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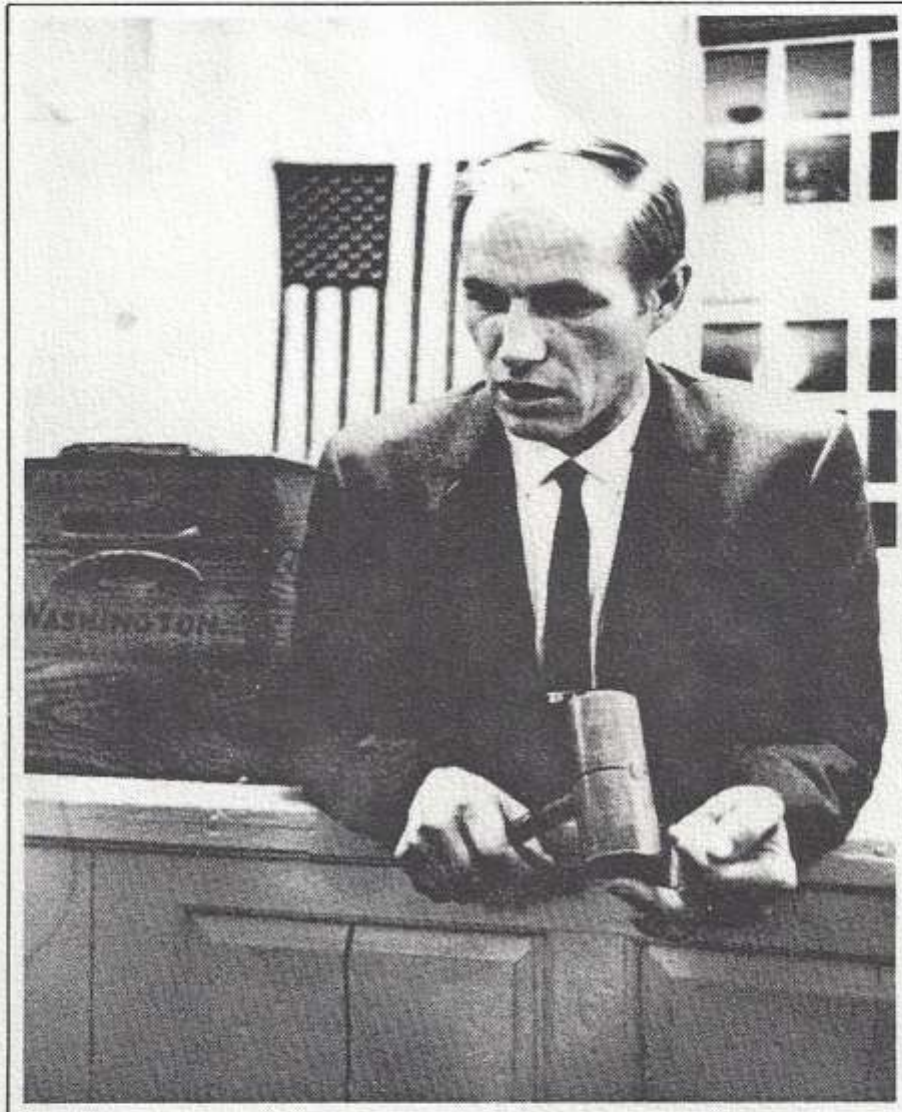

This issue of the *Annual Reports of the Town of Washington* is dedicated to Donald R. Crane, Town Moderator, School Moderator, Chairman of the Board of Adjustment, President of the Washington Historical Society.

We know and love him as "Donnie," and we admire and respect him as "Mr. Washington, New Hampshire"—for he is so much a presence in our town and in our affections. We have come to rely upon his Yankee wisdom and his tolerance. His wise good humor has spilled over into the town at large, and has greatly enriched our lives and the folklore of our community.

Donnie was born here in 1932, and his family roots in Washington are over 200 years deep. He was a member of the last class at the Washington Dole School and later graduated from Hillsboro High School. During the 1950's Donnie spent two years in the United States Army and then returned to Washington. In 1959 he married Ethel Norcross, and in 1960 and 1961 their children David R. and Pamela were born here. Over the years we have entrusted Donnie with many special committee assignments and with many of our most important offices. He has never failed us. In his own person he embodies the best traditions of our town, and he is an eloquent spokesman for them.

Donnie has served as Town Moderator, and School Moderator since 1964. In both offices he was preceded by his father, Perley Crane. From 1962 to 1965, he was a Selectman. He served nine years on the School Board, helped to negotiate the Area School Agreement with Hillsboro, and was chairman when he retired from the Board in 1975. During the same period he was a member of the Planning Committee and helped to draft the Washington Land Use Ordinance. When the Board of Adjustment was formed, he accepted appointment to it, and now serves as its chairman. For over 35 years he has been a member of the Washington Fire Department.

Donnie joined the Washington Historical Society as a charter member in 1982; he served as one of its first Trustees, then as Vice-President, and now as President.

Donald Crane, first citizen of Washington, we salute you.

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Washington qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will be open at 10:00 a.m. and not close before 6:00 p.m. to elect Town Officers. The following articles will be acted upon:

Article 1. To elect by nonpartisan ballot a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, a Road Agent, a Tax Collector, a Fire Chief, a Police Chief, an Auditor and one Supervisor of the Checklist for one year each; one member of the Planning Board, one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Board of Assessors, one Trustee of the Trust funds and one Trustee of the Library for three years each; one Trustee of the Cemeteries for one year, one Trustee of the Cemeteries for two years and one Trustee of the Cemeteries for three years and any other Town Officers.

