Fund for the purpose of getting help in setting up a new form of bookkeeping if needed." Amendment carried - voice vote. Amendment: "that the Forest Fire fund be increased by \$250." Amendment lost-voice vote. Motion as amended to \$89,368. carried -voice vote.

Article 33. Other Business:

Moved "that the choice of the Town Hall heating system (to be purchased under Article 30) be made by a committee consisting of the Board of Selectmen and three additional members to be chosen by the Selectmen." Motion carried - voice vote.

Moved "that the Selectmen cause to be printed in the Town Reports a complete list of all motor vehicles and machines owned by the Town of Washington, including the vintage year and year of acquistion; also a list of all machines and vehicles rented by the Town during the year." Motion carried - voice vote.

Moved"that the Town vote to request the Selectmen to look into a better

format for the Town Report." Motion carried - voice vote.

Meeting adjourned at 2:30 a.m.!!

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen are pleased to report that the heating and insulation programs voted at the 1980 Town meeting have been completed and are working satisfactorily. The entire job, including several unanticipated extras, was finished within \$310, of the appropriations. The savings have already been proven in the 1980 figures for heating which shows a savings of \$1,580, over last years cost.

Old Home Day was celebrated on August 8, 9 & 10 with many citizens, summer friends and all Town Officials declaring it to be an outstanding event.

We appreciated the fine work put in by the Committee who planned the program which included 2 dances, Library dedication, large street parade, craft fair, Fire Department demonstration, Band Concert, and sporting events at Camp Morgan. These events were programmed under a fund of \$1,500, of which \$366.15 was returned to the Town, partly from the sale of souveniers.

Camp Morgan was in operation during July and August with a resident Recreation Director. We also had a Certified Water Safety Instructor during the first two weeks of July sponsored by the Purling Beck Grange of East Washington. Many young people participated in the swimming program. During the 1981 season we plan to extend the swimming lessons to four weeks with a Certified Red Cross W.S.I.

We were fortunate in receiving a donation of professional service by the original builder of the chimney at the main lodge. Our thanks to Mark Basto and Mr. Spinney for their efforts in extending the chimney for smoke free operation.

The Selectmen with the cooperation of the N.H. Board of Health embarked on a water quality testing program at both Camp Morgan and East Washington Beaches. Water in the Camp Morgan beach area is high in quality. The East Washington pond is safe for swimming except when excessive sediment is washed in as a result of heavy rainfall.

During the summer months we sponsored a CETA program with five young men from local families participating. Their work included: 1) carpentry work at Camp Morgan and cleaning new parking area; 2) raking and preparing new burial area in the Paul Section of the East Washington Cemetery; 3) fence and land-scape work at the Shedd Free Library.

The Paul Section of the East Washington Cemetery has now been graded, a well installed to help with drainage and one quarter of the area seeded as a burial section. Lots will be ready for sale this summer.

We were unable to secure an equitable lease arrangement for the use of the Walsh land behind the Town buildings, therefore, the funds appropriated were carried forward to 1981. A new proposal for acquisition of this property will be discussed at Town Meeting.

The Town Tax map has been completed and a preliminary printout will be on display on Town Meeting day. Mr. Richard Cuoco who prepared the map will be present to discuss the use of the map, the property record system developed under the tax map contract and answer questions regarding property boundaries as shown on the map.

The committee appointed last year to inspect the Town Hall found major repairs are needed. Work of top priority (replace Grange room outside door, replace front door, re-set steps, repair wall, replace BX cable) are included in the 1981 budget. The committee outlined a general plan of repair which should be carried out in the near future. More attention should be given to annual maintenance in order to minimize the need for major repairs.

The Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee has expressed concern about the deterioration of the Town Common and offered recommendations for restoration. It is recognized that little improvement is possible until provisions are made to shift use of the Common for a school playground and public parking.

The Treasurer's report was not accepted at the 1980 Town Meeting because

of changes made in the Selectmen's Office to reconcile the bookkeeping methods used by those handling Town funds. A subsequent audit established that final figures printed in the Town report were correct, and that no major change in bookkeeping was needed. However, in order to integrate Town fiscal records the following procedures should be followed:

1. Numbering system for deposits made with the Treasurer.

Numbering system for bank deposits to facilitate locating NSF checks.
 Use of monthly balance sheets for Treasurer's receipts by category.

