DIRECTOR'S REPORT

	 The Holiday Shoppe was a great, sold-out success. The gym worked very well despite having to break down in 30 minutes. With an average price of about \$1.75, the shop grossed about \$2,100. One-third is invested in merchandise for next year; two-thirds goes to non-profits selected by the committee. The Senior Tax Relief Committee is getting ready to meet with the Board of Selectmen to solicit their support for sending a letter supporting the raising of the exemption rates for seniors statewide. Wayland, Lincoln, and Weston are submitting a collaborative grant to fund the Aging Mastery Program, a 12-week program that will be hosted by Weston since Wayland cannot guarantee space for the full 12 weeks. The program is federally funded and distributed by MCOA and Tufts.
DISCUSSION	The SHINE Program counselors survived open enrollment, working with 225 to 250 people. It was suggested that this be the subject of a newspaper article.
	Space and parking continue to be a problem. Large events can fill the entire parking lot. Julie has a meeting with Nan to discuss options that might remedy the problems.
	Maureen has been working two jobs. Her other job has offered her more hours and with two in college, she has decided to accept. Shawna is willing to pick up a few additional hours.