Article 2. To hear reports of any and all officers and agents of the Town and to take any action in relation thereto.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or borrow by Long Term Note to purchase a Backhoe (replacement) for the Highway Department. (2/3 vote required for borrowing). *39,000 carried*

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to ~~raise~~ and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for the purchase of the Ernest Cram property on the North side of the Half Moon Pond Road. *Dismissed*

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year and take any action relating thereto. *95,000 carried*

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the Block Grant Highway Funds anticipated during 1985 for use of the Highway Department. *323,850.55*

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year. *7,000.00 voted*

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Fire Department for the ensuing year and/or take any other action relating thereto. *14,000 passed*

Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for control of Forest Fires in the ensuing year and/or take any action relating thereto. *8,150.00 passed*

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Police Department for the ensuing year and/or take any action relating thereto. *6,110.00 passed*

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Parks & Playgrounds and operation of the Summer Recreation Program. *8,250- passed*

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Cyrus Eaton Land on the west side of Ashuelot Pond.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to take the proceeds from the sale of the Cyrus Eaton Land and create a Trust Fund for the maintenance and upkeep of camp Morgan. *5160 acres no dismissed*

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$7,324.93 from the fund created by the sale of Town timber for the continued renovation of the Camp Morgan Lodge. *Carried*

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or borrow by Long Term Note for Washington's share of the Engineering Study for the layout of "Valley Road", so called, as ordered by the Cheshire County Superior Court. (2/3 vote required for borrowing)

Article 16. To see what action the Town will vote to take regarding the refinishing of the outside of the Town Hall. *(28,000 + 1,460) 529,460.00*

Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for major repairs to the Town Hall or take any other action relating thereto. *Best job - \$4450 major repairs - Tom Orange Rem door 2 windows Tom roof*

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of \$9,000 from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund and to see what additional sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate from taxes for maintenance of and repairs to the Town Hall and other Town Buildings and to take any other action relating thereto. *Carried - Return - Tom Mc etc*

Article 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Emergency Communications and Civil Defense. *36525*

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Washington Center Cemetery General Perpetual Care Trust Fund, to be administered by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, said Fund to be used to collect, hold and invest the perpetual care fees being charged for lots at the Washington Center Cemetery, and to pay out and apply the income accruing from such fees for the general care, maintenance and upkeep of the Washington Center Cemetery. *Carried*

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish an East Washington Cemetery General Perpetual Care Trust Fund, to be administered by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, said Fund to be used to collect, hold and invest the perpetual care fees being charged for lots at the East Washington Cemetery, and to pay out and apply the income accruing from such fees for the general care, maintenance and upkeep of the East Washington Cemetery. *Carried*

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and authorize the Trustees of the Cemeteries to limit the sale of cemetery lots in all Town Cemeteries to residents and taxpayers of Washington only. *with Trustee's approval only past resolutions - Carried*

Article 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of cemeteries within the Town and to take any other action relating thereto. *\$8500 - Carried*

Article 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of the Town Dump for the ensuing year. *\$10,990 - Carried*

Article 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of the front portion of the Town Common or take any other action relating thereto. *carried - \$5,700 -> \$52,000 - 16' wide*

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Washington Historical Society to reconstruct the Penniman School House approximately thirty (30) feet from the western edge of the Town Common. (submitted by the Washington Historical Society). *for 4 years - provided Mr. Walsh agrees -*

Article 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray "Town Charges" for the ensuing year. *79,837 carried*

Article 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the next Old Home Day and to take any action relating thereto. *carried - 1,500 Aug 10-11*

Article 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a donation to the Washington Rescue Squad. *\$500 - carried*

Article 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad. *\$500 carried*

Article 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the payment of Long Term Notes:

Library Addition.....	\$ 5,000	<i>carried</i>
Camp Morgan.....	\$10,000	

due in 1985.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes *carried*

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes including, but not limited to, disaster aid and Highway funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal, State or private agency or individual or take any other action relating thereto. *carried*

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate the position of elected Town Auditor and to hire an accountant to audit books and accounts of the Town pursuant to R.S.A. 41:31. (Effective 1986) *1985 - carried*

Article 35. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

WASHINGTON TOWN MEETING 3/13/84

Meeting called to order by Moderator, Donald Crane, with the reading of the Warrant at 9 am. Polls will open at 10 am and will not close before 6 pm. Absentee Ballots will be opened at 3 pm. Theodore Drew as Assistant Moderator, Wendy Otterson as Assistant Town Clerk, Zaida Cilley and Elsie Fletcher as Ballot Clerk, the voting took place in the School Room, we had 201 voters.

Article 1: Moderator Donald Crane announced that he would not announce votes for write-in Candidates who received less than five votes. The following officers were elected:

Moderator 2 years: Donald Crane 191 votes and was declared elected; Selectmen 3 years: Donald P. Gaskell 154 votes and was declared elected; Town Clerk 1 year: Dorothy C. Tumulty 182 votes and was declared elected; Supervisor Checklist 6 years: Alan R. Goodspeed 171 votes and was declared elected; Treasurer 1 year: Karin F.T. Fox 186 votes and was declared elected; Tax Collector 1 year: Marianne L. Garvin 94 votes; Charles E. Dalphond 105 votes and was declared elected; Board of Assessors 3 years: Raymond Bjorkman 169 votes and was declared elected; Police Chief 1 year: Charles S. Wood, Jr. 180 votes and was declared elected; Fire Chief 1 year: Hans Eccard 9 votes; Hank Ruby 5 votes; Charles E. Dalphond 177 votes and was declared elected; Auditor 1 year: G. Michael Otterson 191 votes and was declared elected; Library Trustee 3 years: Janet Bjorkman 179 votes and was declared elected; Trustee of Trust Funds 3 years: Marcia Goodspeed 180 votes and was declared elected; Road Agent 1 year: Robert Crane 172 votes and was declared elected; Planning Board 3 years: Alan Goodspeed 154 votes and was declared elected; Planning Board 3 years: Richard Griffith 169 votes and was declared elected; Planning Board 1 year: D. Edward Karrman 166 votes and was declared elected.

Article 2: Robert Wright moved that all reports be accepted as printed in the Town Report with the following corrections: (A) Article 12 To See What Sum of Money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Shedd Free Library in the ensuing year. (B) Article 13 To See What Sum of Money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Maintenance of Parks and Playgrounds and operation of the Summer Recreation Program. (C) Article 19 Deletion of the Words, ' of the front portion'. (D) Page 7 Warrant actually signed February 23, 1984, not February 24th., as printed. (E) Page 42 Highways and Bridges item 2 T.R.A. should read \$772.39 not \$77.39, as printed. (F) Page 44 R.N. Johnson, Inc. should read Mower Parts and Magneto Repairs. Frank Nagy second, Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 3: At this time Moderator Donald Crane requested that all Petition articles be addressed by the first name on list of Petitioners. Raymond Bjorkman made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$5,500.00, to provide material to resurface Washington Drive with an oil and sand mixture to prevent further deterioration of the road which would help to eliminate possible major and more costly repairs in the future. Mr. Fields second. Fred Otterson sympathizes with this article but feels it should be included in the Highway Budget and makes a motion to dismiss. James Gunderson second. Voice vote, article dismissed.

