Town Clerk Meeting Minutes June 9, 2003

SEMI-ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Continued Session of the May 19, 2003 S-ATM

The meeting under the foregoing Warrant was held in the auditorium of the West Boylston Middle/High School on June 9, 2003, and was called to order by the Moderator at 7:30 p.m.

The Moderator announced that a quorum has been met, that there are 4,415 registered voters as of Dec. 31, 2002 and that 3% of registered voters are required to convene for a total of 132. 2% or 88 voters maintain a quorum, and reconvene. The quorum required for the reconvened session of the May 19, 2003 Semi-Annual Town Meeting has been met.

Upon a motion of H. Carter Hunt, Jr. and second by the floor it was unanimously voted to waive the reading of the warrant.

ARTICLE 34 –

ARTICLE 35 –

AUTHORIZATION TO HIRE UP TO TWO ADDITIONAL, FULL-TIME FIREFIGHTER EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES PROVIDER

A motion was made to approve Article 35 as printed in the warrant by Selectmen Kevin McCormick and seconded by Selectmen Allen Phillips, the article was successfully passed by a majority vote which authorizes the hiring of one additional, full-time Firefighter/Emergency Medical Services Provider in Fiscal Year 2004, and the hiring of one additional, full-time Firefighter/Emergency Medical Services Provider in Fiscal Year 2005.

ARTICLE 36 –

AUTHORIZATIONTO SET THE SALARY OF ELECTED OFFICIALS

A motion was made to approve Article 36 as printed in the warrant by Selectmen Allen Phillips and seconded by Selectmen Wayne LeBlanc, the article was unanimously passed which determines and fixes what salaries elective officers of the town shall receive for Fiscal Year 2004 in conformity with the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 41 Section 108, with the following amendment; A motion was made by the Moderator, H. Carter Hunt, Jr. to forgo his salary due to fiscal conservatism, the motion was seconded and accepted by the floor, the approved salaries are as follows:

ARTICLE 37 –

FISCAL YEAR 2004 OMNIBUS BUDGET APPROPRIATION ARTICLE

A motion was made by Selectmen Charles Stevens and seconded by Selectmen Kevin McCormick to approve Article 37. he article was passed by a majority vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Million, Three Hundred Ninety-four Thousand, Six Hundred Six Dollars and No Cents (\$16,394,606.00) to defray the expenses and charges of the Town of West Boylston in Fiscal Year 2004, the period of July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004, including the costs of Public Education, Debt and Interest Payments, and providing Municipal services, and to meet said appropriation as follows:

- A. Raise and appropriate through taxation the sum of Sixteen Million, Four Thousand Thirtyone Dollars and No Cents (\$16,004,931.00);
- B. Transfer the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) from Ambulance Receipts Reserved for Appropriation to the Fire Department Salaries and Wages Account, Budget Line Item # 02-20-5100;
- C. Transfer the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) from the Wachusett Fund, the socalled Holden Hospital Trust Fund, to the Fire Department Salaries and Wages Account, Budget Line Item # 02-20-5100;
- D. Transfer the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and no cents (\$12,500.00) from the Ambulance Receipts Reserved for Appropriation to the Fire Department Supplies Account Budget Line Item # 02-20-6400;
- E. Transfer the sum of One Thousand Dollars, Six Hundred Seventy-five (\$1,675) from the Wachusett Fund, the so-called Holden Hospital Trust Fund, to the Fire Department Supplies Account, Budget Line Item # 02-20-6400;
- F. Transfer the sum of Forty-three Thousand Dollars (\$43,000) from Ambulance Receipts Reserved for Appropriation to the Long Term Debt -Principal Account, Budget Line Item # 07-10-6910 for debt reduction payments for the purchase of a Fire Department Ambulance; and
- G. Transfer the sum of Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) from Ambulance Receipts Reserved for Appropriation to the Interest On Temporary Loans Account, Budget Line Item # 07-53-6925 for interest payments for the purchase of a Fire Department Ambulance.

ARTICLE 38 –

AUTHORIZATION TO APPROPRIATE MONEY TO THE SEWER ENTERPRISE ACCOUNT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2004

A motion was made by Selectmen James Ryan and seconded by Selectmen Allen Phillips to approve Article 38 as printed in the warrant.