 Balance of Treasurer, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, and Selectmen's books monthly and by category using balance sheet prepared by Treasurer.

5. Quarterly auditing using Treasurer's balance sheet.

6. NSF checks will not be re-deposited but require a new check with \$5.00 penalty and interest included. Adjust all records whenever NSF checks come back. Pay special attention to interest, penalty and/or fine on a replacement check to be sure they are recorded properly.

7. A Treasurer must be educated with regards to when various types of taxes could be collected and thus deposited with the Treasurer to catch possible errors either the Treasurer or Tax Collector might make in recording under

a wrong category.

8. Through the assistance of Mr. LaPlante of the Department of Recenue Administration, it was found that we cannot delete any of the books we are now using. The R.S.A.s direct that the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Town Clerk are each charged with the responsibility of keeping their books.

9. Finally - closer contact and monthly balancing is the only solution open

to us.

SHEDD FREE LIBRARY

Report of Trustees and Librarian for 1980

This was an exciting, at times frustrating but eventually a most rewarding year for our Library. Most of January and February were spent moving books, as painting and carpeting were completed. New shelving arrived in mid March, and our new room became in actuality, the non-fiction room. We were, however, almost up to dedication time before everything was completed. But we made it—and on August 9th our new addition was dedicated by our State Librarian, Mrs. Avis Duckworth. The addition itself was named in honor of Preston E. Rolfe, and the new non-fiction room, in honor of our Librarian of more than thirty years, Zaida E. Cilley.

It is indeed wonderful to have space to put our book collection without crowding, to have office space to work with new books, to repair old ones and even space to host a meeting of the South West Council of N. H. Librarians. Thirty-five attended this meeting in October, which, we were told, was a record attendance. We planned also to play host again in November to the members of the Nubanusit Co-op, to which we belong – but plans had to be cancelled due

to our early snow storm.

With a total of 4,376 books and 155 records in the Library, plus the 1,136 books borrowed from the State Bookmobile, we had a total circulation of 6,805 books and magazines. With a total of 181 adult, and 121 juvenile borrowers, this

is not a bad record for a small town library.

Twenty-six volumes were borrowed on Inter-library loan during 1980 from the following libraries: State Library, Concord, the public libraries of Keene, Concord, Manchester, Exeter and Hanover, also the Geisel Library, St. Anselms

College, Manchester.

Three hundred eighty-eight new books were added to the Library this year. Many of these were the gifts of friends and patrons of the library. We would like to thank the following townspeople; Mr. Basto, Mr. and Mrs. Horner, Mrs. Jurson, Mrs. Bjorkman, Mr. Rolfe, Mr. and Mrs. Blakney, Mr. Wehringer, Mr. and Mrs. Merriam, Mrs. Brighton, and Mr. and Mrs. Rhoades. Also, our thanks are due to Mrs. Frazee of Concord, Mrs. Chandler of Claremont, and Dr. and Mrs. Poulios of Newport. The Library, in turn, made a gift of 38 Elementary readers to the Washington School.

We started 1980 with \$1,146.17 in our Library Equipment fund. Donations and sales totaled \$648.75. Interest gave us an additional \$43.23. During the year, we used this fund to purchase the following items: a battery lamp (for power failures), an electric clock, a vertical file, 12 folding chairs, an electric hot plate, a tea kettle, a cabinet for the new bathroom, a plastic rug for under the Librarians chair, installed wall to wall carpeting in the two childrens' rooms, and a book truck. The total for these items was \$1,007.56. So we will be starting

the new year with \$830.59 in this fund.

We were also the recipients of a very generous gift of a second book truck from Mrs. Dorothea Roeser, of Hillsboro, formerly of Washington. This gift was, in fact, a tribute to our librarian, Zaida E. Cilley, and we are very grateful

to Mrs. Roeser.