Article 4: Alan Goodspeed made a motion to raise and appropriate \$300.00, as a donation to Washington Rescue Squad. Ralph Torrey second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 5: Fred Otterson made a motion to raise and appropriate \$200.00, to establish a Public Telephone at Camp Morgan. Bruce Woodbury second. Robert Wright explained the cost of installation would be \$35.00, and the monthly charge \$12.50. Coins in the box would be used against the monthly charge, (deleted from the \$12.50). Telephone Company advises that the value of the phone is \$500.00, and any vandalism would be charged to the Town. Mr. Wright said the Town has \$1,000.00, deductible insurance at Camp Mortan. Ralph Otterson made a motion to dismiss, Willard Brown second. Voice vote, article dismissed.

Article 6: Robert Crane made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$95,000.00, for the operation of the Highway Department for the ensuing year. Bruce Woodbury second. Robert Crane explained that his figure included \$5,000.00, additional money for wages and insurance to coincide with the percentage raise and insurance benefits granted to the School District Teachers for the 1984-85 School District year, and he anticipated his total expenditure to be \$106,600.00. Joseph Payne asked why several articles were required for the Highway Budget. Robert Crane explained the need to RAISE AND APPROPRIATE as opposed to APPROPRIATE ONLY for State Block Funds. Ralph Otterson requested that Articles 6-7-8 be discussed together. Moderator Donald Crane agrees discussion on these three articles would be proper. Alexander Blakney asks the price of the Sander. Robert Crain explains in detail the difference in Sanders and their varying costs, in reply to the question, \$6,500.00. Mr. Robert Crane explained Block Grant Funds in detail to all present and the amount he can anticipate is approximately \$20,562.00, which is the same sum as previous year. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 7: Robert Crane made a motion that the Town appropriate \$20,562.00, plus any additional money coming from Block Grant Funds for use of the Highway Department. Warren Frazer second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 8: Robert Crane made a motion that the Town appropriate \$6,500.00, for the purchase of a Sander for the Highway department. Charles Dalphond second. Paper Ballot requested: Yes 60, No 39. Motion Carried.

At this time Moderator Crane read a Thank You letter received from Linda Roy for the support given her during her nine years as School Treasurer.

Article 9: Charles Dalphond made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$14,500.00, for the operation of the Fire Department in the ensuing year. Robert Wright second. Mr. Dalphond explained the need for the equipment, i.e. Air Paks, Turn-out Suits, Boots and Coats for the Firemen. Also the need for a K Saw, differing from a Chain Saw by its carbide blade. Mr. Dalphond also explained the need for fencing around the Fire Pond behind the Town Hall. Robert Wright elaborated on the need for this fencing. Bruce Woodbury offered an amendment to increase the requested amount by \$3,000.00, to include dredging and pipes for the Fire Ponds in Town. Fred Otterson second. Bruce Woodbury explained what Fire Ponds were and that pipes are part of the same project. Moderator Donald Crane established a dry hydrant as a Fire Pond. Voice vote, amendment fails. Warren Frazer offers an amendment to delete the \$1,000.00, for fencing from the Fire Department Budget. Mrs. Lois Fonda second. Voice vote, amendment fails. Return to motion, voice vote, motion carries.

Article 10: Philip Barker made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$750.00, for the prevention of Forest Fires in the ensuing year. Linda Barker second. Robert Wright offers and amendment to reduce by \$400.00, this motion, that the office of Fire Warden would be combined with that of the Fire Chief. Bruce Woodbury second. Voice vote, amendment carried. Returning to motion it now reads \$350.00, voice vote, motion carried.

Article 11: Charles Wood, Jr., made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$11,242.00, for the operation of the Police Department for the ensuing year. Robert Wright second. This budget figure includes the need for a new radio, uniform replacement and a case of road flares. Rich Niven explained the Hillsboro Dispatch System may terminate. At the present time our fee to the Hillsboro Dispatch System has been \$1,500.00. If we are forced to join the newly formed small Town Dispatch System, the fee will be approximately \$3,500/\$4,000.00. This amount is included in the Police budget. Voice vote, motion carried.

Vivian Clark made a motion to take up Article 27 at this time. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 27: Richard Niven made a motion that the Town ratify and approve the action of the Board of Selectmen to enter into an Intermunicipal Agreement for the Provisions of Communication along with other towns set forth in said agreement for the purposes described therein, including the delivery of communications and dispatch services in the event the Hillsboro Dispatch System does in fact disband. Donald Gaskell second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 12: Harriet Cofield made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$7,000.00, for the support of the Shedd Free Library in the ensuing year. Hilbert Cofield second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Bruce Woodbury made a motion to take up Article 22 at this time. Michael Otterson second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 22: Philip Barker made a motion to authorize the Selectmen to grant permission to the Washington Historical Society to reconstruct the Penniman School-house on the northwestern edge of the Town Common. (Just behind the present Common lawn.) Said authorization to be valid for five years. Philip Barker explained this motion on behalf of the Historical Society. The building will not interfere with any view and placement is anticipated to be as shown on the sketch presented at Town Meeting; front of building to correspond with front of Walsh Barn and rear of building to correspond with rear of Church, approximately half-way between Church and Barn. A variance will be required for the distance between the Walsh property line and the School-house, in keeping with present day ordinances. James Gunderson made a motion to dismiss. James Garvin second. Moderator Donald Crane requested that G. Michael Otterson replace him at the podium enabling him to speak on the subject. Mr. Crane stepped down, Mr. Otterson, Moderator, recognizes Donald Crane. Mr. Crane requests a Paper Ballot. 120 votes were cast, 61 were necessary to pass the motion. Yes 35, No 85. Motion to dismiss fails. Back to original motion. At this time, Phyllis Thayer announces that \$1,500.00, has been pledged to defray costs if the original motion is passed. Mr. Crane explained that this body was not giving total approval to the move of the School-house, only to step one in a process. He requested a Paper Ballot. 116 votes were cast, 59 needed. Yes 68, No 47. Motion carried.