The hand count vote was conducted and recorded as 103 for and 28 opposed, Article 38 passed by 213's majority. It was voted for the town to appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred, Ninety-six Thousand, Nine Hundred and Eight Dollars (\$996,908) to the West Boylston Sewer Enterprise Account to be expended by the Board of Selectmen, acting as the Board of Sewer Commissioners

for sewer system development, administration, assessment, operation, and maintenance expenses in Fiscal Year 2004 as follows:

- 1) the transfer of Three Hundred Sixty-one thousand. Two Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$361,225) from Sewer Betterment Revenue Reserved for Debt Payments,
- 2) the appropriation of Five Hundred Eighty-five Thousand, Four Hundred Fifty-five Dollars (\$585,455) from Fiscal Year 2004 Sewer Enterprise Fund User Revenue, and
- 3) the transfer of Fifty Thousand, Two-Hundred Twenty-eight Dollars (\$50,228) from the Stabilization Fund, provided that any unexpended balance of the Stabilization Fund transfer be closed out to the Stabilization Fund at the end of Fiscal Year 2004.

ARTICLE 39 -passed over

APPROPRIATION TO FUND STUDIES AND PREPARATION OF PLANS FOR REPAIR OR REPLACEMENT OF THE ROOF OF THE MIDDLE/HIGH SCHOOL AND FOR THE REPAIR OF THE ROOF OF THE MAJOR VICTOR E. EDWARDS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

A motion was made by Selectmen Kevin McCormick and seconded by Selectmen Wayne LeBlanc to pass over Article 39. It was unanimously voted to pass over this article which would have allowed the town to appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$10,000.00) to be expended by the School Committee for ,architectural, construction, engineering and related studies and analyses as to repair or replacement of the roof of the Middle *1* High School, 125 Crescent Street, in whole or in part, and for repair of the roof of the Major Victor E. Edwards Elementary School, 70 Crescent Street, which studies and analyses may include, but need not be limited to, design and engineering services, environmental evaluations, architectural, construction and condition evaluations, useful life determinations, cost calculations and projections, formulation of reports, and preparation of plans, drawings, specifications, and bid invitations for any roof repair or replacement work recommended thereby, and to meet said appropriation by transferring the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$10,000.00) from the Stabilization Fund, provided that any unexpended balance as of June 30, 2004 be transferred back to the Stabilization Fund.

ARTICLE 40 - passed over

APPROPRIATION TO FUND REPAIR AND REFURBISHMENT OF THE TUNNELS AND HEATING-VENTILATING-AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEMS OF THE MIDDLE/HIGH SCHOOL

A motion was made by Selectmen Kevin McCormick and seconded by Selectmen Charles Stevens to pass over Article 40. It was unanimously voted to pass over this article which would have allowed the town to appropriate a sum of money to be expended by the School Committee to ventilate, insulate, cleanse, disinfect, engineer, refurbish, reconstruct and otherwise repair and modify the tunnels and the heating -ventilating -air conditioning systems, and included or related piping, wiring and ductwork, located at the Middle/High School, 125 Crescent Street, to conduct related studies, evaluations and analyses, to prepare such plans, drawings, designs, specifications, analyses, testings, and bid invitations, and to take such other steps as may prove necessary or advisable to address any air quality and environmental topics related thereto, for the health, welfare and well-being of the students and staff of the school, and to meet said appropriation by transferring the sum thus appropriated from the Stabilization Fund, provided that any unexpended balance as of June 30, 2004 be transferred back to the Stabilization Fund.