In May, Preston Rolfe and Mabel Kimmel attended the meetings in Concord, of the State Library Commission, and our Library once again received a certificate stating that we had met qualification standards under the Statewide Library Development Program for 1980.

Because everything seems to be going up and never down, we feel that we

must ask for \$5,100 this year.

We, the Librarian and the Trustees, are very proud of our Library, and we sincerely hope that all of you share this feeling.

POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT

Since accepting appointment in May as Police Chief, I have enjoyed being back "on the job."

During patrols, especially Sunday afternoons during the summer, I have learned that the non-resident taxpayers appreciate seeing a Police vehicle out around. Various offers of assistance in any way we might need it have been made from people who have no vote at Town Meeting. They want to see the Town Police on duty, also request that more surveillance is made of their property while they are away. We do the best we can and I feel being out and seen has helped deter some crime.

Highland Lake area has some problems with "Off Highway Vehicles" abusing the privilege of using the Private Road around the lake. Working with the Highland Lake Association, we hope to deal with and control that problem this next year.

At Town Meeting this year I am asking for radios. Both mobile radios, one in my car, the other in Officer Dietrich's car, are nearly antiques, need constant repair and are extremely undependable. We have had experiences when we could not make contact with either our own dispatch, county or state police for assistance. Also included is a new base station for the Town Hall. The old base we have at present is not dependable. The other item included is a battery operated portable. We have had need of this type of unit in the past. On patrol while checking houses alone or when responding to a burglar alarm going off, it would be great to have radio communication to call for help when you cannot get back to the radio in the car.

We are all very pleased with the Central Emergency Answering & Dispatch Service. It is superior to the former telephone service because this is exclusively for Fire and Police department business, which includes handling burglar alarms and rescue squad coverage. The dispatchers handle all calls in an efficient and professional manner and I am very satisfied with the staff we have.

Thanks for all the support and cooperation during the last seven months.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is

responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

PARKS AND RECREATION

- That the Town develop a plan for the repairs needed at the Town House; begin said repairs this year; and see to the continued repair and maintenance of this historic building.
- That the Town begin a program of restoration of the Town Common, beginning this year with improvements to the driveway and the matter of drainage.
- That the Town develop more adequate parking in the area of the main dining hall at Camp Morgan, and provide better lighting of same.
- That the Town monitor on a regular basis the quality of swimming water at both of our town beaches, and if necessary, determine the source of any water contamination.
- 7. That the Committee and the Selectmen, according to the wishes of the community, better define the role of the Parks and Recreation Committee.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

At the March 1980, Town Meeting, Kathleen C. Hill was elected to the Board for a three year term.

Mrs. Hill left town in October 1980; on January 2, 1981, the Selectmen appointed Frederick Nehrings to fill the vacancy until the March 1981, Town Meeting.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Several small subdivisions were handled by the Board, consisting of eight new lots, and a couple of annexations which reduced the number of lots involved.

In March the Board started enforcing RSA 249:17 regarding driveways, A permit is now required for new access onto town roads, Four permits were approved.

It has become evident that some serious consideration be given to Washington growth rate. Therefore the Board felt that it was time to move on formulating

a Master Plan.

A Master Plan for a town is a guide for making town decisions. A good plan includes past town trends, the towns present situation, goals for the future of the town, and ways of carrying out those goals. A good plan is organized and legally sound, it accurately documents information about the town and it repre-

sents the feelings of the townspeople concerning the future of the town.

During the summer questionaires were sent out with a 30% return. This was to survey community attitude in regard to municipal services, housing, business, recreation, development, and growth. In brief you told us that you liked the uncrowded conditions, the peace and quiet, outdoor recreation, lack of pollution, low taxes, community participation, and its a good place to raise children. Some other areas need improvement. You want the town to remain a rural residential, and agricultural community, and wanted only slight growth (1-2%). And basically home based business is preferred. You don't favor commercial enterprise concentrated around village centers or along town roads. The majority (97.5%) agree on single family housing, but not in forest or farming areas. The opinion is also that mobil homes and multi-family dwellings should be restricted to specific areas. Also desired are scenic road designations, water quality monitoring and green belts. There were also twenty citizen volunteers to help work on the master plan. Co-ordinating the formation of this plan providing assistance and doing most of the technical work will be a function of the Upper-Valley-Lake Sunapee Council, which we are members of.