Peter Tumulty made a motion to adjourn for a one hour lunch. Ethel Crane second. (1 pm) 2 pm Moderator Donald Crane called the meeting to order.

Article 13: Donald Gaskell made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$10,475.00, for the maintenance of Parks and Playground and the operation of the Summer Recreation Program. Robert Wright second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 14: Donald Gaskell made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 from the sale of timber on Town land as an offset against budgeted expenses for improvements to the Main Lodge at Camp Morgan. Robert Wright second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 15: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$4,500.00, to winterize the Main Lodge at Camp Morgan and to begin renovations of the Main Lodge Kitchen. Frank Nagy second. Mr. Wright explained that renovations and winterization were needed, that the water system would cost approximately \$1,500.00 and material and insulation, approximately \$3,500.00. With the \$2,000.00 raised and appropriated under the previous article (14), he felt this could be accomplished. Betty Wood made a motion to amend the article to include the \$2,000.00, previously voted on in article 14. Robert Crane second. Hans Eccard made a motion to dismiss. Warren Frazer second. Voice vote, motion to dismiss failed. Returning to amendment at this time Moderator Donald Crane asked if everyone understand that they are voting to include the \$2,000.00, previously voted upon under article 14. Voice vote, amendment carried. Motion now reads plus the \$2,000.00 from article 14 for a total of \$6,500.00. Robert Dunton offers a motion to amend this motion by cutting \$4,500.00. Warren Frazer second. Voice vote, amendment fails. Motion to raise and appropriate \$4,500.00, plus appropriate \$2,000.00, previously voted upon is before the house. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 16: Frank Nagy made a motion that the Town vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the removal of the old dining hall at Camp Morgan as recommended by the Committee. Robert Wright second. Voice vote, motion carried.

At this time Moderator, Donald Crane, explained that a requirement of two-thirds is necessary to apply for a Grant, however, if less than $\frac{2}{3}$ vote you will only have appropriated the amount raised by the Town.

Article 17: Frank Nagy made a motion that the Town raise \$1,774.00 and appropriate \$3,558.00 for the purchase and installation of playground equipment on the Town Playground behind the Town buildings and that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant funds for other Federal or State funds which may be available for this project to be used as a 50/50 matching share to reduce the cost to the Town. Robert Wright second. Mr. Nagy explained what equipment was needed and that it was to be placed behind the School where the present Swing Set is. Voice vote, motion carried unanimously.

Article 18: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town raise \$16,000.00 and appropriate \$32,000.00 for further work on the Playground behind the Town buildings and that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant funds or other Federal or State funds which may be available for this project to be used as a 50/50 matching share to reduce the cost to the Town. Frank Nagy second. Paper Ballot 87 votes were cast, 58 required. Yes 67, No 20, motion passes.

Article 19: Donald Gaskell made a motion that the Town raise \$6,400.00 and appropriate \$12,800 for the reconstruction of the Town Common and authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend Federal Land and Water Conservation

Fund Grant funds or other Federal and State funds which may be available for this project. Robert Wright second. Vivian Clark makes a motion to dismiss. Hans Eccard second. Mr. Eccard requests that planning for this project to be done next year. Mr. Wright asks that the money be appropriated for the Task Force enabling them to determine how the Common should look and for the plan to be brought forth in July - not to be expended until the Plan was approved by the Town. Mr. Eccard does not think it necessary to raise money for the Task Force to bring forth a Plan. Mr. Wright explained that Federal dollars have already been given to the State for this purpose and it may not be available next year. Mr. Griffith explains that you must submit a comprehensive plan before funds would be available. Paper Ballot, 94 votes cast, 48 are required, Yes 60, No 34, article dismissed.

At this time Cheryl Houghton, 4H Representative of the Town asks everyone to sing Happy Birthday to Carol Farnsworth which she taped, and will send to him in celebration of his 100th Birthday.

Article 20: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$6,900.00 to strip and stain white, two coats, the Town Hall. Bruce Woodbury second. Robert Wright explained the stain would be from the Tower down for this money. Sally Krone suggested the Selectmen make inquiry about sand blasting/stain as opposed to paint. Grace Jaeger asks if inquiry has been made from Historical Societies regarding the feasibility of sand blasting and stain as opposed to the preservation potential of paint. Mr. Wright replies that no inquiry has been made, and that no guarantee is made that the stain will not peel. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 21: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal of \$9,500.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and raise and appropriate \$8,005.00 from taxes making a total of \$17,505.00 for maintenance and repairs to the Town Hall and other Town Buildings. Donald Gaskell second. Mr. Wright presented an itemized list of anticipated costs. Bruce Woodbury offered the Blue Prints, which he believes to be the original, of the Bell Tower to the Selectmen. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 23: Frank Nagy made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$7,300.00 for the operation and maintenance of Cemeteries within the Town. Robert Wright second. Janice Philbrick, Trustee of Trust Funds, and Cynthia Brown former Trustee reiterated that Trust Fund monies must be used as specified in the original Trust. Voice vote, motioned carried.

Frank Nagy made a motion to close the Polls 6:35 PM. Voice vote, motioned carried.

Article 24: Donald Gaskell made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$11,025.00 for the operation of the Town Dump, specifically with R & R Company. Voice vote, motioned carried.

Article 25: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$83,925.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year. Frank Nagy second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 26: Richard Griffith made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$299.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. Robert Wright second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 28: Frank Nagy made a motion that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to increase the price of Cemetery Lots to \$100.00 per grave. Robert Wright second. At this time Dorothee Tumulty, Town Clerk, asked to be excused enabling her to speak on the motion. Charles Dalphond replaced Mrs. Tumulty.

Mrs. Tumulty explained that she wanted to buy two Lots in February and she was told the price had been raised to \$100. in view of this she felt if the Selectmen had the authority to do this it should not have been placed in the Warrant, and asked that the article be dismissed. Ronald Jaeger second. Voice vote, article dismissed.