ARTICLE 41-

APPROPRIATION TO FUND AN ELDERLY COMMUNITY SERVICES PROGRAM

A motion was made to approve Article 41 as printed in the warrant by Selectmen James Ryan, the motion was seconded by Selectmen Allen Phillips. It was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$6,000.00) to fund an Elderly Community Services Program for the purpose of providing a payment voucher for services rendered for the departments, boards, and committees of the municipality to resident property owners who have attained the age of sixty (60) years, to be used to reduce the real estate property taxes for the property in which the elderly owner resides; said program shall be subject to the following conditions in addition to any and all eligibility requirements promulgated by the Board of Selectmen:

- 1) participation in the shall be limited to elderly residents of the town who own property and are willing and able to provide services to the town;
- 2) program participants shall receive compensation at the basic minimum wage rate for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts as promulgated by the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, Division of Occupational Safety for each how of service rendered for a total not to exceed One Thousand Three Hundred Dollars and No Cents (\$1,300) in any calendar year;
- 3) program participants may agree in writing prior to participating in the program to receive compensation in the form of a voucher to be presented to the Treasurer/Collector to be applied to the real estate obligations of the participant for the property in which the participant resides;
- 4) the Treasurer/Tax Collector shall comply with the wage, tax, and payroll deduction requirements of the state Department of Revenue and the federal Internal Revenue Service, prior to compensating program participants or applying the net amount of wages earned to the real estate tax obligations of the participants; and

5) program participants who meet the eligibility guidelines established for the program by the Board of Selectmen shall be selected for participation in the program on a first-come-first-serve basis.

ARTICLE 42 –

AUTHORIZATION TO TRANSFER FUNDS TO THE UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION FUND

A motion was made to approve Article 42 as printed in the warrant by Selectmen Allen Phillips, the motion was seconded by Selectmen Wayne LeBlanc. It was unanimously voted to transfer the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$10,000.00) from the Fiscal Year 2004 Unemployment Insurance Compensation Account, Budget Lie Item #09-13-5170 to the Unemployment Compensation Fund.

ARTICLE43 -passed over

AUTHORIZATION TO TRANSFER MONEY TO THE STABILIZATION FUND

A motion was made to pass over Article 43 by Selectmen Charles Stevens, the motion was seconded by Selectmen Kevin McCorrnick. It was unanimously voted to pass over this article which would have allowed the town to transfer a sum of money to the Stabilization Fund.

ARTICLE 44 –

AUTHORIZATION TO TRANSFERFREE CASH OR AVAILABLE FUNDS TO REDUCETHE FISCAL YEAR 2004 TAX RATE

A motion was made by Selectmen Allen Phillips, seconded by Selectmen Kevin McCormick to approve a transfer of funds to reduce the Fiscal Year 2004 Tax Rate.

The Moderator asked the voters of the town to accept the provisions of Chapter 39 § 15 of the Massachusetts General Law which authorizes and allows the Moderator to declare a 2/3's vote, the motion was made and seconded by the floor. Motion passed.

A show of hands was requested for the vote by the Moderator. Under the provisions of Chapter 39 § 15, Article 44 passes by a 2/3rd's majority vote, with 10 opposed.

It was voted to transfer the sum of Four Hundred, Fifty Thousand dollars and no cents (\$450,000.00) from certified free cash or other available funds to reduce or stabilize the Fiscal Year 2004 Tax Rate.

ARTICLE 45 –passed over

APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS FOR EXPENSES ASSOCIATED WITH THE REMOVAL OF HAZARDOUS WASTE OR CONTAMINATED SOIL FROM THE MIXTER MUNICIPAL OFFICE BUILDING PROPERTY LOCATED AT 120 PRESCOTT STREET

A motion was made by Selectmen Wayne LeBlanc and seconded by Selectmen Kevin McCormick to pass over Article 45. It was unanimously voted to pass over this article which would have allowed to town to appropriate a sum of money for fund the expenses associated with the removal of hazardous waste or contaminated soil from the town property known as the Mixter Municipal Office Building, located at 120 Prescott Street, and to determine manner of meeting said appropriation whether by raising money through taxation, borrowing, transfer from available funds, or any combination thereof.

Unfinished Business:

Article 30- passed over

A motion was made by Selectmen Charles Stevens and seconded by Selectmen Allen Phillips to pass over the previously tabled Article 30. Motion was unanimously approved to pass over Article 30 which would have advised the Board of Health to exempt West Boylston home owners over the age of sixty-two from the mandatory sewer hook up rule.

Motion was made to adjourn this continued session of the May 19, 2003 Semi-Annual Town Meeting, seconded. Meeting adjourned at 10:45 p.m.