REPORT ON THE REGIONAL COMMISSION 1980

Our town continued membership in the Regional Planning Commission now called the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. There are 28 towns in New Hampshire and 3 in Vermont, eligible for membership, and each town is entitled

to two directors who each have one vote.

These 31, widely scattered, low populated towns, along with some 27 neighboring Vermont towns, have had difficulty in retaining enough qualified professional staff, in the light of declining State and Federal funds and inflated costs, to meet the increasing regional planning services required. A committee of two members of each of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council representing 31 towns; the Two Rivers Regional Planning Council of 22 Vermont towns; and the Ottauquechee Regional Planning Council of 5 Vermont towns; made a study for reorganizing this area in the Connecticut River Valley. They recommended dropping the 16 towns in the Lake Sunapee area including Washington and combining the remaining 42 towns. So far, little action has been taken on this. However there is consideration being given to changing the name of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council, which is often confused with the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, to a name with "Regional Planning Commission" in it, to better identify the area,

With Newport, Goshen, Lempster and Unity rejoining last March, and the Sullivan County Delegation of the Legislature appropriating a \$100.00 membership to cover the rest of the County, funding is assured for the present and no

one will be deprived of regional planning services.

James Wechsler resigned effective March 1, 1980, as executive director to take a similar position with the Lebanon Chamber of Commerce. After an extensive search, Mr. Jan Ollry of Sarasota, Florida, became Executive Director in July and brings new ideas to the organization.

Due to increasing State wide emphasis on comprehensive planning the Regional Planning Commission staff has been working closely with fifteen member

towns, including Washington, creating or revising Master Plans.

For this reason, we should continue membership in 1981, by appropriating the amount of dues based on population (U. S. Census 393) mentioned in the town warrant, in order to utilize further, the services we have been using. Other reasons to continue membership, are to learn or share ideas and experiences with neighboring towns. What they are thinking or doing can influence our town planning activity and we cannot ioslate ourselves, but should cooperate by being members of the regional body.

I am sorry I cannot attend every meeting because of being away for the winter, but I am willing to represent the town as long as you wish me to, however,

you should have a second director at meetings I cannot attend.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT 1980

Our Town Civil Defense is under the New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency which was under the Defense Preparedness Agency (DPA) of the U. S. Department of Defense, until the beginning of the year. At that time it was transferred to a new body, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which centralizes all government agencies that deal with civil disasters and emergencies

rather than military nuclear attacks.

During my 5 months absence from Town this past year, Selectmen Robert J. Wright was acting Civil Defense Director. He is also a Captain in the Air Force Reserve and was assigned by the Air Reserve Personnel Center, at our request to the State Civil Defense Office, as a Mobilization Designee (MOBDES) for active duty, in uniform, for 12 days from 28 January to 8 February. He conducted the C.D. office in the Town Hall daily, attended a state seminar on energy as related to civil preparedness, worked on C.D. schedules and programs, prepared the Town Budget, updated materials lists, studied the Town Hall heating system and got estimates for replacing it, as well as estimates for energy saving measures for all Town buildings. This helps our Town Civil Defense, as well as indirectly helping his reserve status toward retirement.

Because I expect to be absent from Town for half the year, I resigned on October 17 after 29 years as C.D. Director, having received a commendation for 25 years service from the Governor and Council at the State House in Concord in 1976. James Hofford has been appointed to be Civil Defense Director.

REPORT ON THE REGIONAL ASSOCIATION 1980

New Hampshire is divided into six regions to promote travel and tourism. We are in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region along with 35 neighboring towns. Each town has a councillor in this association, the non-profit organization to promote travel and tourism in our area. Operating costs come from an appropriation from the State, contributions from member towns, and other sources. Our town is asked to contribute \$245 to the association as its share of the cost of support, based on our population of 445. That comes to about 55 cents each.