Article 29: Robert Crane, I move shall the Town of Washington withdraw from the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District as provided by Article VI-2A of this Agreement? Mr. Crane advised that a Public Hearing will take place in approximately two weeks, however, no known action is taking place. The City of Claremont is changing the site, and Mr. Sweeney at the Concord Office wishes to change the rule, 'if you're in a District you must stay in the District'. Federal Funding for this program is questionable, private and local Town Funds will probably be necessary. There are six Towns in Sullivan County ready to withdraw if they haven't already. Mr. Crane requests a Paper Ballot utilizing the same form used when we voted to join. Robert Wright second. Total votes cast 76, Yes 73, No 2, Blank 1.

Mr. Crane made a suggestion asking that the Selectmen write a letter telling of our withdrawal asking that we be able to join Concord, The Central New Hampshire Solid Waste.

Article 30: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the former Duggan Lot on Island Pond Road. Donald Gaskell second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 31: Charles Dalphond made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate \$500.00 as a donation to the Hillsboro Rescue Squad. Vickie Crane second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 32: Donald Gaskell made a motion that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,750.00 for the payment of Long Term Notes. Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 33: Philip Barker made a motion to see if the Town will vote to approve as official Road names, the names indicated on the Town Map dated 2/22/84 submitted to the Selectmen by the Washington Historical Society. Bruce Woodbury second. Warren Frazer made a motion to amend the name of Bog Road to Hillsboro Pike, Michael Otterson second. Hilbert Cofield made a motion to dismiss. Robert Wright second. Voice vote, motion to dismiss carries.

Article 34: Bruce Woodbury made a motion to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes. Fred Otterson second. Voice vote, motion carries.

Article 35: Donald Gaskell made a motion that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept or expend, on behalf of the Town any and all Grants or other funds available for Town purposes including, but not limited to Disaster Aid and Highway Funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire or any Federal, State or Private Agency or individual. Bruce Woodbury second, Voice vote, motion carried.

Article 36: Robert Wright made a motion that the Town vote to give its support and approval to the newly created Town Common Task Force in recognition of the many hours of work that will be required between now and the Special Town Meeting in July. Frank Nagy second. Voice vote, motion carried.

Moderator Crane asks if this motion can legally come before this Meeting? Voice vote of this coming before this Meeting - Yes.

James Russell makes a motion requiring the Tax Collector to report in writing to the Selectmen, during December 1984, the hours and expenses involved in the Tax Collectors job. Beverly Bender second. James Russell explained his motion. Paper Ballot. Total votes cast 43, Required 22, Yes 20, No 23, motion is defeated.

Miriam O'Keef requested information from the Selectmen regarding the pending legal action taken by the Valley Road Association. Robert Wright replied for the Selectmen, "they haven't received a decision from the Court as yet".

Carl Jurson made a motion to adjourn - Natalie Jurson second. Voice vote, Meeting adjourned 9:25 PM.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT 1984

Again this year Town activities have been dominated by the Valley Road question. In June a hearing was held in the Cheshire County Superior Court to review the report of the Joint Board of Sullivan and Cheshire County Commissioners who had determined that there was a public need for a road and that the cost of construction should be divided \$100,000 for the property owners on "Valley Road", so called, and \$200,000 for the Towns of Washington and Stoddard. As this was only based on an estimated cost without any substantiation, the Court ordered the Towns of Stoddard and Washington to have an Engineering Study performed to layout a town road in the Highland Lake Development and arrive at an actual cost of construction. The final decision of costs proration between the Towns and Highland Lake property owners will be established after the cost figures have been determined. Bids for the engineering study are due by January 31, 1985. We will have an article in the Warrant at Town Meeting in March to raise and appropriate money for the engineering survey

After a considerable amount of work and paperwork by Dick Griffith, the Town made application for and received a Federal Grant for matching funds on the playground behind the Town Hall in the amount of \$22,490. Although we had to wait until the grant had been approved in October to begin the majority of the work, we have gotten quite a lot completed. Rick Niven of Residential and Recreational Co. has been doing the work. We hope to have an area ready for parking by Town Meeting. Our sincere appreciation is expressed to Dick Griffith for the many hours he dedicates to this project.

The funds appropriated for stripping and staining the Town Hall have been carried over into 1985. After last year's Town Meeting we asked the State of New Hampshire's Historical Society to research for us any previous experiences and problems with resurfacing old buildings. We finally put the job out to bid while the work on the school was underway. No bids were received. After the school was completed, we contacted their contractor, who had given us our original budget figure and we were told that he would do the job for the price he had given us prior to Town Meeting. However, this contractor would not be able to do the job until 1985. A point to consider when stripping and staining an old building is the age of the wood and the amount of paint on it. It is impossible to completely remove all the old paint without doing serious damage to the clapboards. Please take a look at the school before you come to Town Meeting so we can discuss whether to proceed as originally planned or adopt another course of action.

In the spring a tree fell on the Highway Garage roof resulting in sufficient damage, considering the age of the roof, to require a new roof be installed. An insurance claim was made and we settled for \$1,181 in damages. This amount plus monies taken from the Town Hall and Other Buildings account paid for the installation of a new roof. The roof cost depleted our funds scheduled for repair work on the Town Hall Tower. When the final Highway Department figures were in, our Road Agent found that there was enough money remaining in his budget to assign the entire cost of the roof project to the Highway account. This left us with a considerable amount of money for Town Hall repairs and no time to do the work. The balance of the Town Hall maintenance appropriation lapses into surplus. We are budgeting for the tower project again this year and hope to complete the project in the 1985 Season.

The survey was completed late in the fall for the land exchange with Norman Fridlund. At this time the deeds have been prepared and are ready for final signatures.

Our investment program was a fantastic success. We borrowed \$450,000 Tax Anticipation money right after Town Meeting and invested in a Certificate of Deposit and the Bank Money Market. The Town's general account is a NOW account drawing interest as well. We had appropriated \$3000 to offset the cost of Tax Anticipation note interest. Not only did we not use any of that but we ended up with a profit of \$2,875.66.

Our Timber cut on the Cyrus Eaton land netted a profit of \$9,324.93. As it will be more than ten years before we will be able to make another cut, we will be asking Town Meeting voters for permission to offer this property for sale. We hope to establish a Capital Reserve or Trust Fund from this sale that will create more interest than through future sales of the timber. We will also be putting this property back on the tax rolls.

You will notice that the election of a Board of Cemetery Trustees is new this year. You will be asked to vote for three people to fill the positions. The N.H. State Laws now require establishment of this board which is charged with complete control over the responsibility of all the Cemeteries within the Town. The Selectmen appointed a Board to serve until Town Meeting.

