Welcome and introductions Facilitator, Lynne Cavanaugh, welcomed three members of the community to the second of nine Listening Sessions at 10:35 a.m. in the Stokey Library at the First Parish in Wayland. She gave a brief statement of her background and asked the attendees to introduce themselves. She explained that Selectman Lea Anderson was there to listen and take notes for a summary report. She assured the attendees that no statements would be attributed to individuals in the report. L. Cavanaugh reviewed the ground rules.

Questions and discussion L. Cavanaugh led the group through a series of questions:

- What town services do you use most often and how well do they serve your needs? How could they be improved?
- What are three things in Wayland Town Government that are working well and you don't want to see changed? What three things would you like to see changed?
- Do you participate in town activities and town-sponsored events? Why or why not?
- What would encourage you to take advantage of these activities and services?
- Many feel that Wayland taxes are high. What services might you be willing to forego in order to add new or additional services?
- What is the best way for the town to provide you with information on a regular basis?
- Do you have skills that you would be willing to share with the town on a short-term, one-shot, or regular basis? What is keeping you from joining a board or committee?
- Do you have concerns or comments that have not already been mentioned?

Question: What town services do you use most often and how well do they serve your needs? Or not serve your needs?

Conservation

• Use conservation land; can't think of improvements

Library

- Use library; can't think of improvements
- Library seems great, but there is room for improvement; would be good to have more study space; seems congested; New Weston Library is great
- Excited that new library is planned to be in Cochituate; current library too congested; would spend time at new library if there is tea and coffee
- Concerns about what to do with old library, given deed restriction; keep it as a branch library
- Agree that we should keep it as a branch; also space for meetings; specialty library stacks like antique books or science?

What is working well, not working well?

Building Department

- Communication was very difficult; because of water damage, built a new "fancy ranch" on existing foundation, completely compliant, no variances; filed in August, permit issued at Christmas (5 months); filled out paperwork, told we didn't have X; 9 rounds including engineering studies; process is not programmatic; in other towns can go to website and find list of documents needed; Wayland needs comprehensive list; tried to get architect to try too; once an application is made/accepted there is a time limit to respond; it seemed that the Building Dept. didn't want to start the clock by accepting the application; extremely disorganized; so frustrating
- My experience on smaller projects in my home was that there was no problem

Fire and Police

- Fire and Police were amazingly helpful on this building project; friendly, welcoming
- Met with Public Safety as part of my job and found it was very good
- No issues

Water Department

Great

DPW

• Highway Dept. was very accommodating during repaving of Old Conn. Path; fixed a driveway problem and put stones back properly on a wall; very helpful and polite

• During work on Rice Spring Land and Happy Hollow Road, Highway Dept. went out of their way to help; dump people are very helpful

Planning Department

- Disappointed about Town Center; what can we do to make it less cookie cutter, more useful to citizens? Concord Center is a pipe dream, but Cheese Shop is more than a store, it's a gathering place.
- We bent too many rules; developer made promises that weren't kept; didn't get the tax bonus we expected; now concerned about CVS were rules followed?
- What was original plan at 150 Main St.?
- Finnerty's Restaurant site why not subsidize something town wants; the gas station across the street is closed, what does it mean for that location? We are told town government is powerless to stop it
- Town government should have some role making voices of people known; EDC met with new owner to tell him what we want at Town Center; indoor playground, convening spaces? Like the Cheese Shop in Concord
- It'll never be Concord; when these decisions were made there were 4 developers on the BoS; we paid for Water Treatment Plant we didn't need; Glezen Lane turn issue because of a few people; Selectmen had conclusion already reached

Question: What would you like to see changed?

• Look for selectmen to display wisdom, to be a guardian of what the town is and what it owns; we have a lot of land in conservation – people thought it would be good; BoS did not display wisdom in Town Center or Public Safety Building which flooded; current process of selling 8 or 9 acres of town land on Rte. 20 is not wise; it is the only industrial land we own; what will it cost every year to get rid of highway waste? Why can't school buses stay there? No one wants them; do we have to pay dispatcher if we put buses at multiple sites? How are we going to fuel buses legally?

Question: How do you describe wisdom?

- I look ahead 30 or 40 years; former board unwise, biased, saw a great development opportunity
- Need principle-based decision making; acquire land for future municipal uses; long term planning process; BoS should step into role on a set of principles adopted by the town over 5, 10, 20 years or more
- Wisdom takes looking ahead, maturity
- Think it is terrific to have listening sessions

Question: Is there a long-range plan?

• Maybe Land Use, EDC, and Wayland Business Association; do we want more and more of our tax revenues to come from commercial?

Communication

What is the best way (other ways) to reach you?

- Inserts in Town Census
- Website should be interactive; should there be a selectmen's blog? There is no critical reporting in the Town Crier; the Town Meeting Warrant provides pro and con arguments for each article; there is no other place to read pro and con; want a news sharing organ; during town center negotiation, felt there were alliances of people running for office; didn't know what they were; trust in Wayland's public government went way down; want something that gives in depth information

What are obstacles to volunteering?

- Fear of public castigation, being called a liar, cheat, no protection right now; worried that there are hidden agendas; need impressive resume to get elected; do not feel qualified
- Running for BoS; been involved in public service since high school; studied law and public policy; educated in Weston Public Schools
- Serve on Board of Health; disagree with how we base our judgments; bright people on BoH; time used to be limited, but that is changing

What would you reduce, cut from the budget?

- Would have to know employment numbers; we need all these services; what could be automated?
- BoH includes school nurses, 1 administrator; lot of what they do is filing; can departments get electronic filing system; this was in the works, but nothing has happened

Question: What is included on the BoS line in the budget?

How should people be informed?

- Public comment should be extended once a month to 45 minutes
- Budget is difficult to read in warrant, terminology, groupings; set up annotated version on website; group by function, by outcome; it is informative, but difficult to interpret
- Communications is a big issue

Anything else?

- Worked in same business for 40 years, used to keep books by hand; 3 years ago we made a big step and set up data base for workers to access; hugely improved delivery of service to customers; think that data and technology exist to fix it in Wayland; should have one central office for paying bills; probably some 5 year plan
- BoH director said this is coming; biggest expense would be transferring data, clerical
- Communications is a big issue
- Hugely admire volunteers in town government; don't understand why Open Meeting Law is such a problem, disproportionate; seems that boards are hamstrung by OML