Last year we received \$2,918 from the State Rooms and Meals Tax. Promoting tourism increases this tax collected by the State, and distributed to the Towns, so our town benefits even though little tax is collected in the town itself. If promoting tourism on a state wide basis through regional associations benefits our town, it seems we are making a good investment if we share in the cost of operating our regional association by this \$245 contribution.

In addition to increasing our share from the Rooms and Meals Tax by supporting the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, we receive an additional benefit by the participation of our councilor in meeting with councilors from neighboring towns to participate in learning what our neighbors are doing,

in the spirit of cooperation rather than isolation.

It seems that contributing \$245 to support the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association for 1981 is a good investment that gives good returns to our town.

TOWN HISTORY REPORT 1980

During the past year \$1,000 was returned to the town, \$790 from the sale of 37 new histories and \$210 from the sale of 11 old histories, and \$20.68 interest was earned as the funds accumulated. In addition, the unexpended balance in the Town History Savings Account that was left after all bills were paid in 1977, plus interest, amounting to \$1,508.59, was returned to the Town at the request of the committee. The \$16,0006. appropriated for Town Histories from 1960 to 1977 is considered a "loan" by the committee. The total returned to date is \$7,738.59; \$2,200 in 1977, \$1,400 in 1978, \$1,630 in 1979, and \$2,508.59 in 1980; leaving a "balance due" of \$8,267.41. When the 474 books, 305 new and 169 old, are all sold, this will all be paid back, although as expected, this will take several more years. The figures are:

- 2. To see if the District will vote, pursuant to RSA 671:15, to adopt as the Checklist for the School District Meeting, the Checklist of the Town and to appoint the Town Supervisors of the Checklist to act as Supervisors for the School District.
- 3. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation for any other officers or agents of the District. CARRIED SALARIES RAGED FOR SCHOOL SARD
- To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant or take any other action in relation thereto.
- To see what sum the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,800.00 for the hiring of two teacher aides at the Washington Center School, or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Washington School District School Board to negotiate with owners of private roads to allow their use by school buses or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 10. To see if the District will vote to establish a School Lunch Program as legislated under RSA 189:11a and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to defray the cost of implementing, equipping, and operating the program for the 1981-1982 school year or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 11. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new school bus, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 12. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100.00 for the purchase of energy conservation shades, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 13. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$145.00 for the purchase of a programmable thermostat, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 14. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and accept on behalf of the District, any and all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source and to appropriate such funds received for the purposes set forth to such application; or to take any other action in relation thereto.
 - 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE to the Citizens of the Washington School District

Way back in 1647 when public education was born in this Nation, schools were basically asked to teach the traditional three R's; 'Readin, 'Ritin' and 'Rithmetic. Wilson Riles, State Superintendent of Schools in California, put it well when he said that today schools are being asked to do what people used to ask God to do. When I look at the myriad of tasks we have, I don't think he's far from wrong.

Exactly what is public education being asked to accomplish? Whether through State or Federal Laws or through Local Directive, today's schools are being asked to feed students breakfast, lunch and a snack; check student's vision, hearing and teeth; show students how to brush their teeth; teach young people good nutrition; provide special services for the Gifted & the Handicapped; provide recreation; teach students to respect others and to respect themselves; show young people how to ride their bikes safely and how to drive cars; and convince young people not to use drugs.

All of these are great challenges, but where does it stop. Education has accepted them because they must be done. A hungry child can't learn. A disrespectful, disruptive child can't learn. In the past the family or other agencies handled these responsibilities. But today they fall upon our public schools. Even with these additional, time-consuming tasks, local public education is achieving many successes. The following is a sampling:

- Discipline has improved Firm but fair administration of discipline by teachers and principals have been responded to by the over 90 percent of our student body who cause no significant disciplinary problems.
- Quality services, as required by Law are being provided for 10 handicapped students.
- A new mathematics series was instituted in Grades 1-8. This program lends itself to individualized instruction. Each student has an individual math skills folder, so that a careful record can be kept of all math skills mastered by the student.
- Karen Enright, the new Music Teacher is also providing instrumental lessons.
- The Houghton Mifflin Reading Program now extends thru Grade Eight.
 This provides one sequential reading program through Grade Eight for the
 majority of students.
- The Parent Teachers Group and many individual parents have been active in providing support for various school projects.
- Evelyn Ojala, has provided students with learning problems with needed help. This position is partially funded with PL 94-142 monies.
- Mrs. Pearl Devlin has been assisting in the development of a small school library. She has been busy cataloging and organizing the limited amount of library books available at the school. She has been able to get a large number of students involved in reading library books.