SHEDD FREE LIBRARY**Report of the Trustees and the Librarian for 1984**

With 6,380 books, 146 records and 30 magazines in the Library, we had a total circulation of 5,155 for the year. At the present time we have 278 adult and 154 juvenile borrowers—not a bad record for a small village library. 421 new books were added and 257 discarded during the year. 20 books were borrowed on Inter-Library loan at the request of several patrons. These were obtained from the following libraries: State, University of New Hampshire and the public libraries of New London, Somersworth, Jaffrey, and Hanover. This is a service open to all who need material not in our collection—one that we are happy to do.

The Equipment Fund started the year with a total of \$286.52. Between sales, gifts and the generous bequest of \$200.00 from the estate of Gertrude Allen, a longtime summer resident of Island Pond, \$640.61 was added, making a total of \$927.13 for the year. In December 23 purchased an additional card catalog file for \$322.17, so we will have a plaque in memory of Miss Allen and her father, Redfield Allen. Again we would like to thank all the many people who have contributed to this fund in one form or another. It makes it possible for the Library to have some of the nice "extra's" for general use.

Improvements this year have been a new front walk and a railing all along it, which we sincerely hope makes for a safer entrance to the Library and the Town Clerk's office.

We are asking for an appropriation of \$7,000.00 for 1985. This is precisely the same amount we have asked for, for the preceding 3 years. We feel proud that we have been able to keep our request at the same level for so long a time, when everything seems to be costing more and more.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE REPORT

TOWN COMMON

The Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant

At the 1980 Annual Town Meeting, the Town voted to acquire land behind the town buildings, the Walsh tract, to be developed as a playground and for parking. It was acquired in 1981 and in 1982 the Town appropriated \$5000 to initiate the development. An additional \$12,300 was appropriated in 1983.

Early in 1984 the Selectmen suggested that the Parks and Recreation Committee make application for Land and Water Conservation funds, a Federal grant, to complete development of the Walsh tract. Washington's application was one of 27 which the New Hampshire Office of Recreation Services selected for funding. The Town project as approved included filling, grading and seeding that part of the Walsh tract to be used as a playground and that part of the Common lying between the Church and the old hotel foundation out to the road right of way. In early November the Town received approval to obligate Federal matching funds in the amount of \$22,490. Since funding had been assured in early November, the Town solicited bids for installation of concrete drain pipe and the initial phase of the filling. No bids were received, so the Town obtained quotes for gravel and equipment operation on an hourly basis. By the end of the year \$8,300 had been spent. Contractor Rick Niven had installed 80% of the drain pipe, filled 80% of the parking area to final grade and completed filling about 30% of the area planned as a ball field. Trees which need to be removed along the drainage line are being cut by Louis Borey in exchange for the wood and he will dispose of the slash. Fill generated in the development of the church basement will be fully utilized and thereby cut project costs. As weather permits, top soil will be added where needed and the ground seeded so as to have good turf by early summer. Playground equipment selected by the School Board will be purchased out of project funds and will be installed in May or early June.

At the invitation of the Committee, the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee staff landscape architect prepared (without cost to the town) a plan for restoration of the Town Common. The principle features of the plan are tree planting, native granite delineating the inside of the driveway, and a footpath between the church and school. The Committee recommends that the driveway in front of the Town buildings, the present parking area, access to the new parking area and the footpath to the new playground-parking area to be surfaced with crushed stone.

PROBLEM: There is much concern about the absence of lighting on the Town Common. At least one flood light should be installed for public safety.

CAMP MORGAN

Pre-season planning with parents, strong community support and skillful direction contributed to the outstanding success of the Camp Morgan summer program. Under the direction of Janet Pearce, a dedicated and hard working staff, put together an interesting and challenging program which was well attended. This winning combination of strong community participation and an experienced staff should be continued. The Committee recommends that beginning with the 1985 program, staff assistants be paid the prevailing minimum wage or above depending on the level of experience and assigned responsibility.

Grading and drainage of the field between the old dining hall and the camp director's cottage was accomplished last fall and provides for better dispersal of playground activities. It is recommended the fields be seeded as early as possible so that they will be fully usable when the summer program gets under way.

The maintenance program initiated in 1984 proved most beneficial and should be continued. The refrigerator in the camp director's cottage, should in the opinion of the service man who last made repairs, be replaced; the Committee agrees. In the future equipment used in the summer program will be serviced and stored immediately following the close of the summer season. The parking area should be expanded to include some of the area in front of the old dining hall (now removed) as shown on a plot plan filed with the Selectmen. Large rocks or a new fence with a lockable gate should be installed so as to confine parking and traffic to the designated area. The sign stating the rules and regulations of Camp Morgan desperately needs to be redone and installed near the parking lot entrance before this summer season.

Now that a new water system has been installed in the Lodge remodeling the kitchen should get underway. The toilet facilities need some attention; perhaps toilets should be installed on the main floor in the area formerly used for storage. The Committee strongly recommends the use of funds appropriated in 1984 for insulating and renovating the Lodge so that the building can be used for town functions during the cold weather.

The generous offer made by the WYA to install the insulation with their volunteer work force was very much appreciated and we wish to take them up on it as soon as insulation can be purchased for this project.

The Committee also recommends a picnic shelter, about 12' X 20', be erected near the old dining hall fireplace, for children to use as a rain shelter, a place to wait for rides home, and of course for group picnics. The fireplace chimney was slightly damaged in the removal of the dining hall and should be repaired by a mason.

ROCKWELL PARK

The land on Half Moon Pond Road donated by Rockwell-International needs to be cleared once again. It has been two or more years since litter and brush were removed. We plan to organize a volunteer work force to take care of this sometime over the summer.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The 1984/85 school year started with two new members on the School Board and a fresh burst of enthusiasm.

The year also started with a 20% increase in student population.

Our first priority was to create space where none existed. With a great deal of deliberation and investigation space was created at the left of the stage. This space was necessary due to the requirements of special needs students. Privacy and an undisturbed environment are needed if these students are to achieve their full potential.

Priority two was to negotiate with the Hillsboro-Deering School District for the tuitioning of a portion of our students, in the hope that by achieving this we might solve a number of our problems and better serve our children. Our probe was unsuccessful as Hillsboro-Deering was wrestling with many of the same space problems we face. They did however give us some optimism that with the completion of a future Space Study something may be resolved to benefit all concerned.

The Board feels that with each new year comes new obstacles, but we also feel confident that our school system is functioning at its highest educational level with qualified teachers and aides. The position of Head Teacher has been one which has gone beyond expectations. We feel we have a staff who diligently work toward a better education for our children.

We strongly feel that the town has an obligation to give serious consideration to space alternatives other than using the two classrooms in the school and 85% of the historical town hall.

Now is the time to plan for the future of this school before it is too late.

HEAD TEACHER'S REPORT

The Primary Classroom

Mrs. Nagy's primary classroom contains a lively group of 24 first, second, and third graders -- all learning together. Respect for nature, for each other, for their country and for their community is just as much a part of the curriculum as reading, writing, and arithmetic.

The primary room stresses development of the whole child. Children are taught to be independent workers who take responsibility for their own learning. The curriculum makes allowances for individual differences. Since some children are more independent than others, guidance is provided for each child, based on his or her need for direct supervision.

The basic subjects are taught at every level of development. Writing, for instance is a central part of the Language Arts program. While first graders use inventive spelling in their writing, more advanced students are expected to use more orthodox spelling. Likewise punctuation and capitalization standards become more demanding as the child develops greater capacity to write expressively.

Reading is also taught at various levels of difficulty. Every child is read to aloud daily from either a trade book, a children's classic, or a "Big Book". A "Big Book" is a well known children's story which the teacher has copied in very large print, suitable for choral reading by a group of children. Some children's first experience reading words aloud is in the group recitation of the "Big Book" story as the teacher points out the familiar words.

The math program follows a sequence of skills designated by the D.C. Heath series--the math textbooks used throughout the school. The teaching method is an approach called "Math Their Way" which seeks to approach the subject at a level that is most meaningful to the students. A feature of the math program is the "Mad Minute", a daily math drill in which each child answers as many basic fact questions as possible on a given worksheet in one minute. Such drills expand and reinforce a child's memory of math facts. Instant recall of the basic facts helps the child's later mastery of two and three-digit multiplication and division problems.

Social Studies and Science lessons round out the Primary classroom curriculum. Both are related to the child's world view and are taught by the discovery method. For example in a recent primary grade study of Christmas Trees native to Washington, children brought in samples of needles and cones found in their neighborhoods. These samples were grouped and classified, first through the children's own recognition of similarities and differences in the specimens and later by comparing them with pictures found in nature books.

Evaluation in the primary grades is done in the narrative style and is based on the child's own use of the skills which have been taught.

The Intermediate Grade Classroom

Mr. Lathrop's intermediate grade classroom contains eleven fourth and fifth graders and, for the first time in several years, ten sixth graders. By the time children reach fourth grade they are able to read at grade level independently. (A tribute, undoubtedly, to an excellent primary school teacher.) A slight shift in emphasis at this level places math in the spotlight. The Heath program, mentioned earlier, spirals its way upward introducing children to more difficult extensions of previously learned aspects of arithmetic. By the end of Grade 6 the children will have learned the basic arithmetic operations using fractions, decimals, and percentage. They will have had a strong background in elementary geometry, and they will be able to multiply and divide using three digit numbers.

The language arts curriculum features a daily ten-minute writing period in which children work on stories in their own journals. These are read aloud at the rate of two stories per day. Other students join the teacher in suggesting improvements in the stories read aloud. Material for English lessons stems from the journal writing. When it becomes evident that students are confusing verb tenses, for example, passages from the journals which demonstrate this difficulty are employed to teach the correct usage.

Reading during the first quarter followed the curriculum of the Tens Book Program. Each child completes a substantial children's book, learns vocabulary, and answers questions about the story in chapter by chapter sequence. The three books completed first quarter are: *HARRIET THE SPY*, *MRS. FRISBY AND THE RATS OF NIMH*, and *THE LION, THE WHICH AND THE WARDROBE*. Second quarter reading will emphasize short story comprehension using Readers' Digest Skill Builders as the reading material. These exercises range from fourth to eighth grade level.

Spelling is taught in the conventional way--a twenty-word list each week. The spelling program emphasizes phonetic analysis of words. It also teaches synonyms and homonyms.

The Social Studies program follows the course of U.S. History. There has been a special emphasis on mapping and map reading in Social Studies this year. Science has focused on the classification of living things. Vertebrates and the animal kingdom have received the most attention during the first half of the year. Later we will have a group of lessons on health and nutrition.

Classic works in Children's literature are read aloud by the teacher--one chapter per day. Selections enjoyed over the first half of this year include: *A HORSE AND HIS BOY* by C. S. Lewis, *ISLAND OF THE BLUE DOLPHINS* by Scott O'Dell, and *THE PHANTOM TOLLBOOTH* by Norton Juster.

The Junior High Classroom

This year's Junior High is made up of sixteen seventh and eighth graders. Subjects studied at this level range from basic math to Computer Programming, from Life Science to Social Studies, and from English to Literature.

In mathematics, Junior High students are learning how to use mathematical formulae in various problem-solving situations.

A memorable project during the first quarter examined the anatomy of the frog. Several students brought in enough locally captured specimens to supply each eighth grader with a frog to dissect. These budding biologists, with help from their seventh grade assistants, dissected the frogs to learn where the organs were located and how the basic systems of a vertebrate's body function together to support life.

Both seventh and eighth graders are reading selections from the classic literature of western culture. Themes of heroism and sacrifice in Greek mythology have been a recent topic of discussion. Contemporary books as found in the Tens Book Program are also used in the Junior High. Two major emphases of the program are reading comprehension and independent reading for pleasure.

In Social Studies seventh graders are exploring the Western Hemisphere. The aim of the program is to make students more familiar with the anthropology and sociology of North and South America. Eighth graders are studying world history and the relationship between history and current events. Both classes combine occasionally for simulations of certain historical moments.

The Junior High students put a lot of time and energy this year into writing skits for the Christmas program. Bob Wright volunteered to videotape the live performances so the Junior High actors, playwrights, and directors had a first hand opportunity to view and critique their own work.