These, and many other positive developments have been achieved thru the hard work, and commitment of the whole school community, while more re-

mains to be accomplished; I am sure your continued support and cooperation will result in continued advances.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The 1980-81 school year has provided an opportunity for a small breather in

the hectic changes and growth in the Washington Center School.

The three full-time teachers have all returned this year. Mary Ann Nagy teaches grades one, two and three. Pam Kok teaches grades four and five. Amelia (Johnson) Goss teaches grades six, seven and eight. With a stable teaching staff we have a better chance to develop good student and parent relationships, teaching practices, and a logical grade one through eight curriculum. With the extra demands of teaching the multi-graded classroom, we do not wish to see Washington become a "training ground" where teachers spend a year or two. We need

their experience here.

Washington's school population has leveled off from the hectic growth of previous years. In other years it has been very difficult to implement student programs in speech therapy, psychological testing, or simple tutoring as more and more cases arrive. We hope that the leveled off student population of this year (and hopefully next year) will permit us to provide better services to students. We now have a student population of 52 in the Washington Center School, anticipated to be 49 next year. Besides these 52 students we have three children enrolled in private schools, one child in another public school, two children enrolled in home study programs and one child in the SAU Elementary Special Education program. The Washington School District is responsible for a special education program that any of these children (or any child over the age of three) may require to overcome any educational handicap.

Part-time services have long been a problem in Washington and other small schools. We hope that we are developing a consistent program for music, art and library services. Our psychologist, learning disabilities teacher and speech therapist are all employed part-time by Washington while working in other schools. Through the use of local people and shared services with other schools we have been able to do a better job at these part-time positions. We hope that

this continues next year.

The last area where we have seen a chance for a breather has been in the budget. Next year's budget is proposed to be 8.6% higher than this year's not including Warrant Articles. This is a very moderate increase compared to most recent years. The School Board has eliminated the two teacher aide positions from the budget and has placed this item as a separate Warrant Article. The Board has also taken a hard look at all aspects of the budget and a general "tightening up" has taken place in many accounts. The Board feels that the budget presented here is the least possible amount of money that will meet the educational needs of the children of Washington. There is no fat in this budget!

tivity tested coming up with new ideas for active youngsters.

Tiny hands have been following mazes, finding hidden pictures, copying block patterns, completing pictures, creating with clay, not to mention cutting, pasting, weaving, braiding. All this has been under the able direction of Mrs. Fox. Every week the five first graders produce another group story to share with the older students. And they love to listen to library books (their choice!) read by Mrs. Fox. Math is another fun time involving busy little fingers as well as active minds.

So many exciting things are going on! So many more things to investigate?

We have a new Reading series, Houghton-Mifflin, and a new Math program,

D. C. Heath. These programs are used in grades 1-8. Our Social Studies program is a series of mini-courses. We studied Political Science for six weeks, and were fortunate to have an election to follow during our study. The school held a mock election on November 4th. Reagan was the clear favorite, except in the Junior High where Anderson squeaked by with two winning votes. Social Studies has now shifted to Economics. We have covered the history of our country's economic growth and the factors that contributed to it. We're also looking into some of the current problems that face our economic system and the role of the government.

In Science we have studied magnets/electromagnets, forces, and are currently

studying animal zoology. The children are all working on research papers.

Our out-of-school learning experiences have taken us to Murdough Orchard (followed by some cider making), to Nathaniel Hawthorne College to see 'You're a Good Man Charlie Brown" and to an "Art for All" Festival in Concord.

Other activities include a Christmas Bazaar and this year's Christmas Play,

The students have been showing their capabilities as authors/illustrators of their own books. These were produced in response to the Shedd Free Library's children's book contest.