Mr. Matthews reports a phenomenal gain in academic achievement for most of his students during the first half of the '84-85 school year. We have every reason to expect this growth to continue through the winter and spring and to graduate a well educated and well rounded eighth grade class.

Other Activities at School

The new art teacher, Bethany Aspenwald, has made a great hit with all the students. She visits the school one day a week. In addition to meeting with the three classrooms, Ms. Aspenwald has assisted with scenery for the Christmas Program and other group art displays.

Virginia Garlow continues to direct the music program. Music has become an increasingly important part of school performances and several children are preparing now for the state chorus trip in the spring.

Two French-speaking children have moved into town this year and attend our school. We are grateful for the part-time tutoring services of Hector Levesque, a bilingual citizen of Washington who helps these newcomers learn English and understand the curriculum in all subject areas.

Bob Matthews has spent many extra hours teaching instrumental music to members of the school band. He has also organized and coached a soccer team which met Unity's veteran soccer team first on their field then on ours. Although our team lost to Unity on both occasions, the excitement of the events and the lessons in cooperation and sportsmanship made all involved in the extracurricular sports program feel that their time had been well spent. We hope to challenge Unity and other neighboring teams again next year.

A Few Final Notes of Importance

The discipline code has now become fully assimilated by the students and has smoothed out the operation of the school. A new promotion and retention policy has helped clarify the central aim of the school and specified standards for progressing through the grades. These measures have improved the quality of life and the quality of education at Washington Center School.

We lost a popular and effective staff member when Karin Fox resigned early in the year. Karin's duties were taken over partly by Donna Graham and partly by Jo Ellen Wright, two newcomers to our staff who show great promise in their potential contribution to the school. Mavis Potter, aide in Grades 1,2, and 3; and Linda Glavin, aide and special tutor in Grades 4,5, and 6 continue to work closely with teachers and students. Both Mavis and Linda help the program enormously. Without them we could not have reached the level of achievement we currently enjoy.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 10, 1984

The meeting opened at 2 p.m. with Moderator Donald Crane in charge. He read the warrant. The ballot box was inspected. The polls were opened in the school room with the Assistant Moderator Theodore S. Drew; Assistant Clerk, Wendy Otterson; Ballot Clerks Zaida Cilley and Elsie Fletcher. The polls were closed at 7 p.m. with the following results: Moderator - Donald Crane with 127 votes; Clerk - Diane Drew with 133 votes; Treasurer - Janice Philbrick with 126 votes; School Board for 3 years - Richard Cilley with 130 votes; School Board for 1 year - William Bouchard with 97 votes; School Auditor - Robert Dunton with 20 votes. Mr. Crane then introduced Thomas Watman, Superintendent of Schools; Dr. Cynthia Mowles, Assistant Superintendent of Schools; and James Strauss, Business Administrator of SAU #24.

ARTICLE 2: James Russell moved that the District accept the salaries of the School Board and other officers and agents of the District, as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Cheryl Houghton. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 3: Vivian Clark moved that the reports of agents, auditors, committees, and officers be accepted, with the following corrections, as printed in the Annual Report; p. 95: \$60,076 in SAU #24 Budget: p. 83: \$5,000 under repairs and maintenance should be under general repairs; p. 90 - explained that Louis Weiderhold did a bus driver physical. Seconded by James Russell. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4: Vivian Clark moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand (\$25,000) for the purchase of a new school bus. Seconded by James Russell. Bob Crane made a motion to amend the article to read to purchase a new school bus of not less than 66 passengers. Seconded by Vivian Clark. Carried by voice vote. The article was then passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 5: James Russell moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred eighty-one thousand seven hundred and three dollars (\$281,703) for the support of the schools, the payment of salaries of schools, the payment of salaries of School District Officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Cheryl Houghton. Donald Gaskell made a motion to amend the article to decrease by \$5,000 the amount with the intent to cut teachers salaries. Seconded by Bob Crane. The amendment failed by paper ballot with 55 no votes and 41 yes votes. After much discussion, Mike Otterson made a motion to decrease by \$5,000 the original article. Seconded by Beverly Bender. The amendment failed by paper ballot with 53 no votes and 43 yes votes. The original article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6: Cheryl Houghton moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven thousand five hundred two dollars (\$11,502) to add to the 1983/84 fiscal appropriation for the unanticipated tuition and transportation costs. Seconded by James Russell. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7: James Russell moved to dismiss the article. Seconded by Cheryl Houghton. Article relevant to the purchase of new playground equipment. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8: Vivian Clark moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3,000) dollars for painting of the Washington Center School. Seconded by Cheryl Houghton. Carried by voice vote.

ARTICLE 9: Cheryl Houghton moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars to defray the cost of implementing, equipping and operating a school lunch program for the 1984/85 school year as legislated under RSA 189:11a. Seconded by Vivian Clark. Pat Killam made a motion to amend the article to read "the sum of nineteen hundred (\$1,900) dollars to implement..." Seconded by Bruce Woodbury. Amendment defeated by voice vote. Original article failed by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 10: Vivian Clark moved that the District vote, pursuant to RSA 198:20b to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action of the School District meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year upon the following conditions:

- a. The money must be used for the legal purposes for which the School District can appropriate money.
- b. The School Board must hold a Public Hearing in connection with any proposed expenditure of funds.
- c. It shall not require the expenditure of additional District funds.

Seconded by James Russell. Passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 11: James Russell moved that the District vote to instruct the Washington School Board to initiate discussions with the Hillsboro-Deering School Board, to amend the AREA Agreement in order to tuition Grades 6,7,8 to the Hillsboro-Deering Middle School; subject to an authorizing vote at a future Washington School District Meeting. -Seconded by Cheryl Houghton. After a lengthy discussion, the motion passed by a paper ballot with 52 yes votes and 29 no votes.

Mike Otterson then made a motion for a rising thanks to the two people leaving the School Board for their years of service. Seconded by Bob Crane. Jim Russell and Vivian Clark then thanked everyone for their cooperation through the years. Cheryl Houghton presented plants to Diane Drew for her role as School/Community Coordinator; Betty Wood for her many kindnesses to the school children; and to Lynda Roy for serving as treasurer for nine years.

A motion to adjourn by James Hofford, seconded by Nat Jurson passed by voice vote.
